



SATAN BOUND FOR A THOUSAND YEARS

We have already studied how this statement in Rev. 20:2 cannot be understood as "literal", but rather is a definite figure representing an indefinite period of time. Since God made Jesus both Lord (King or Ruler) and Christ, Acts 2:36, and he now reigns and will reign 'till he comes again, 1 Cor. 15:23-26, this is positive proof of the above statement for he has been reigning already almost two thousand years.

Jesus speaking of his conflict with Satan himself, said "No man can enter into the house of a strong man and spoil his good except he first bind the strong man," Mt. 12:29. Thus it is evident that when we find Jesus has entered the house of Satan and spoiled his goods or delivered his subjects that he must have bound Satan to do it.

In Heb. 2:14-15 we read, "Since then the children are sharers of the flesh and blood, he also himself in like manner partook of the same; that through death he might bring to nought him that had the power of death, that is the devil; and might deliver all them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage." And since Christ said to do this you must first bind the strong man it is evident that he did bind Satan and that the old devil is now bound.

But someone will refer to Peter's statement that the devil is as a "roaring lion going about seeking whom he may devour," 1 Pet. 5:8. But let us illustrate the binding of Satan this way: If I were to come up to your gate and see a vicious dog roaring and raging in the yard I would fear to enter. Then you came to the door and said, "He is tied," then I would see that if I walked up the path I would be safe from him. Roar though he would, he could not touch me if I stay in the path — off his territory. So with Satan. He is bound by the word of God that tells me of the victory of Christ over him. and assures me that God will not allow him to tempt me above what I am able to bear, but will make a way of escape of every temptation, 1 Cor. 10:13. As long as I stay off Satan's territory he cannot harm me, he is bound.

In what is known as the greatest battle between right and wrong, Jesus defeated the devil at every turn with "it is written", Mt. 4. God's word is the Christian's armour with which we may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil, Eph. 6:10-17. But of course when the word of God, the chain that binds Satan, is taken away — regardless of whether it be by neglect or by force, and men revel in Atheism, Satan is loosed to do his effective work upon the souls of men. Without the sword of the Spirit, the word of God, man becomes an easy prey to his adversary, the devil.


