





Paris.-By virtue of the medical science, Louis Danval, convict, has won a 45-year fight for freedom and cleared himself of the accusation that he killed his wife.

In 1878 doctors, performing an antopsy on the dead body of Mme Dan val, discovered arsenic. Danval was a druggist. The conclusion was obvious. Protesting innocence, he was sent to prison.

But beyond the prison walls scientists were making swift progress in knowledge of the human machine. They had discovered that araenic exists in the body of every normal human being:

Meanwhile Danval had appealed his sentence.

Recently Judges of the high Court of Appeals pored over musty documents of the old conviction and received the testimony of five scientists. The acientists declared that the two milligrams of arsenic found in the woman's bedy was not sufficient to cause death. Danval's release was ordered. The court an nuled the decree of 1878 and granted the prisoner an indemnity of 20,000 france and annual pension of 12,000 france to compensate for his years in prison.

#### GARNER PLANNING **NEW TAX MEASURE**

Levy on Stock Dividends Said to Se Embraced in Texans's Program.

Washington -- Democrats are going to force the tax fight on the floor of the House before the administration bill, now heing carefully planned. completes its tedious way through the House Ways and Means Committee.

This is revealed in the announcement of Representative Isck Gurner of Texas, ranking Democratic member of the committee that he will introduce a tax measure of his own after the House reconvenes.

Declining to discuss the details of the measure, which he is now proparing, he said it will provide \$500. 000 000 in new taxes, to be distributed upon "those who can best bear the hurden," and will allow tax reductions of \$270,000,000.

When a bonus is passed, and the administrative leaders prepare to call off their tax program, in accordance with the opinion expressed by Secretary Mellon that both can not be enacted. Mr Garner will then lay his tax measure before the House which is not dependent upon shelving the honus. This is th plan now being contrived.


