

Showers Sunday Night Aid Outlook; Gauge 1.50 Inches

Thunder showers rumbled across the Cross Plains area Sunday night bringing smiles to virtually all residents.

The much needed moisture ranged from one to two inches. It greatly enhanced the outlook for small grain crops, and aided spring pastures. Much more moisture is badly needed for little runoff water was caught. Many earthen stock tanks are dry or dangerously low, and some wells are reportedly going dry.

Electrical power was off just over three hours in Cross Plains and much of the surrounding area Sunday night. The power failed about 8 p.m. Gene Rhodes, West Texas Utilities office manager, stated that a cross arm on a power pole northeast of Cottonwood burned off causing the outage. It was believed to be caused by lightning.

Top area rainfall was reported at the Gene Mauldin place in the Rowden community where

two inches were measured. The N. V. Gibbs place there gauged 1.50 inches. That amount was also reported in Cross Plains, at Sabanno by Jack Rector, and at Pioneer by W. O. Rachels. North of Cross Plains M. F. Dill had 1.20 inches.

R. T. Watson of near Burkett measured 1.75 inches, and Charlie Sowell, north of Cottonwood gauged 1.20 inches. Alton Taton and Nathan Foster both reported one inch at Atwell, and Ror Bagley in the Cross Cut sector also had an inch.

Cross Plains now has an operational emergency ambulance service. It made its first run last Sunday.

As a result of the March 27 Town Hall Meeting, hosted by Mayor O. B. Edmondson, an Ambulance Committee was formed with Jim Greener, Chief of Po-

lice, chairman. Other committee members are Councilman W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy, Sharon Watson, Mike McClure and Shirley Emmons who serves as assistant coordinator.

An operating budget was presented by the committee to the Cross Plains City Council which

unanimously approved the emergency ambulance operations for Cross Plains and surrounding areas.

It was stressed that the ambulance service will be operated on an emergency basis only. Twenty-four hour telephone service is available through the Cross Plains Police Department. The number to call is 725-6666 or 725-6114.

The ambulance, a gift from Higginbotham Bros. & Co., has been approved by state inspectors.

The service will be operated by volunteers and an intensive training program is beginning this month. It will consist of 40 hours training as an emergency care attendant. The course will be conducted in Cross Plains, and anyone interested in the program may contact either Greener or Mrs. Emmons.

Charles Jennings Stabbed In Incident Here Sunday

Two suspects have been arrested and charged in the Sunday afternoon stabbing of Charles Jennings, 19-year-old son of Mrs. Lorene Jennings of this city.

The senior at Cross Plains High School suffered two knife wounds, was bound and dumped over a fence in a pasture about 5½ miles southwest of Cross Plains estimated between 12:30 and 1 p.m. Sunday.

Hendrick Medical Center of officials stated late Tuesday afternoon that Jennings was in satisfactory condition. He was removed from intensive care Monday night and placed in Room C-504. He had been termed guarded to serious condition

soon after arrival in Abilene.

Charges of aggravated robbery, attempted murder and auto theft were filed against two men in 42nd District Court at Baird Monday.

Charged are Robert Steven Patterson, 25, of Windsor, Ontario, Canada, who had a current Portland, Ore., address, and Edward Salazar, 23, of Albuquerque, N. M. Cross Plains Justice of the Peace L. P. Mitchell set bonds totaling \$60,000 on the three counts against each suspect.

Jennings was reportedly dumped from his auto into a pasture on a country road off the old Coleman Highway. He was said to be bound, but freed himself sufficiently to get to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Renfro, about a quarter mile away.

The Renfros notified Dr. Carl J. Sohns in Cross Plains, who, in turn, notified L. D. Brown, local Callahan County Deputy Sheriff, who met the Renfros and Jennings upon arrival at the physician's office.

He quickly alerted area lawmen of the happening, describing Jennings' auto which was taken. A short time later Brown was notified that Butch Wampler, Department of Public Safety Trooper at Coleman, and Coleman Policeman David Jordan had the two suspects in custody. They made the arrest about three miles north of Coleman on State Highway 206.

