

"The Happy Isles" Is a name often given nowadays to American Samoa, and it seems well applied. And apparently Uncle Sam deserves a lot of credit for their happiness. On the other hand, the Americans of Samoa evidently deserve happiness. It's one place where the "White Man's Burden" ts a light loud. And the white man's way of carrying the burden is certainly interesting.

The Samoan falands number fourteen and were named Navigators' islands by Bougainville, who discovered them in 1768. They are the peaks of submerged extinct volcanoes. They He about 2,000 miles south of Hawaii. The three largest are Savall, 660 square miles; Opolu, 340, and Tutulla, 54. The latter, with a few smaller adjacent Islands, constitutes American Samon. There is tropical vegetation and corni reefs. "Every prospect pleases and only man is vils"-and he's a pretty good sort, being a Polynesian largely as nature made him.

The United States gained the harbor of Page Page on Tutulia in 1878 by treaty for a coaling and naval station. In 1880 an American, British and German conference at Beriin gave Samon the status of neutral territory with native laws and customs. In 1890 the kingship was abolished and Great Britsin and Germany ceded Tutula to the United States, Great Britain withdrawing from the Islands. The modern census originated in Sweden, England and the United States. In 1746 the Swedish Academy of Sciences dreamed the clover to commite statis-

Washington - President Coolidge has been assured by Republican leaders in the House who conferred with him at a dinner at the White House recently that an agricultural relief measure and a resolution providing a 25 per cent cut in taxes this year, would be passed by the House before it adjourned in June.

The President particularly emphawined the necessity of both the tax reduction of 25 per cent and relief for the farmers, it was stated after the meeting. He did not tell leaders whether he would veto a bonus bill. or a tax reduction measure if the latter is drawn along the lines of that already passed by the House.

The President agreed with the proposal to adjourn Congress the first week in June, which Representative Longworth assured him the House was preparing to do. Under no circumstance will an extra session of Congress be called, Longworth said after the meeting.

The leaders laid before the President the program which they have formulated for the rest of the season, which includes besides the tax reduction resolution and agricultural relief, the appropriation bills, an immigration measure, a constitutional amendment abolishing child labor, and a bill providing \$10,000,000 relief for German children, which will be brought up immediately.

Representative Madden of Illinois. chairman of the appropriations committee, laid a detailed report before the President of the various appropriation bills to be presented, showing that a saving of \$25,000 000 under the estimate would be effected.

Those at the conference were of the opinion that the Senate should be able to pass a tax measure before adjournment in June, which Senator Smoot has said was practically impossible:

There is absolutely no reason why the Senate couldn't pass a tax reduction bill," Longworth said after the conference. "I can't see why Congress can't go before the country with a tax bill that reduces the poor man's taxes 50 per cent and the rich man's 25, as provided in the measure passed in the House."

QUALIFY RECEIVERS FOR TEAPOT DOME

Blake Ken-The receivers were appointed by Judge Kennedy on March 13, when the special Government counsel instituted proceedings here as their first step in an effort to invalidate the lease of Teapot Dome by former Secretary Pall

Under orders of Judge Kennedy, the receivers shall operate all the producing wells now operating in Teaput Dome; all the latest approved methods of business shall be used; no new wells must be drilled in the district except those absolutely necessary as offset wells and these to

of the oil fields.

The receivers shall not do any exploiting of the field, under the court orders, and all moneys collected from the operation of the company or its subniciary companies affected by the terms of the injunction granted sariler in the month shall be deposited in a bank to be selected and approved later by the court. All expenses of the receivership shall be paid from the money thus obtained, Judge Kennedy informed the receivers, and should the cash balance from the operation of the field become too large the surplus shall be invested in Government bonds. These bonds will be placed in trust pending the outcome of the litigation.

Justice Brandels Being Consideres for Second Place on Ticket.

Washington-Definite plans for a third party movement have been disclosed here by friends of Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin.

Supporters of the Wisconain Senator, who is confined to his home by Hineas, said he had indicated a wil-Huguess to head an "independent" ticket in the event the Republican convention nominates President Coolidge and adopts what he may consider to be a reactionary or ultraconservative platform.

So far has the movement proceeded that investigation already has been concluded in the different States to ascertain feasible methods for placing a third party ticket, headed by La Follette, upon the ballots next November.

Those behind the movement are now looking for a running mate for the Wisconsin Senator and their choice seems to be Associate Justice Brandels of the United States Supreme Court The fact that Democrats are under discussion for the second place is pointed to as indicating the ponpartisan character of the movement. The name of Jo-sephus Duniels, former Secretary of the Navy, also has been urged for second place.

Those prominent in the third party movement assert, however, that it will not draw especially upon anyone of the old parties, but will obtain strength from both, and will find support particularly among the farmer-labor and all other "progressive"

doll to come back to America with me of his own free will," said Blood. "As long as Hergdoll was in Germany, the anti-German feelings in

the legion would be strengthened and would count in American politics. Therefore if a plan could be worked out by which Bergdail could be brought back to America it would help everybody."

Blood said he was violating no confidence in giving a summary of the terms made to Hargdoll.

"Here it is," said Blood. "Bergdoll must come back. He must serve his sentence. The American Legion is not so much interested in Bergdoll as in the men who helped him escape from America. Let's bring Bergdoll back and have him make a clean broast and tell who the enemies in our own camp are. Then let him do his bit in prison. After that give ulm his money and let him go his Way.


