

Directions for Proper Painting of Surfaces

Following are directions for painting inexpensive woods or finished surfaces that sare unattractive, either painted, varnished or shellacked.

Materials: Tube of bigh grade oil color, shade desired. Flat paint (a specially prepared no-gloss surfacer). Turpentine, Varnish, high or semigloss, as preferred. No. 0 and No. 1-0 or No. 2-0 sandpaper.

Method of treatment: Cleanse the article thoroughly with a weak solution of washing sods or ammonla water. Rinse with clean water. Allow it to dry, then cub to a smooth finish with steel wool or No. 0 sandpaper. Dust off. Now, go over the entire surface, top, sides and legs with that paint. When thoroughly dry, ascally in about 10 hours, rub with No. 1-0 or No. 2-0 sandpaper until the serface becomes semistick. Dust off and upply a second cont. When dry, sandpaper again. Now for the final or finishing coat. Suppose we choose a French gray-Chinese blue combination. Thin a tube of Chinese blue oil color with turpentine to the consistency of cream. Add to it a little. of the French gray background color, thereby giving an opacity to the Chinese blue and requiring only one cont of this shude. Too much background color, however, will take away the depth of shade

If stencils or uscalcomania are to be used, they should be applied before varplahing. The same kind of paint used for the body should be used for stenciling. A smooth, shipy surface is nest and finished in appearance and is easy to keep clean.

MACHINE TO MEASURE HIDES

U. S. Issues Guide Book on Owning Your Homa

A guide book designed for the prospective small-home owner was issued recently by the United States government, the Department of Commerce, Washington, announcing the publication of a hundbook setting forth details which assert the stops necessary to acquiring such property.

This aid to home builders is a pub-Heation entitled, "How to Own Your

Particular stress is placed by the handbook on the agreements which should be definitely entered into with regard to financing, building and purchasing. The points which should be ciently defined are emphasized,

While conceding that the great majority of individuals and companies with which the home seekers deal are bonest and wish to do business honorably, the handbook insists that "no good business man should object to baying his obligations, as he understands them, set down in writing and in accordance with legal procedure."

As for the financing of home building, the handbook gives sound infor-

"Borrowing money to buy a home is no disgrace," it declares, "On the contracy, it is normal and in many ways desirable. Many families in meeting payments on a loan have learned the habit of saving, and have continued it as a step toward financial indo-

pendence. It is desirable, the book points out, for a family about to buy a home to passess a minimum of 30 per cent of the value of the house in cash, even though arrangements are often made for a purchase with a honer amount. The advantage of a larger cash payment is found in the fact that it helps to insure a loan at a low rate of interest and one that can be paid off comfortably.

The placing of these things is of the utmost importance. Some garden orunments serve as accents and others as elimaxes. Sun-dials and bird-baths, and sometimes furniture, fall into the intter class and should accordingly be set at the ends of paths or open spaces where they will end a vista. That is not an unbreakable rule, however; for the intersection of two paths is very often the ideal location for a sun-dial or a bird-bath, or they may be nicely used to mark the center of an open space in the garden. Their decorativa value in the garden scheme must be sufficiently emphasized so that they will not seem an incidental azd hephazard ornamental detail. A small bit of ornament, like a sun-dial or bird-bath, may seem rather ridiculous If it is set in a large open space. It is absolutely necessary that it should fit into the scale of its surroundings.

> Tens of thousands of persons marched silently past the bier to take a last look upon the face of the man who led the Communist revolution which turned topsy turvy the lives of the people of a nation of 130,000,000 and left its mark in nearly every corner of the globe Some of those in the continuous stream passing by the casket perhaps had followed and leved Lenin, while others must have hated him, but there was almost dead silence and solemnity in the great hall, and there seemed to be prevalent more of the element of respect for the dead than of curlosity.

> From early morning, when lines of soldiers with fixed bayonets, and hordes of policemen established a cordon along the streets through which the body of Lenin was to pass on its way from the railway station to the House of Unions, the crowds waited in the snowy zero weather behind these human bar-

37 DEAD IN BLAST IN ILLINOIS COLLIERY

ignition of Gas in Old Working Caused Explosion is Bellef.

Johnston City, Ill. - Thirty-seren men are dead, six seriously injured and badly burned, while eight others suffered burns about the head and body in a mysterious explosion in the east side colliery of the Crerar-

Clinch Company's Friday afternoon. Fifteen who were trapped with the dead and injured in the mine were carried out by rescuers with barely a stitch of clothing upon their bodies and all the hair burned from their bodies, but excepting for their terrible experience, not otherwise burt. When the explosion occurred there were 375 men in the

Hundreds of men volunteered to go down into the mine when four Johnston City physicians stepped forward and announced their futontien of braving the poisonous guess of inner recesses of the mine where the men were trapped.

The men near the entrances oscaped easily, but entries No. 9, 10, Il and I2, locked in the depths of the colliery where the actual explosion took place were fatherest from a means of escape and the men there suffered the full terror of the terriffic blast.

Walting in the cold outside the to the regents and Legislature. mine shaft relatives and workers were completely enveloped by the dense black smoke which turned their faces black as night. Ambu lances from Herrin and Johnston City were lined up as each figure borne on a stretcher was brought up out of the smoke shaft by means of an elevator. The waiting crowds pushed forward fearful that some relative might be borne out to them.

Among the dead were Herbert Me-Cullough, mine manager, and Jessa Ford, mine boss.

The silence of the night was broken by the wild shrick of wives and mothers of the dead men. Organisations rushed hundreds of sandwiches and gallons of coffee to the mine and distributed it freely among the women and children workers who have stood vigil since the explosion

Accidental ignition of gas in an old working of the mine caused the explosion.

Most of the dead were killed outright by the explosion, which was terrific within the two workings af-
