

## Veteran Amherst Teacher Is Named Local Principal

Contract was signed Monday afternoon with Ray Womack of Amherst whereby he becomes principal of Cross Plains Elementary School.

Womack, 50-year-old veteran public school instructor, was one of four candidates interviewed by Cross Plains School Trustees last Thursday. The board voted to offer him a contract if his reference checked. Superintendent Scot H. Edgington was in Amherst Monday, and Womack accepted the contract which was offered.

The vacancy occurred several weeks ago when Richard Purvis resigned as local elementary principal, after serving in that capacity for one year, coming here from Junction.

Womack has been an elementary principal since 1970. He held that position for six years at Rotan, and for the past two years has been at Amherst. He is a veteran having served two years in the U. S. Navy. He began his teaching career at Hobbs as vocational agriculture teacher in 1953. In 1957 he moved to Rotan where he taught agriculture until becoming elementary principal.

He and his wife are members of the Church of Christ, and they expect to move here in the near future. They have three grown children.

Womack has a bachelor of science degree in vocational

agriculture certificate and master of education in vocational agriculture degrees, all from Texas Tech University. His all levels principal's certificate and all levels administration certificate were earned at Abilene Christian University.

## Area Begins Summer Months Hot And Dry

Wednesday is the beginning of Summer, and barring unexpected rain Tuesday night, the Cross Plains area will begin the three month season hot and dry.

## WTU Opposes Electric Use Controls In PUC Hearings

West Texas Utilities Co. has urged the Public Utility Commission of Texas not to adopt innovative utility rate structures or new electric use management controls until it is proven conclusively that benefits outweigh costs and that the customer will readily accept the changes.

In a statement prepared for hearings which began Monday June 12, in Austin, G. Holman King, a WTU vice-president, advised against rate concepts "which might be politically attractive in the short run but which would have disastrous effects on the public in the long run."

Specifically, King said WTU opposes widespread application of time-of-day pricing, mechanical load management techniques, and lifeline rates.

Time-of-day pricing would charge for electricity consumed during the hours when demands on an electric system's generating capacity is at its peak. By trimming the peak, a utility company could delay capital outlays for new power plants and benefit all customers.

Load management deals with non-pricing methods for changing the level or pattern of demand for electricity. It could involve devices which curtail operation of appliances such as water heaters and air-conditioners at certain times.

The so-called lifeline rates are designed theoretically to help the poor by providing at low cost the minimum amount of electricity necessary to maintain a modest quality of life.

King said WTU's position is that electric rates should be based on the cost of service to all customers, but that it should be recognized that costs of providing electricity vary widely among different classes of customers.

A reunion was held last year with about 400 Callahan County

pioneers registering. A gathering had not been held for the two years prior to the 1977 convention.

