Local Bank Deposits Reach New High At Quarter End

Deposits at Citizens Bank in Cross Plains have once again posted an all-time high.

At the close of business on March 31, end of the first quarter calendar year, the local financial institution held deposits totaling \$10,801,451.13. That figure represents an increase of more than \$300,000 over what the bank showed at the end of 1977. Citizens State Bank closed out business last year holding \$10,491,611.92 in deposits.

The upward swing in deposits is a continuation of gains posted each quarter, which has held true for the past few years. As a means of comparison, the bank here now holds almost twice as much money on deposit as it did five years ago. Records show that at the end of the first quarter in 1973, deposits amounted to \$5,884,661.25.

Jack W. Tunnell, Citizens State

Bank president, stated that he is truly grateful to the firm's customers for the loyal patronage and the trust placed with the bank. "We appreciate each customer," he stated.

"Just where the increase in deposits is coming from is difficult to pinpoint," Tunnell stated. He cited increased oil leasing and drilling activity and better prices on livestock as possibly aiding the increase. "Whatever the reason," Tunnell em-

In her five continuous years of service in the Criminal District Attorney's Office for Taylor and Callahan Counties, Pat Elliott saw that one of the most striking needs for the public is the speedy disposition of cases. Believing that the victims of crime are entitled to their day in court at the earliest possible time, Pat Elliott, when elected, will make the speedy adjudication of cases a top priority.

A native Texan, Pat Elliott has lived in Abilene for 22 years. After graduating from Cooper High School, she received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Government from Southern Methodist University. After receiving her Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from the University of Texas School of Law, where she was an Associate Editor of the Texas Law Review, Pat was admitted to the practice of law before the Texas Supreme Court in 1971. In 1972, she became an Assistant Criminal District Attorney for Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties. (In 1977, Jones County was removed from this district). In 1974, then Criminal District Attorney Ed Paynter promoted her to the position of First Assistant, in which capacity she served until January, 1978, when she resigned to seek the Democratic nomination for Criminal District Attorney. During her tenure as an assistant, Pat had, at one time or another, direct responsibility for almost every aspect of the office.

Pat is married to Jim Smart, also a former assistant Criminal District Attorney, now in private practice with the firm of Fergus

and Smart in Abilene. Both are amateur rockhounds. Her other interests include cooking, gardening, needlework and fishing. 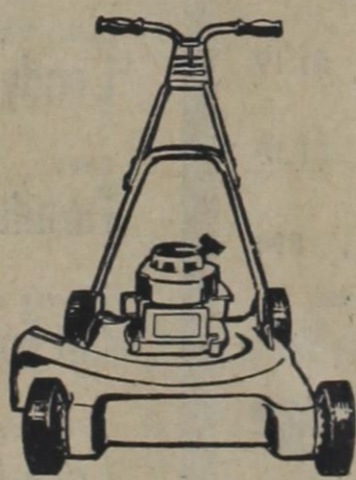

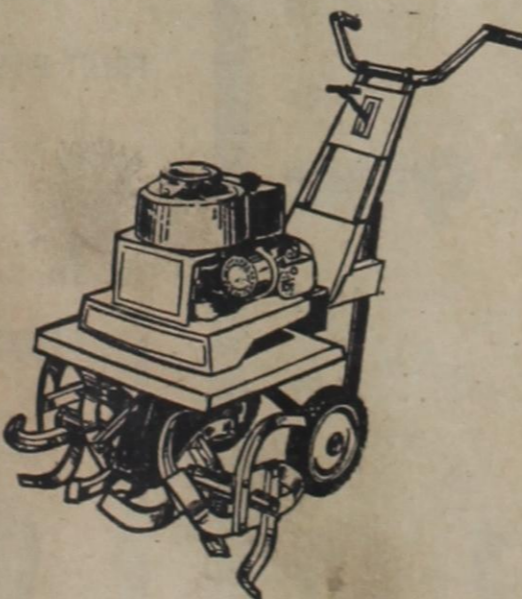

Former Deputy Now Investigator For DA

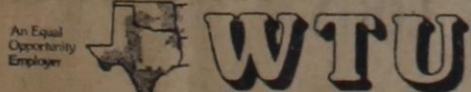
