

Rains Sunday Wet Parched Countryside; 2 Inches Here

Rains Sunday evening brightened spirits and outlook for the people of Cross Plains area.

Up to 2.50 inches were reported in this locality from the showers which began about 6 p.m. Sunday and lasted until early morning hours.

Gusty winds accompanied the initial showers and a large window was blown out at the Western Auto Store on Main Street here.

Although the moisture was a tremendous boon to agriculture in general, it was considered to be too late to aid the small grain crops in this locality. All other crops, especially sorghums and forage crops, were aided tremendously. Many peanut and cotton producers were waiting for adequate moisture to plant, although some had already begun.

Some runoff water was caught in area tanks, but much more is needed immediately before the critical water shortage is eased.

Gauges in Cross Plains seemed to average about two inches. M. F. Dill north of town measured 1.60 inches and Esthloy Dickson east of town gauged 1.85 inches. Noah Johnson, west of the city reported 1.10 inches.

Ron Bagley at Cross Cut reported 2.50 inches, as did Jack Rector at Sabanno, for top rainfall reports.

W. O. Rachels at Pioneer got 2.00 inches, although reports there also ranged up to 2.50 inches. Roger Watson reported two inches on a lease just north of Burkett. Cottonwood

gauges ranged from 1.10 to 1.50 inches. Alton Tatom in the Atwell community reported 1.45 inches. In the Rowden sector gauges showed from one to two inches.

Initial Report Made On Ominous Senate Bill 1

Following a report made by Superintendent of Cross Plains Schools Scot H. Edgington and review by the Board of Education concerning Senate Bill 1, and how Cross Plains School District may be affected.

Senate Bill No. 1, a school finance bill enacted by a Special Session of the 65th Texas Legislature in July of 1977, contains provisions which attempt to equalize gross inequities in school taxes across the state. S.B. 1 set up guidelines and procedures with which school tax offices and tax office personnel must comply and established the School Tax Assessment Practices Board which is charged with the responsibility of implementing the other tax provisions of the new law.

New requirements delineated in S.B. 1 must be met by all school districts in the state in order to maintain accredited status and to be eligible to receive state funds.

New requirements include such items as preparing and sending separate notices on each parcel of real estate owned by a taxpayer where the value has been increased as a result of reappraisal. Also, tax statements must identify property subject to taxation with a brief legal description of each tract or block and must indicate the appraised value and

assessed value of each tract or block. In addition, school tax assessor-collectors meeting required to attend schools designated and sponsored by the School Tax Assessment Practices Board which will culminate in tax assessor-collectors meeting requirements necessary to become certified assessors.

We feel that the tax provisions of S.B. 1 will have a major impact on our local tax office and will result in the necessity of making sizeable expenditures in order to comply with the law. We are currently reviewing our procedures, policies, methods of appraisal, and tax data collected in order to ascertain the best avenue of approach to the problems created by the legislation.

Since the problems are related to accreditation, and non-compliance could result in the termination of state funds, the Cross Plains School Board desires that the patrons of the school district be informed. As steps are taken to comply with the new law and more information become available we will endeavor to keep the public informed.

The School Board of the Cross Plains ISD is presently taking applications for the position of tax assessor-collector. Application forms are available in the superintendent's office.

Site Needed To House Cross Plains Library

A site for establishment of the Cross Plains Library is needed.

Mrs. Raymond DeBusk and Mrs. D. C. Lee toured several places Tuesday seeking a site to put the Cross Plains Public Library, which will be a branch of the Callahan County Library. The two charter members of the Library Committee, stated that they are looking for a permanent home for the library. They also said they will welcome suggestions and offers of sites.

Callahan County Commissioners Court recently voted \$250 in support of the local library after Mrs. DeBusk and Lyda Shults put the project before the county board. The two ladies expressed appreciation to the commissioners for the donation.

