

### Brick Veneering Held as Good Construction

as Good Construction Brick veneer, perhaps, classifies as neither fish, fowl nor good red her-ring. Nevertheless it is considered sound construction and its practice-bility has been demonstrated in many cears of satisfactory use, But strict ly speaking, a brick veneer exterior finish is a shell-a shell of brick pro-tecting some form of backing, such as wood sheathing, mineral sheathing, concrete or other material. The major purpose of a brick re-feer exterior is six carry out the archi-tectural design of the structure. In fiself, brick veneer is without struc-ural strength. It is laid up over one of the standard bases, generally in what is known as a "running bond." Around the lower "course" or any mail projecting cornice, the bricks are alkely to be laid in what is known as a "soldier course." In this course the bricks are stood on end, with the partow length exposed, like so many soldiers in a stiff row.
