Back Taxes Drive Is Begun By City

A drive to collect more than \$13,000 in delinquent property taxes has been undertaken by the Cross Plains City Council.

The decision to make the effort to recoup the back taxes was made about three weeks ago

by the council members. It was stated that the primary purpose of the drive is to clean up the tax rolls, cutting paper work. It was also noted that the money can also be used by the city, now facing major improvements

to the city-owned water system. It was explained that those who owe back taxes will be notified first by mail. City Secretary Nancy Wagner stated that she expected to mail the first of these toward the end of this week.

It was pointed out that some of the taxes on property run in arrears as long as 20 years. Councilmen explained that some owe just for one year, possibly a mix-up when property changed hands on which party was to pay the taxes.

The council stated that whatever steps are necessary to collect the delinquent taxes will be taken in time. No action is planned for 30 to 60 days after the first notification, to allow property owners time to make or arrange payments.

It was pointed out that the property owner will be liable for whatever costs are incurred in the collection process.

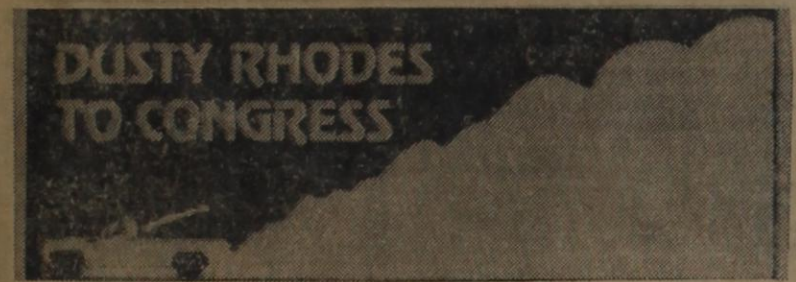