REPENTANCE

Repentance is a whole-hearted turning from sin to righteousness. It is a change of one's will. And the command to repent is a direct challenge to one's will power. It is brought about by godly sorrow, 2 Cor. 7:10. It results in a change of life — for better. Some vital changes occur. One's heart is changed by faith; one's life is changed by repentance; and one's relationship is changed by baptism.

Inasmuch as God has "commanded all men everywhere to repent," Acts 17:30; and Jesus said, "except ye repent, ye shall . . . perish," Lk. 13:3, is it not false to teach that one is saved by faith without further acts of obedience — by faith alone? That teaching excludes repentance, baptism and grace. Isn't it also false to teach that one is saved by grace alone? That teaching excludes faith, repentance and baptism. And wouldn't it be a false faith if it is based upon these false teachings? Can a false faith resulting from false teaching save?

MOTIVES TO REPENT

1. . . . The GOODNESS OF GOD leadeth thee to repentance," Rom. 2:4. God is so good that he promises salvation, through Jesus, to all who obey him." Heb. 5:8-9. True gratitude for the salvation God has provided in Christ will move sinners to repentance.
2. The HOPE OF REWARD is one of the strongest incentives to action. "Repent ye . . . and turn again, that your sins may be blotted out," Act 3:19 (ASV) And again, "Peter said unto them, repent, and be baptised everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins . . ." Acts 2:38. The promise of all the joys of the Lord in his kingdom in time, and everlasting joys in the world to come moves the sincere hearts to repentance.
3. FEAR OF PUNISHMENT is another strong motive that moves sinners to repent. "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that which he has done, whether it be good or bad. Knowing therefore the terror of the Lord we persuade men . . ." 2 Cor. 5:10-11.
4. GODLY SORROW is a strong motive that leads to repentance. "For godly sorrow worketh repentance unto salvation . . ." 2 Cor. 7:10. Regret is not repentance. But godly sorrow leads to repentance; then repentance leads to a changed life which issues in salvation.
5. LOVE FOR CHRIST leads one to repent. "If ye love me ye will keep my commandments" Jno. 14:15. Repentance is a plain command of Almighty God, a duty imposed upon all mankind. And all who truly love God and Christ will demonstrate their love by obeying this, and all other commandments of God and His Son. God will not save impenitent souls. The person who will not repent does not love God. He will be lost. The time to repent is NOW, in this life.

