### TO DRILL MCGRAW PLACE

Eugene W. Miller, who returned here the first of the week from Youngstown, Penn., reports the organization of the Youngstown Oil Co., capitalization \$250,000, for the purpose of drilling a well on the McGraw place three miles west of town. The company has other holdings in Callahan and Eastland Counties. None of the stock is for sale, Mr. Miller stating that all the stock was held by Youngstown parties, except what he has. The company is under contract to be drilled by Jan. 1. Mr. Miller says that the casing and tools are now ready to be shipped and that the rig material will be bought here. 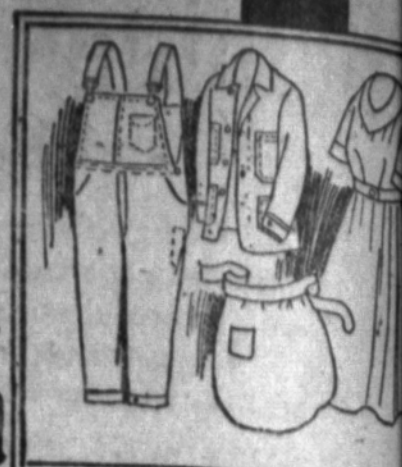
