Eliminate Anaplasmosis Threat Agent Advises

Anaplasmosis continues to cause more than \$100 million in losses to the nation's cattle industry each year, and blood surveys have shown that about 16 per cent of the cattle slaughtered from Texas have the disease.

So Greg Gergross, Callahan County Agent, encourages cattlemen to take steps to eliminate the threat of anaplasmosis in their herds.

Anaplasmosis is an infectious disease of cattle caused by a small parasite that destroys red blood cells. The disease is especially widespread in warm, humid areas where it is spread by certain insects, primarily biting flies such as horse and deer flies. Certain ticks can also spread the disease along with the use of contaminated bleeding or vaccinating needles, dehorning, ear notchers or nose tongues.

Infected animals generally show no visible symptoms during the four-to-six week incubation period, notes Gergross. Then they become weak, may go off feed and refuse to drink water. Later they may become constipated, stay away from the herd, or become unduly excited. Advanced cases become pale around the eyes, muzzle or teats or show yellowish-tinged skin. Seriously infected cattle either

City Asks Citizens To Cut Water Usage Voluntarily

Cross Plains is facing a water shortage.

Tuesday Cross Plains City officials asked that residents voluntarily cut watering in half immediately. "We are asking the people of Cross Plains to help meet the water shortage crisis without imposing any hard and fast rules," said Mayor O. B. Edmondson. City councilmen pointed out that if the voluntary curtailment of watering request did not cut consumption to a desired level, then additional steps of imposing watering limitations will be forthcoming.

Billy D. Dillard, city utilities superintendent, stated Tuesday morning that Cross Plains residents used 370,000 gallons of water on Monday, an all-time high for the city. Consumption had been averaging about 330,000 daily for the past 15 days or so. "We had been losing a foot or so a day, in storage in the battle to supply as much as was being demanded," Dillard stated. The use surge Monday would have emptied every storage tank we had if no pumping could have been done Dillard explained.

"We can pump only 305,000

to 310,000 gallons daily," Dillard explained.

Mayor Edmondson noted that the city needs to sell the water

and wants the people to have the water, but added that pumping must catch up, stressing that a reserve must be held

back in event of a major fire.

Put simply, if Cross Plains runs out of water it will be due to people not complying with the request for voluntary curtailment of use of water.

Water fields are supplying to capacity now, and have been for the past several days. Supply is slightly less than average demand, it was pointed out.

"A mechanical failure or thunderstorm with lightning interrupted power, could result in the city running dangerously low on water," Dillard stated.

Officials emphasized that Cross Plains people had always responded when called on in the past, and it is believed that they will do so again during this crisis.

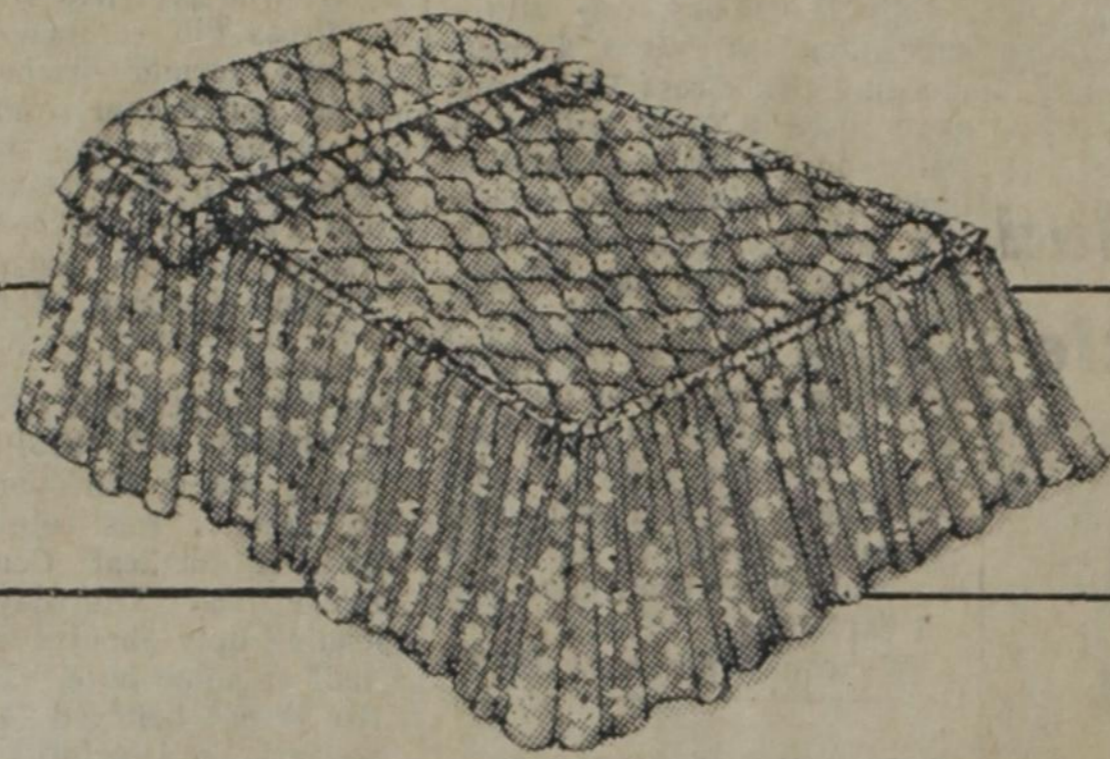

PUBLIC NOTICE
ORDINANCE NO. 6-A
AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO LIVESTOCK BEING KEPT WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS, PROPERTY UPON WHICH VIOLATIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE OCCUR WILL BE DECLARED A NUISANCE: PROVIDING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS, that in order to protect the life, health and general welfare of the citizens of Cross Plains, it is deemed necessary to promulgate rules and regulations pertaining to livestock being kept in the city limits of Cross Plains, Texas.

In such areas of the City where livestock are being kept and two or more adjacent property owners object to the livestock being kept there, a complaint should be registered with the City Council of Cross Plains, such complaints should be in writing and signed with the signatures of the complainants. The Council will then call a meeting of the persons involved, and if the problem cannot be resolved, then the livestock will be removed by request of the City Council after due notice to the offending party.

In any quarters, such as stables, pens and yards, where livestock are being kept within the city limits, it shall be the law that a clean sanitary condition exists.
THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL CONSTITUTE A MISDEMEANOR, and any person convicted of such violation thereof shall be fined not to exceed \$200.00. Each day such livestock are kept after due notice shall be considered a separate offense and a fine levied for each day of the violation.
