WORK TO START ON SCHOOL BUILDINGS

As stated in the Review last week, the contract for the new school buildings here was let to Tip Ross, for \$59,600, and the construction work will start at once. According to contract the building will be completed by Sept. 1st, and the new fixtures and equipment will be installed and put in readiness for the next school term. The contract calls for two buildings, a High School building, with eight class rooms, large study hall, library, Supt. office, principals office, toilets dressing room and shower bath, with an auditorium 50x74 feet on second floor. The other section of the building will be only one story high. The elementary building will be 132 feet long and 94 feet wide with 12 class rooms, principal's office, book room, toilets etc. Both buildings will be modern in every detail, and it is understood that about \$10,000 of new equipment and fixtures

will be added to what we have in the old building. The old building will be torn down and the brick will be used as far as advisable, in the new structures, it is stated. The new buildings will be of brick on concrete base.

When completed, Cross Plains will have one of the most modern school plants in this section of the state, and one every citizen will be justly proud of.

One of the biggest finds in the history of the Cross Plains fields was recorded this week, when the P. O. & G. Company and Mook Texas Oil Co. both completed their wells on the T. E. Baum lease, six miles west of town, for 200 and 200 barrels natural, respectfully. The P. O. & G. Co.'s well had been making ten barrels at 1673 feet and it was drilled 14 feet deeper when the new production was found. The Mook Texas Oil Co.'s well was also making ten barrels and it was drilled nine feet deeper to 200 barrel production. These wells are 3-4 of a mile Northeast of the recent discovery on the Edwards lease. This new field will come in for a big play when operations open up again on a stronger market. These new wells are among the most important ever discovered in this entire section. M. E. Wakefield topped the sand at 1615 feet on his Webb well and is still in the sand at 1695, with some oil showing. He will give it a shot.

Shaw & Rothke on the Miller lease are drilling at 770 on No. 1; 720 on No. 2; and spudding on No. 3.

The Navarro Oil Co. are spudding on their Bennett-Booth No. 1 and Brown & Co. are spudding on their No. 2 on same lease.

Brannon and Murry have skidded rig and started new hole on their Bennett-Booth No. 1. They lost the first hole.

Milham Oil Corporation on the Warren Wildcat Northwest are underreaming at 1590 and are shut down on J. A. Barr at about 2100.

In the Cross Cut section, the Florence Oil Co. missed pay on their Newton No. 3. The Valley Oil Co.'s Teston No. 5 is on sand, showing for nice well at 1200 feet.

The Title Oil Co. are spudding two new wells on the north Arledge lease. P. O. & G. are drilling at 500 feet on their east Westerman.

Gilman, Rot, Rhoddes & McMurry on Teston No. 15 are drilling at 1185.

TRAIN SCHEDULE IS CHANGED BY KATY

The train schedule has been changed by the Katy on their branch line here, running from De Leon to Cross Plains. According to the new schedule, as reported the train will arrive in Cross Plains at 4:30, and return to De Leon at 6:30 p. m., and is due to arrive in De Leon at 9:30. The new arrangement changes the division point to De Leon. It is stated that the change in schedule will give Cross Plains better train service for mail dispatch as well as freight. It is hoped so.

Elaborate preparations are being made for the big Chamber of Commerce banquet to be held here to-night (Thursday). Prominent speakers will be on the program. The Parent-Teachers Association provide and serve the eats and a big feed is anticipated. A detailed report will be given next week in the Review.

ELECTION NOTICE

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF CALLAHAN
CITY OF CROSS PLAINS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS, that an election be held on the 12th day of April 1927, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Cross Plains, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Cross Plains, in the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) to become due and payable serially within any given number of years, not to exceed forty years, within the discretion of the City Council, and to bear at a rate not to exceed six per centum (6) per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the roads, bridges, and streets, of such city within its limits and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity, under authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

The said election shall be held at Orrell-Dodson Chevrolet Co., in the City of Cross Plains, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:

P. SMITH, Presiding Judge.
V. V. HART, Assistant Judge.
MRS. W. R. WAGNER, Clerk.
MRS. W. A. WILLIAMS, Clerk.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the constitution and laws of the state of Texas and none but resident qualified property taxpaying voters of the City of Cross Plains, Texas, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$30,000 OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE ROADS, BRIDGES AND STREETS OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS WITHIN ITS LIMITS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX", and those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$30,000 BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE ROADS, BRIDGES AND STREETS OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS WITHIN ITS LIMITS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX"

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of the City of Cross Plains, and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause notices of the election to be posted at three public places in the City of Cross Plains one of which shall be at the Orrell Dodson Chevrolet Co. the place herein designated for holding said election for at least thirty days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in the Cross Plains Review, a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Cross Plains, and which notice shall be published once each week for five weeks, the date of first publication being not less than thirty days prior to the date of the election.