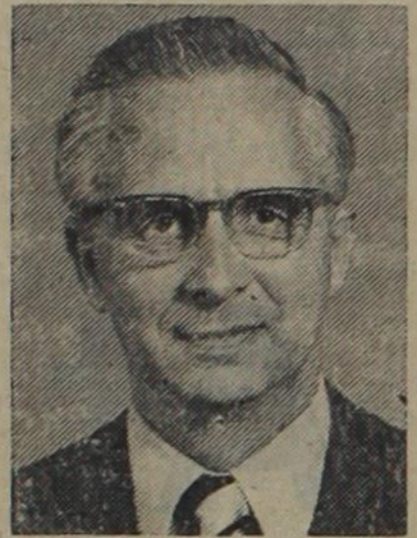

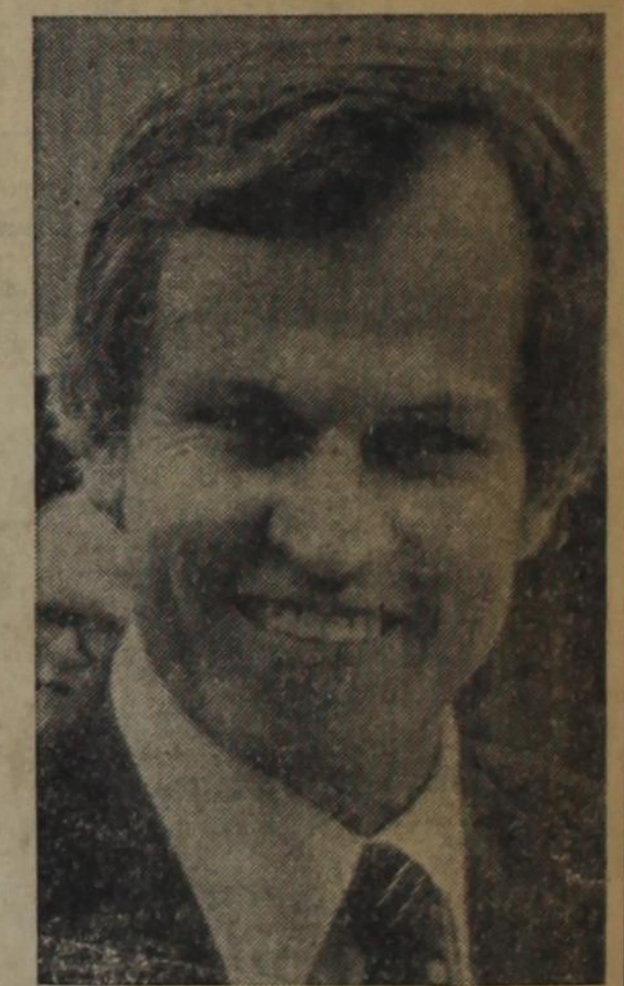

County Agent Urges Screwworm Check

Two cases of screwworms were confirmed in Coleman County recently. One of the cases was on the south end of the Callahan-Coleman County line, says Greg Gerngross, county agent at Baird.

We are asking producers to send in all cases of suspected screwworms, said Gerngross. Vials to send in samples are available from the County Extension Office in Courthouse in Baird or from most of the feed stores in Callahan County.

Normally dry weather hampers screwworm activity but several other cases of screwworms have been found in Texas during the past 10 days so it is very important that livestock producers doctor all wounds with fly spray and try to prevent them if at all possible, the agent stressed.

Effective casebearer control depends on proper timing and application of insecticides. Effective insecticides include, Guthion, Malathion, Thiodan, Seven and Zolone. Before using any of these materials, read the label directions then follow them carefully, Gerngross urged.

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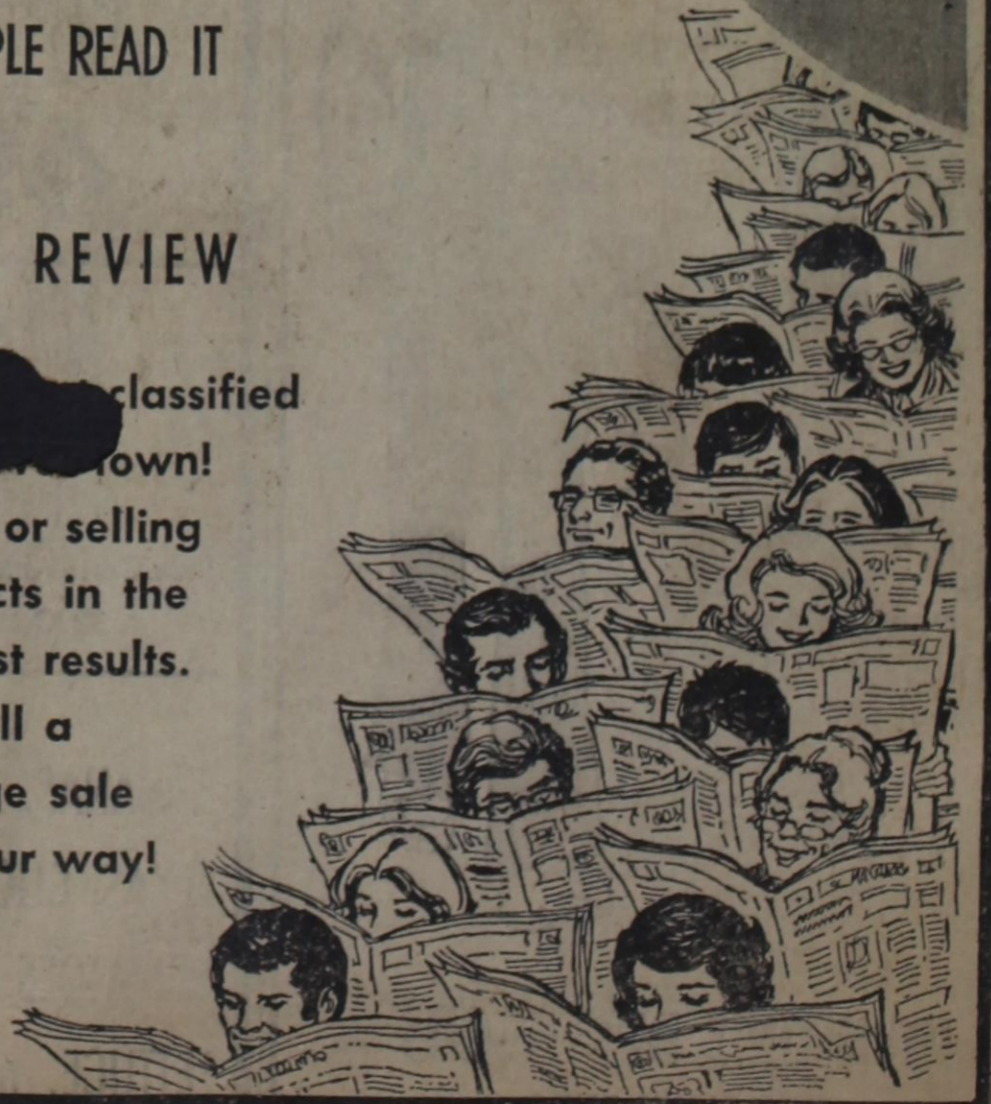