The suspects were released to custody of Deputy Brown after rights were read by Coleman officials, and returned them to Cross Plains. Mitchell also read their rights and set the \$60,000 bonds.

A 1974 Buick Patterson and Salazar were supposedly driving was found in a lane west of the Oren Barr place off FM Road 2287. Bearing a Virginia registration, it was reportedly stolen in Florida.

Brown, who headed the investigation, stated that Jennings was stabbed in the back and side. One of the wounds reportedly punctured one of his lungs.

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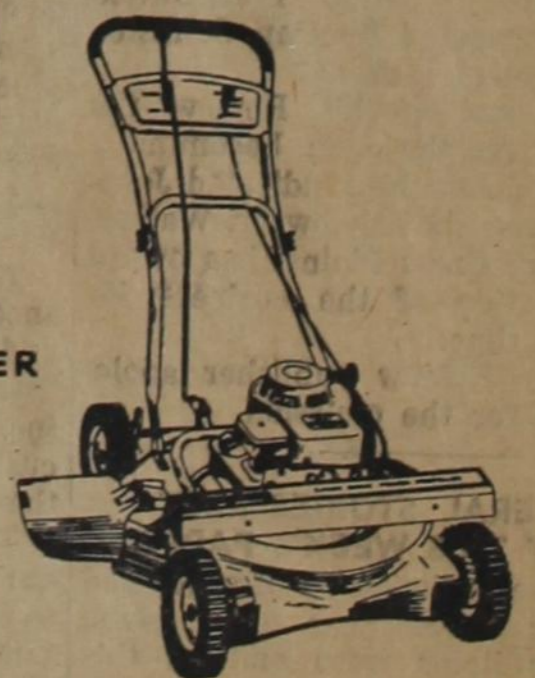

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS CHANGING AND FIXING THE SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES ON STATE 206 THROUGH THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS: PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS, That the speed limit for all motor vehicles on State 206 through the City of Cross Plains, Texas, shall be as follows:

From Fourth Street at Station 0+00 to Intersection of F.M. 880 at Station 43+82 and State 206 at Station 252+96, a distance of 0.830 miles—30 m.p.h.

From Station 252+96 back to the North City Limits at Station 242+94.15, a distance of 0.190 miles—45 m.p.h.

It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a motor vehicle through the City of Cross Plains at a speed greater than the limits set forth above.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and liable to a fine, and upon conviction shall be fined a sum of not less than Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every violation shall constitute a separate offense.

From South of Thirteenth Street at Station 30+12 to South of Sixteenth Street at Station 41+15, a distance of 0.209 miles, the speed of traffic shall not exceed twenty (20) miles per hour when flashing school speed limit sign beacons are in operation; thirty (30) miles per hour at all other times.

The rule requiring the reading of an Ordinance on three separate days is hereby suspended, and this Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication.