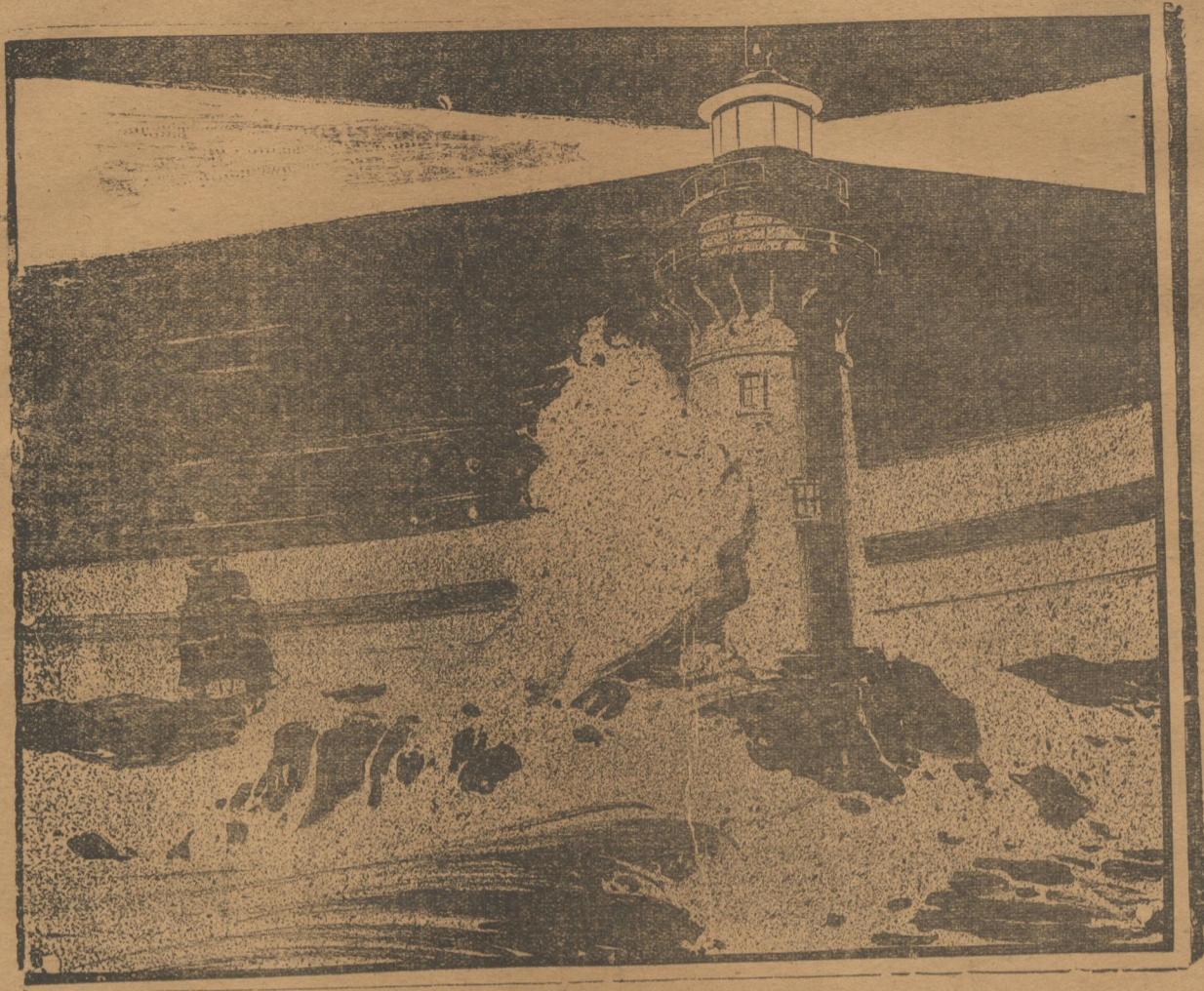

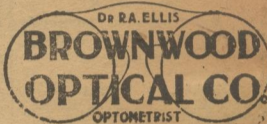

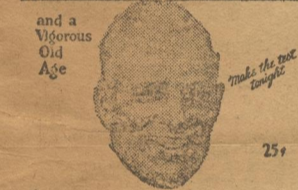

Meetings of the club according to Miss Eagen are held every Tuesday.

The girls who have already joined the club range in age from 17 to 25, Miss Eagen said.

"Promiscuous petting", Miss Eagen explained is absolutely no good. But if we say to prospective members of the club let's go back to the old days of ten years ago' not many would sign up. But when we say petting is getting so common, that drinking among girls is getting to be a cheap thrill and that smoking is all out of date, that to abstain from these is the modern and smart thing to do, then we get members.

Miss Eagen admits she has smoked but says she does not think it good for young girls to do so.

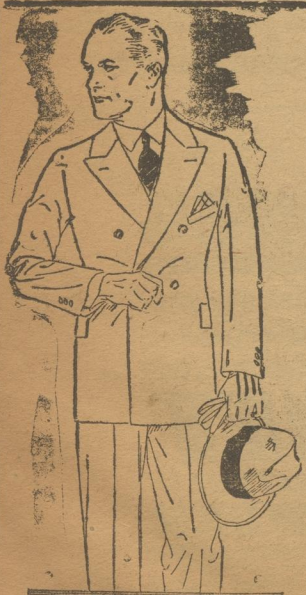
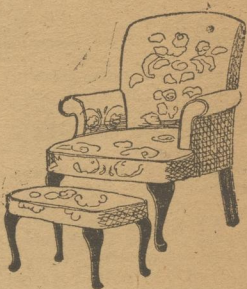