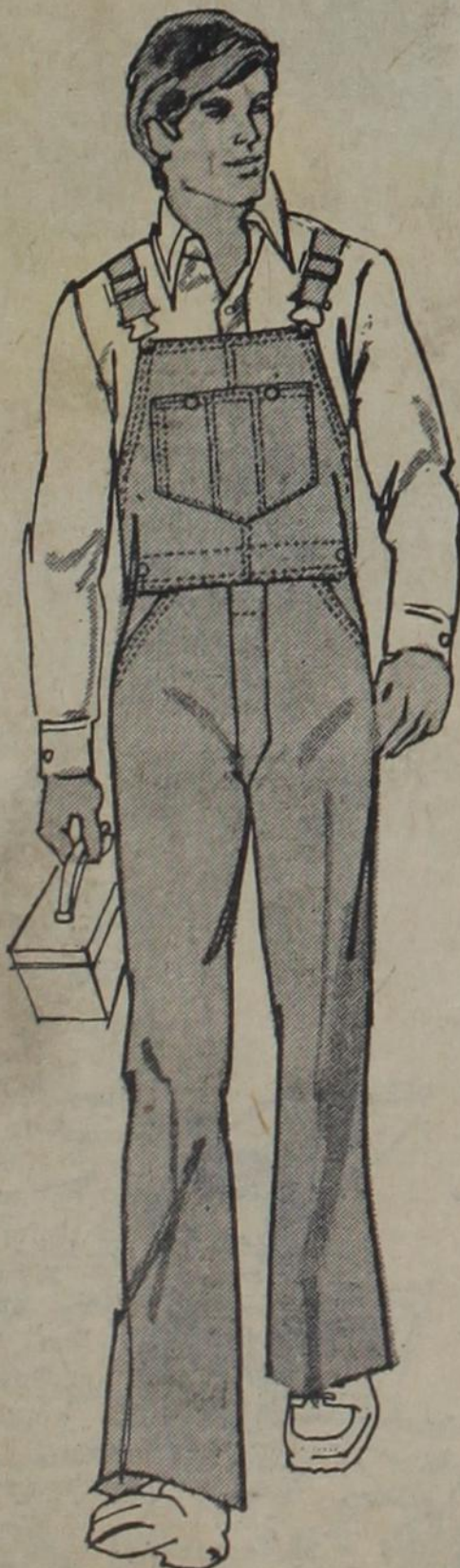