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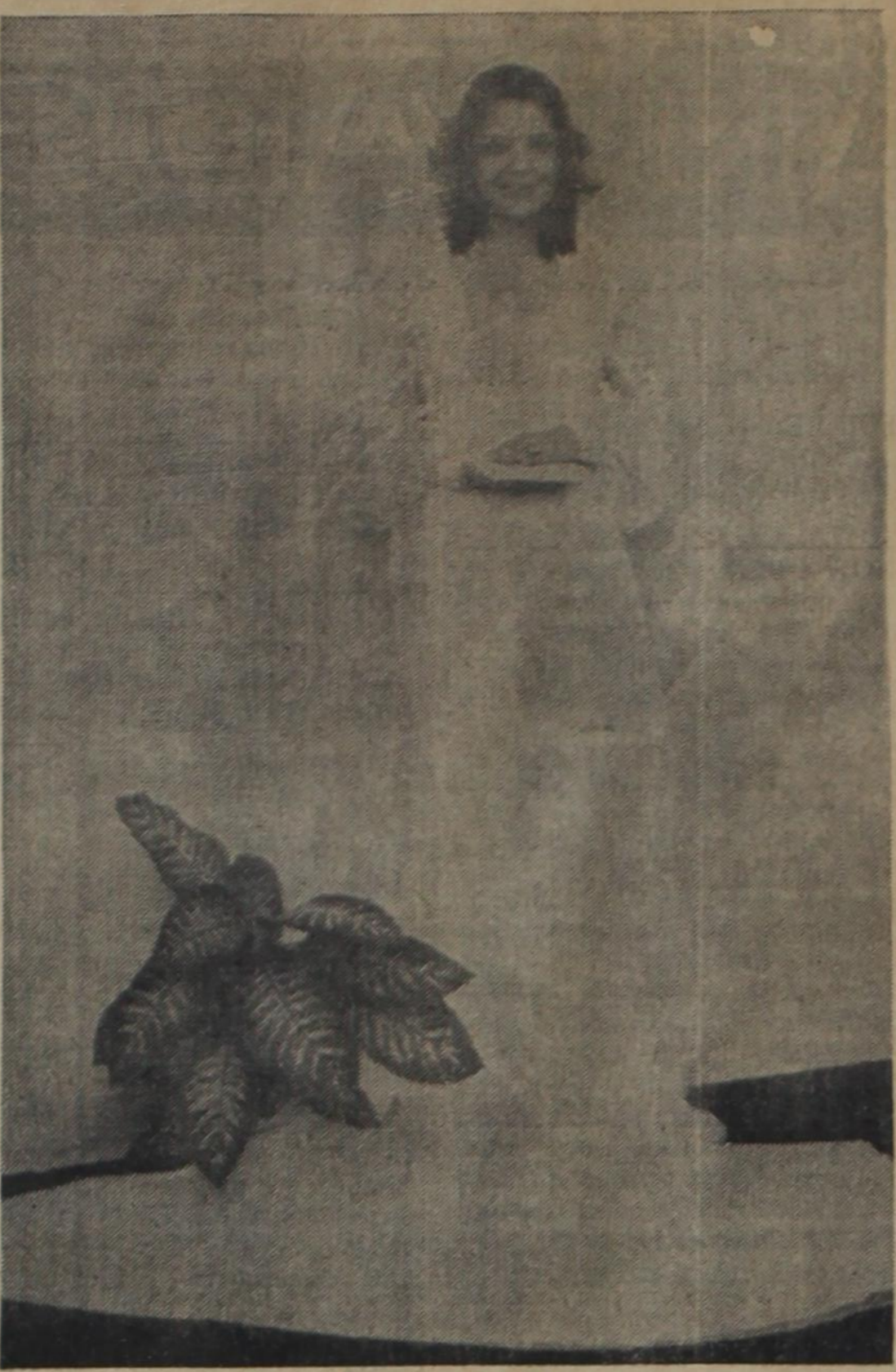

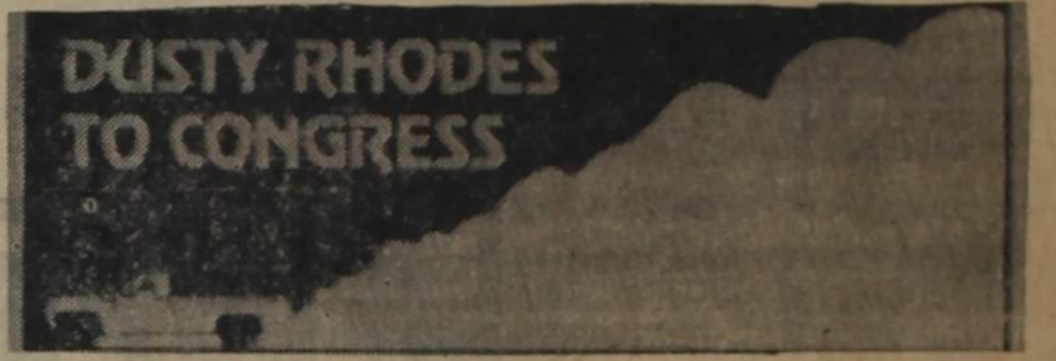
What's happened to it? Today, the Soviet Union has a larger army, stronger force of strategic weapons, more submarines, more tanks, more weapons than the United States.

