

**SOMETHING TO CHANGE.** Man sins. God calls upon man to repent. "(God) now commandeth all men everywhere to repent." Acts 17:30. Repentance is a change of mind that results in a change of life. It is a positive step in a new direction.

**SOMETHING TO CONFESS.** That Jesus Christ is the Son of God. "With the heart man believeth unto righteousness, with the mouth confession is made unto salvation," 1 Im. 10:10. This confession is the acknowledgement of the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

**SOMETHING TO OBEY, (BAPTISM).** One is baptized into Christ, Rom. 6:3; that baptism is a burial (immersion), 1 Pet. 3:21. Out of Christ one is lost, because "salvation is in Christ," 2 Tim. 2:10, but one is baptized into Christ.

**SOMETHING TO GAIN.** Forgiveness of sins, and the gift of the Holy Spirit, Acts 2:38; All spiritual blessings, Eph. 1:3; and the hope of living with God forever, 1 Pet. 1:3-6.

eral regulations for waste, for real need, and for the full consequences to the people.

Fike Godfrey believes there are too many bureaucratic chiefs in Washington who feel they can run our lives better than we can.

These people try to solve all our problems through wasteful spending of more tax money and by issuing more and more foolish and unneeded federal regulations. They succeed only in ballooning taxes and the size of government and furthered harrassing the people and thus continually forcing prices higher and raising the cost of living.

Two voting boxes are required at Clyde. Precinct 2 encompasses most of Clyde, the east and north part, while Box 8 takes in a portion of the western and southern part of the community.

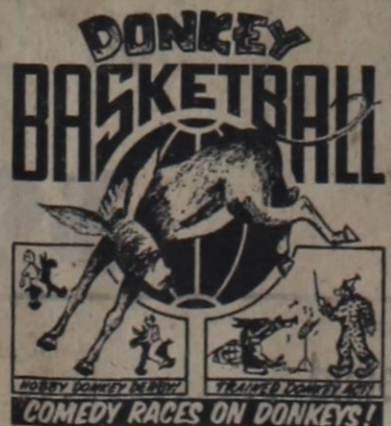