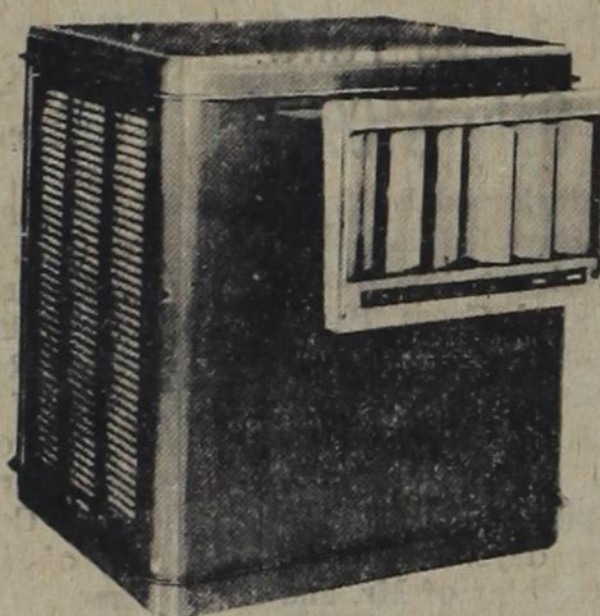

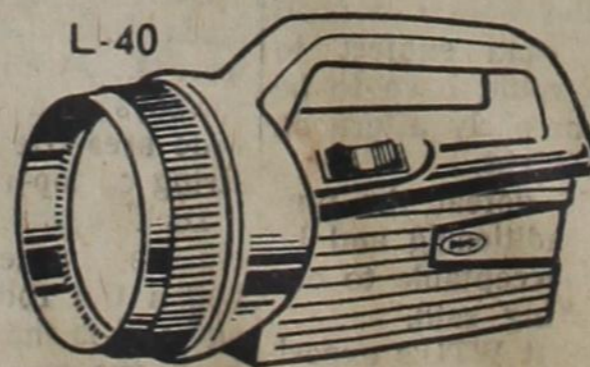

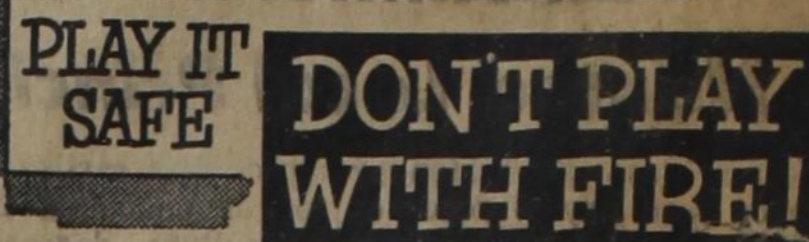

## Medicare Insurance Premium To Increase

Starting with July 1978, the basic premium for the medical insurance part of Medicare will increase to \$8.20 a month, up from the \$7.70 it has been since July 1977, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said today.

People who pay the premium directly will notice the increase in their bills. But, Hammons said, people who have the premium deducted from their social security check may not notice the change because of the 6.5 per cent, increase in their social security check as a result of the cost of living increase that goes into effect with July checks.

Some people pay a higher amount than the basic premium. This is because there was a period of 12 months or more that they were eligible for medical insurance but were not enrolled for this protection. The increase in the basic premium amounts to 10 per cent for each such 12-month period.

Even with this slight increase, medical insurance represents a real buy, Hammons said. This is because the people pay only about 30 per cent of the cost while the federal government pay the remaining 70 per cent from general revenues.

The basic premium will remain \$8.20 a month through June 1979.

## Home Health Agency Offers New Special Need Service

Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or an RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care".

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Home-maker Service a division of MBFA Foundation.

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-1 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.

This service also will benefit the patient who has been in the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a

beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

Persons may discuss this with has physician or they may call the West Central Texas Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number to call is (915) 677-2231 in Abilene or in the Cross Plains area Jackie Tucker, R.N. at (817) 629-8041 will be able to answer any questions regarding this service.

Mrs. Tucker indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the client's homes. She adds, "MBFA Foundation's motto is a 'Vision With A Task', and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation is privileged to serve."

## WTU OPPOSES CONTROLS

(Continued from Page 1.)

WTU statement recognizes "the severe economic squeeze being felt by the poor and by those on fixed incomes," but rejects lifeline rates as a method of relieving these problems.

"Our study in the City of Abilene in 1976, using U. S. Census Bureau data, block canvassing, real estate evaluation, and other information showed no consistent correlations between financial income and kilowatt hour usage."

King said the Crisis Intervention Program administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs worked reasonably well this past winter in identifying and assisting those who will real needs.

"We believe this approach to be far more cost effective and efficient than lifeline or other socially oriented utility rate forms. WTU endorses the idea that the poor need relief from rising utility bills, as well as other inflated living costs, but believes the better solution lies in the use of social agencies qualified to determine an individual's need and to act accordingly."

The hearings have been scheduled for nine days, and were requested by the Texas Legislature. A commission spokesman said the purpose is to "find rate structures which meet present-day conditions."

After considering the findings, the commission will issue recommendations to the legislature late this year.

King said WTU sees the main issue of the hearing as an effort to "determine how the rising cost of electric service will be assigned to each of the customer classes being served by each utility."

The primary question to be answered, he said, is, "Will it be public policy in Texas to allocate the cost burden as equitably as possible among our customers or will one class be given preferential treatment over the others?"
