

### Thousands of Bugs Destroyed Last Year by Following Instructions.

Death to thousands by potson last year was the result of the working of a comparatively small group of men who were relentless in their efforts to bring dispater to the objects of their fury, according to reports which also indicate that the number of "desperadoes" in this band will be substantially increased.

The general plan of uttack of this group indicates that the work was done in a methodical manner and was only carried out after careful study over a long period of time. They not only brought death to their victims but information from reliable sources has it that they collected thousands of dollars that otherwise would have gone to the poisoned.

"It is indeed fortunate," declared one of the leaders of the polsoners who is endeavoring to enlarge his band, "that our efforts were directed at the boll weevil instead of human beings for we accomplished success wherever instructions from our experts were followed and we wrought havec in the ranks of the insects in our recritory. Our operations are to be on a larger scale than over this year and every cotton farmer who enlists with us can rest assured that be will reap the same benefits provided conditions are normal.

"It will not be necessary for the farmers to notify us of their intention to join the crusade against the weevil, but for the sake of their own bank account they should apply calcium arsenate in dust form to weevil-infested cotton according to the instructions of the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers, which is an organization composed of scientists and experts of the United States Department of Agriculture and the state colleges of agriculture. Farmers also should adopt the siogan, More cotton to the sere, not more acres to cotton,' and apply intensive coltivation."

Boll weevil control experts of the Department of Agriculture say that it will pay to poison-

"If the weevils are really injuring your crop seriously and if your land is sufficiently fertile to yield at least one-third of a bale per acre with weevil injury eliminated.

"If your farming organization is such that you feel assured that the poison applications will be made at the right time and in the right man-

"If you are willing to spend the full amount accessary to provide an ade number supply of dusting machinery mill potson. The use of calcium arsenate to the

form of a dry powder in recommended and this should be applied only in dust form in late season applications.

"Calcium arsenute should his purchased to conform to the following specifications: Not less than 40 per cent total arsenic pentoxid; not more than 0.75 per cent water somille arseple pentoxid, and density not less than 80 or more than 100 cubic inches to the pound."

The only case in which the experts recommend a deviation from the rule of using only the dusting method is in pre-square treatment of cotton. Then, they say, antisfactory results may be obtained either by dusting or by the application of home-mixed moinss-acalcium-arsenate mixture. This mixture usually contains one pound of calclum arsenate, one guilon of molasses and one gallon of water. With extremely heavy infestation and frequent rains, a stronger and more expensive mixture of two pounds of calcium arsernite, one gallon of table sirup and one-half gallon of water may obtain quicker killing and better control.

In strup mixtures the strup should always be sweet or unfermented and the mixture should be applied within twenty-four hours after mixing. The usual application required is about one gallon per acre and it is applied by using a homeunds mop to sprinkle a few drops into the tip of the plant,

When the dusting method is used in the pre-square stage the calcium arsenate should be applied either by machine or the dust may be shaken from a bag with equal effectiveness while weevils are feeding in the tips of the plants. The bag treatment is not effective on large, fruiting cotton.

Further information on boll weevil control can be obtained from the county agent or the state college of agri-

More than 85 per cent of the United States corn crop is fed to live stock and somewhat less than 10 per cent is used for human food, according to recent data compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture. ### Good Start for Lambs

Lambing time is harvest time. Provide a dry place for the ewes that are to lamb and be on hand to see that each lamb is dried and that it suckles as soon as possible after birth. If a lamb gets a good start immediately after birth it requires but little more attention.
