## CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

October 3, 1995
This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Member
present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray
Purvis, Edwin Weiss, Ray Womack, Jerry Cassle, and James Nichols. Ray Purvis moved to accept the minutes of the previous meeting as read. utes of the previous meeting as read. carried.
Mr. Greg Williams met with the council to discuss his discontent with the work done on his mother's house through the disaster grant. He stated that
his mother did not want him to do this his mother did not want him to do this
but he felt like he must. He went over a but he fert like he must. He went over a
list of 23 items he has listed as defilist of 23 items he has listed as defi-
ciencies in the workmanship of the contractors work. He went over each item individually at length. See attachment. He stated that Buzz McKethan had noted on the contract that they would look at blocking the foundation of the house but that they did not do that work. He stated that they had blocked part of the house but not all or it. He also stated that $\$ 5$ of the contract
states that the contractor was not to get paid until the owner of the house as well as the City was satisfied that the work had been completed properly. He wanted to know why the contractor had been paid for the work. He stated that he had raised cane several times about the work and he felt like that was the reason they had not come back to his mother's house.
Buzz McKethan, TMS Group and City
representative, informed Mr. Williams representative, informed Mr. Williams spected and had met approval on the items that were on the contract except for a few minor details. He also informed him that drawdowns are done for several contractors at a time for several different jobs and in order to keep the small contractors in operating capital, funds could not be withheld because of HIS discontent and we would need to hear from his mother from now tract. Mr. McKethan went over each item on the contract and emphasized the fact that NO side deals are the responsibility of the city's. The bid sheets were written up to fix only the items that were damaged in the storm and this information was furnished by Mr. Greg Williams.
Mr. Armold Aguilar, representative for Aguilar and Company, was given any opportunity to speak since he was the
Contractor for this job. He informed the council that the contract had called for one half of a roof but he replaced the whole roof plus redecked the entire roof. Mr. Aguilar also point out that the contract also called for only a couple of pieces of sheetrock in the living room,
however he replaced the whole ceiling however he replaced the whole ceiling
and also replaced all the sheetrock on the and also replaced all the sheetrock on the walls and ceiling in the dining at noextra
charge to anyone. Mr. Aguilar pointed charge to anyone. Mr. Aguilar pointed
out that wood that has not been painted for many years will split and even though you paint it, it will still split. He reminded everyone that this house had not been painted in many years. He
stated that the contract called for one stated that the contract called for one
coat of primer and one coat of paint and coat of primer and one coat of paint and
that he put four coats of paint at no extra that he put four coats of paint at no extra
charge. He also discussed the blocking charge. He also discussed the blocking
of the house which was NOT in the contract. He said he did block up part of contract He said he did block up partof which was also done at no extra charge. He stated that he did not jack the house, that he blocked it. He put cinder blocks,
$2 \times 4$ 's, and then shims. The corners $2 \times 4$ 's, and then shims. The corners
were on cement blocks. There is NOTHING in the contract about flashing. He replaced the flashing on the north side of the house at no extra
charge. There was not anything in the charge. There was not anything in the
contract conceming the porch since there was no damage from the storm, only age. However, Mr. Aguilar agreed to repair half of the porch for nothing if Mr. Williams would pay for the remainder of the repair. The contract called for two (2) 32 " doors located on
the front porch. However, Mr. Williams the front porch. However, Mr. Williams
didn't want to replace one of the front didn't want to replace one of the front
doors and ask Mr. Aguilar to replace the doors and ask Mr. Aguilar to replace the
back door instead. So he puta solid door and a storm door on the back door which is a $30^{\prime \prime}$ door. Therefore, it was an odd size and hard to make match, there again, not an item on the contract. Mr. Womack ask Mr. Williams why didn't he point out that the floor needed repair at the time of the work write up. Mr. Williams told him he didn't think of
it until he talked to his mother and shereminded him.
Mr. McKethan reminded the council that the only thing that the city could consider at this time is the items on the contract. The council agreed that Mr. Aguilar should do the following items:

Sharp Says Unfair Medicaid Funding Formulas Could Cost Callahan County Taxpayers \$2.8 Million

