






****************************** Device Called Upon to Detect Balance

Detecting the unbalanced portion of any revolving mass, such as a flying wheel of an engine or a dynamo armature, is declared a simple matter by the inventor of a device that is called a "bulance detector." The theory of the instrument is based on the principle that any revolving body or disk, perfectly balanced and loosely supported on its axis, will, when revolving, seek its own course of revolution and rotate steadily, irrespective of the course of its axis.

The device consists essentially of a Detecting the unbalanced portion of

the of the course of its axis.

The device consists essentially of a case or housing. Through this runs an axie, universally supported, on which is a rotating disk. The hearing member protrudes from the casing, and when testing, is placed against the end of the shaft of the place of machinery in question. This is allowed to rotate until it has attained

the maximum speed of the shaft. In the casting is a pointer which shows the trend of the motion, greatly exag-gerated. The machine is then stopped with the device still connected, and pointer will then show the side out of balance.

That the importation of foreign flower bulbs has reached a point where they are now available at little cost was pointed out by Joseph C. Maloney, president of the Joseph C. Maloney company, subdividers of De-

The United State Department of Agriculture has limited the importa-tion of narcissus bulbs for 1927 to small quantities of new varieties," said Mr. Maloney. "The reason given by the department was that in 1926 alone 42,000,000 bulbs were imported. alone 42,000,000 bulbs were imported. This included 500 varieties, but the bulk of the shipments were made up of about twenty of the most used commercial varieties. This heavy importation with the previous known plantings is sufficient for all propagation needs.

Haroid's army was exhausted by battle with an earlier invader, King Harold Hardrada of Norway, and the issue of Hastings very likely would have been different.

The duke of Normandy based his claim to England's throne upon a promise said to have been made by King Edward the confessor. To bolster this claim Duke William in 1065 imprisoned Earl Harold, who was visiting Normandy, and compelled him to swear he would support William's claim. In 1066 King Edward died and all England turned to Harold as next in right of succession, Harold renounced the oath taken under duress and accepted.

Throughout the summer of that year Dake William prepared for war. The pope recognized his right, so knights throughout Christendom joined the Norman's party. An army of 50,000 knights and 10,000 inferior soldlers was gathered on the banks of the Dive river and a great fleet of vessels was assembled for the Invasion of England.

King Hareld on his side likewise made vast preparations for war. Both the English fleet and the English army were ready to repelt invasion when news arrived that King Harold Hardrada, excited to the effort by Earl Testig, renegade brother of Harold, had landed an army in York-shire. The English forces hastened thither and in a great battle at Stamford bridge destroyed King Hardrada and the flower of his nobility.

In the meantine William of Normandy, unaware of developments in England, was chafing under a delay occasioned by a northeast wind which held his fleet in port, When the wind did veer to the west, the fleet set sail and encountered a fierce gale chaet drove them back upon the French coast, Many ships were lost and many men drowned, but this new delay only served to allow time for the diversion of the English army to Yorkshire.




