





Three men facing criminal charges in Callahan County were sentenced to prison terms last Thursday aat Baird by 42nd District Judge Don Lane.

All three entered guilty pleas. Billy Joe McDaniel, 24, of San Angelo was handed a 25-year term in prison for the January 2 robbery of Ford Waggoner manager of the Northside Grocery in Clyde.

Two men who admitted beating and robbing Charles Jennings, 19, of Cross Plains received two sentences. Edward Salazar, 23, of Albuquerque, N.