AUSTIN-State Comptroller John
AUSTIN-State Comptroller John ing formulas now pending in the U. S. Congress would cost Callahan County taxpayers between $\$ 2.5$ and $\$ 2.8$ million in federal Medicaid cuts over the next seven years.
This unacceptable legislation asks Callahan County taxpayers to subsidize the health care of people in other states,"
Sharp said. "It would send wice Sharp said. "It would send twice as
much money to a senior citizen in New York as to a senior citizen in Callahan County.
True block grants would help balance the federal budget and give states like Texas more flexibility," Sharp said. "But this proposed legislation isnt a
block grant. It's a scheme to lock into place the unfair funding formulas of the past while giving distant bureaucrats in Washington as much control as ever over Texas programs."
Sharp released a county-by-county analysis of the different Medicaid funding formulas that have passed committees in both the U. S. House and U.S. Senate and will soon be resolved by a conference committec. His analysis shows that the House plan would cost
Texas $\$ 4.9$ billion over the next seven Texas $\$ 4.9$ billion over the next seven
years. The Senate version would cost years. The Senate version would cost
Texas $\$ 7.7$ billion during the same perex.
"These proposals offer Texans a choice between a bad plan and an even worse plan," Sharp said. "Both would pass the responsibility and expense for health care down to local communities. Public hospitals and other health care providers would have toraise local axes hospitals that receive no local tax support would have to shift Medicaid patients to public hospitals-adding to the challenges already faced by these facilities. According to the Comptroller, Medicaid contributes to the cost of care for
75 percent of all Texans in 75 percent of all Texans in nursing
homes, and nearly one-third of toul homes, and nearly one-third of tou
Medicaid spending in the state goes to Mare for elderly men and women. "What's going to happen to our parents and grandparents if this legislation passes?" Sharp asked. "As the number of elderly Texans grows, the money for their care will be sent to other states.
"What's going to happen to the hospitals where more than 45 percent of Texas babies are bom? Our state popunational rate, yet Congress wants to cu ur federal funds so that a handful of powerful Northeastern and Midwestern tates can receive more-whether their Under both the House and Senate Under bour the House and Senate plans, Sharp said, states would be rereceive federal dollars, much as they do now.

"It's the same entitlement system Congress claimed it wanted to reform and change to block grants when this debate began earlier this year," Sharp

strings, but Texas and other highgrowth states will receive fewer federal funds to comply with those rules and regulations."
Moreover, Sharp said, New York and other states with stagnant or declining populations would see their federal match rates increase, while Texas' fed as under current law.
"This is particularly outrageous, Sharp said. "New York would be re quired to spend fewer state dollars to eceive what it receives today-which is already twice as much as Texas reBoth the House and the Senate plans have been approved by committees and are ready for floor action, Sharp said, perraps as early as mid-October. After
that, a conference committee will work out the final version.
Since March, Sharp has provided imely analyses of all welfare and Medicaid proposals as they have wound rocess.

## TNRCC OFFERS SEMINARS FOR PETROLEUM STORAGE TANK OWNERS

It costs an average of $\$ 126,000$ to emove a single leaking petroleum torage tank and clean up ue soil that surrounds the tank. Tank owners and site are eligible to apply for reimbursement from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's (TNRCC) Petroleum Storage Tank Remediation Fund.
But petroleum storage tank owners who have not registered their tanks with the TNRCC by December 31, 1995, will be ineligible for reimbursement in the event a spil or leak occurs. Ownensle for all costs of corrective action. In addition, since deductibles on imbursement claims will begin rising December 23,1996 , storage tank leaks should be reported as soon as possible to
avoid additional costs and possible penalties. Also, any leaks reported after December 22, 1998, will not be eligible for reimbursement and the PST reim1,2001. 1, 2001. House Bill 2587 , passed by the tended erators with in tank owners and opdress their tank peroluickly ad tanks.
This fall the TNRCC will offer a series of 31 free seminars across the state to help tank owners determine whether tered have tanks that should be regislered, how to register them and how to apply for reimbursement for corrective action expenses. TNRCC staff also will Storage Tank Program.

These included small businesses with abandoned gas stations, investment companies or banks which have forestorage tanks, andschool districts which store fuel for their bus fleets.
