

## Week End Rain Showers Cool Record Heat Wave

Rain showers Saturday and Sunday helped cool record high temperatures a few days before. In Cross Plains most gauges showed about 90, some held an inch. More than half that fell in a shower Saturday afternoon, and more came on Sunday morning. Record high temperatures were recorded in Abilene and

believed locally Monday and Tuesday of last week, and weather remained hot until the showers. The badly needed rainfall helped pastures and gardens but was of little benefit to grains and dry stock tanks.

Top rain report was from Rowden where Warren Price measured 1.50 inches. Average there was one inch. Cottonwood Store gauged 1.30 inches, and W. O. Rachels at Pioneer and Les Byrd at Cross Cut both reported 1.20 inches.

Roy Tatom at Atwell had .70 of an inch, and Jack Rector at Sabanno got .60. Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Dill recorded an inch, and according to records they maintain at their place only 3.75 inches of rain, sleet and snow has fallen there this year.

## INCREASED POSTAL RATE CHARGES BEGIN MONDAY

Cost of mailing a letter and most other types of mail will be increased at 12:01 a.m. Monday, May 29.

First class postage will go up 2 cents for the first ounce making most letters cost 15 cents instead of 13 cents. First ounce costs 15 cents, and each additional ounce will cost 13 cents on first class mailings.

Post cards will be advanced to 10 cents, up one penny.
