

Showers Tease This Area As Heat Wave Is Cooled

Showers teased this area Saturday and Sunday, bringing hopes of crop-saving rains and cooler temperatures.

A cool front moved into the area last week end, and showers fell over most of the Cross Plains section of Texas. Temperatures were cooled from the over 100 degrees pattern which had held sway daily for three weeks or more.

About 9:30 a.m. Saturday a heavy shower hit Cross Plains, cleansing and freshening. Another light shower followed on

Sunday, beginning just before 10 a.m.

Gauges in Cross Plains varied considerably, reports indicate, however, general average seemed to be a two-day total of .90 of an inch.

Heaviest showers seemed to fall north of Cross Plains and in the Pioneer sector. B. A. Moore reported 1.30 inches, one report received by the Review

stated, while Wayne Brown, nearer Cottonwood got .70 of an inch. W. O. Rachels at Pioneer reported 1.80 inches, and 1.10 was measured at the Pioneer Co-op. Only .30 of an inch fell at the J. T. Beggs place in eastern part of Pioneer community.

Alton Tatom at Atwell reported .40 of an inch, and he also reported that he believed "a much heavier shower" fell in the area of the Forest C. Scott and Charlie Sowell places.

Mrs. Jack Rector reported a half inch at her home in the Sabanno community.

A trace of moisture was recorded at Burkett, and at Cross Cut only a sprinkle fell. Mrs. Less Byrd said, "It wasn't even enough to run of the house."

The showers also apparently also nearly missed the Rowden community. N. V. Gibbs reported .20 of an inch.

The cool front and the showers afforded a break in the searing temperatures which had burned this area for three weeks or longer. Residents enjoyed temperatures in the high 80's to low 90's Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Temperatures were on the rise again Tuesday, although not yet at the century mark as the Review hurried to press.

Although the moisture was welcomed and was badly needed, much more is urgently required if it is to be of any lasting benefit. All vegetation is suffering.

The showers drastically cut water consumption in Cross Plains it was reported, but by Tuesday consumers were already using more.

Observers agree that although the week end showers were nice, a good, general rain will be required to provide any lasting relief from the heat and major benefit to crops and pastures.

8 County Baptist Churches Set 'Meet Jesus' Crusade

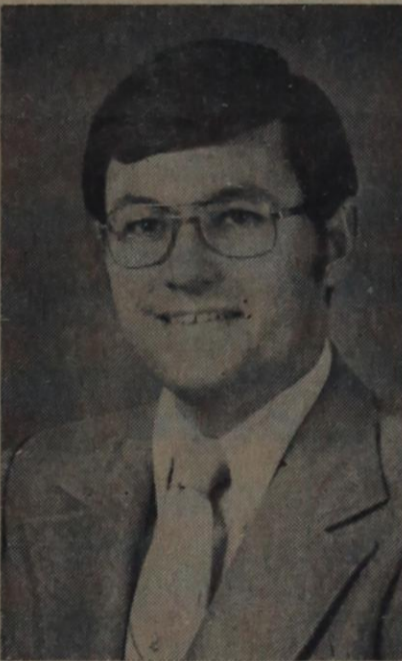

'Vaccinate Horses' Says County Agent

Horse owners in Callahan County are reminded to vaccinate their horses for sleeping sickness, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent, of Baird.

Serious outbreaks of this disease have already occurred in Florida and the Dominican Republic. Also a recent report from the Texas Health Department indicates that the virus of Western Equine Encephalomyelitis was isolated from mosquitos from 21 different areas of the Gulf Coast between Kleberg and Orange Counties in Texas, he noted.

Vaccinations must be repeated yearly to give proper immunity. Eastern, Western, Venezuelan and Tetanus can be all given in a single combined vaccine if so desired Gerngross explained. Horse owners are advised to contact their veterinarian to schedule vaccinations for the animals not vaccinated this year.