Is the answer an arms race? No. The answer lies in a better use of our defense funds, in elimination of duplication in the armed services, in constant research to keep us militarily powerful. The scrapping of the B-1 bomber at a time when Russia is expanding its air power is just one instance of the dangers of an unrealistic military policy in our government.

Dusty Rhodes believes that the only way we can preserve our freedom and the freedom of our children is through a strong national defense. He is a member of the Military Affairs Committee of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce.

"I served during one war, as a Navy man for four years during the Korean conflict. I don't want my kids or my grandkids to fight another one. I am convinced that only a powerful national defense can deter the threat of global conflict in which there can be no winners," says Dusty.

And he'll fight to make sure our country has the military might to discourage unfriendly nations. As a lawyer who's used to having the cards stacked against him — and still win — as a man in whom the indomitable frontier spirit is still alive — Dusty is the kind of fighter we need in Congress.

THE NEW BIRTH . . .

There was a man of the Pharisees, named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews: The same came to Jesus by night, and said unto him, Rabbi, we know that thou art a teacher come from God: for no man can do these miracles that thou doest, except God be with him. Jesus answered and said unto him, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God. Nicodemus saith unto him, How can a man be born when he is old? can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born? Jesus answered, Verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. That which is born of flesh is flesh; and that which is born of Spirit is spirit. Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again." Jno. 3:1-7.

1 Cor. 4:15. James wrote, "of his own will begat he us with the word of truth" Jas. 1:18. Please read 1 Pet. 1:22-23 also. Thus it is plain to see that those born again were begotten by the Spirit, the word of the Spirit, the gospel. But what about the delivery? Here is where the water comes in. How is one born of water? We learn from Rom. 6:3-4 that those begotten by the Spirit were delivered from the water of baptism into the NEW LIFE. "Therefore we are buried with him (Christ) by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." V4. Notice, the new life begins when one is delivered from the water of baptism.

Water has no connection with the Christian religion as a necessary element, as in Jno. 3:5, except in baptism.

Yes, my friends, being born of water and of the Spirit is as essential to entering the kingdom or family of God as the natural birth to entering the family of man. The new birth is ONE birth of WATER and the SPIRIT, being begotten by the Spirit, the word of the Spirit and delivered from the water of baptism into the new life. The new birth is as simple as that.

Therefore, Jesus essentially said the same thing in Mk. 16:15-16 (please read) as in Jno. 3:3-5. Of the Christians at Corinth, who had been born again, it is said, "and many of the Corinthians hearing, believed, and were baptized." Acts 18:8. And every other case of conversion in the New Testament followed that same procedure.

Now, to teach that one is saved (the same as born again) and then is to be baptised later is a plain contradiction of Jesus' and the Apostles' teaching on the new birth. One's salvation is dependent upon being born again. Don't be misled on the subject by those who want to exclude water baptism from God's plan of redemption.

Nicodemus was a ruler of the Jews and obviously, like many today of whose doctrine we have been writing, had a false concept of the kingdom of God — that it was to be an earthly kingdom. Jesus, knowing what was in man, Jno. 2:24-25, knew his thinking and quickly informed him that he could not enter the kingdom (which is the church Mt. 16:18-19, the family of God, 1 Tim. 3:15) unless he was born again, born of water and of the Spirit.

Jesus declares that the "new birth" is as essential to entering the kingdom or family of God as the "natural birth" to entering the family of man. He also declares that to be born again (the new birth) is to be born of water and of the Spirit. It is also clear that Jesus here, speaking of the new birth, speaks of ONE birth of two elements — of water and of the Spirit.

There are TWO essential actions in a natural birth: the begetting and the delivery. Even so in the new birth. In the new birth one is begotten by the Spirit, the word of the Spirit. Paul to the church or family of God in Corinth, wrote, "I have begotten you by the gospel."

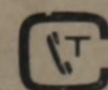
