RAILWAY RUMBLE.
Ireland claims the honor of the first electric railway in the United Kingdom. It is said that the cheapest railway in the world are to be found in Hungary.

MILES NOT ALL THE SAME.
Differ in Length in Various Countries and Also by Land and Sea.

English speaking countries have four different miles. The ordinary mile is 5,280 feet and the geographical or nautical mile is 6,080 feet, making a difference of about one-seventh between them. The Russian mile is 5,130 feet, and the Irish mile is 6,720 feet; four various miles, every one of which is still in use. Then almost every country has its own standard mile. The Romans have their mil passuum, 1,000 paces, which must have been about 3,000 feet long.

The Italian mile is 23,136 feet in length, more than four times as long as our mile. The Dutch, the Danes and the Prussians apply a mile that is 18,480 feet long, and the Vienna post-mile is 17,520 feet long. The Swedish mile is 7,341 yards long, and the Vienna post-mile is 17,520 feet long. The distance indicated by the league also varies in different countries.

ANCIENT UMBRELLAS.
THEY FIGURED IN CHURCHES IN THE EARLY CHRISTIAN DAYS.
When First Adopted by the Public, They Seem to Have Been Utilized for the Purpose of Keeping the Textures of their Robes, Attributes of Divinity.
In the early Christian churches a large umbrella usually preceded a priest, and it became one of the attributes of cardinal appointments. The early Roman emperors were the dupes of Venise carried umbrellas of state, and in 1284 Pope Alexander III. declared that these should be surmounted by golden staves of the announcement. Michael Montoni was the first ecclesiastical layman to carry an umbrella, which consisted of a small flat square of green stuff, over which was a copper spiral. Soon after the umbrella was adopted by fashionable Venetian dandies. According to Corson's "Crucifix" (1611), the Italian umbrella was a small canopy and was made of bathos extended to the ends of the hoops. He says umbrellas were handled by horsemen, who, resting the handle on the thigh when seated, thus made so that they should "minister sindevo into their shelter against the sun and the sun's rays."
In the Arabian manuscripts, which in English manuscripts, the first reference to the umbrella is in the description No. 603 a crude illustration showing the figure of a woman holding an umbrella. The reference to the umbrella leads me to infer that umbrellas were known in England even in the early Anglo-Saxon period.

Beek, as quoted in the Draper's Dictionary, asserts that at the time that Stephen used the term of Venetian (twelfth century) umbrellas were in common use among the English. The first illustration of an umbrella in English literature is in Florida's "World of Columbus" (1492), where it is described as a kind of round fan or shadowing that they used to ride with in summer Italy's little umbrellas were introduced in 1656 an umbrella was exhibited in the "Museum Tractatantianum; or, Collection of Curious and Wonderful Things Lambeth, Near London, by John Tradescant," which was known as "one of the various uses of the umbrella" (1678). 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APPLICATIONS REJECTED.

Regen Refuses to Sell Brewster County Lands for Farmer.

Austin, Oct. 23.—State Land Commissioner Charles Regen has rejected applications for the purchase of public school lands in Brewster county as grazing or agricultural lands which were made first prior to the public announcement of the application recently rendered by the attorney general to the effect that such lands were not already included in the state geological survey as mineral lands were open to purchase as grazing or agricultural lands. The applications rejected by the land commissioner are about 20 in number.

The reason "why he gives for their rejection is that while the lands had been classified as mineral lands they were so recognized by the land office and were being bought as such under the mining law of the state; also that those who had applied to purchase the lands as actual settlers knew at the time that the lands were mineral lands, and that upon some of the sections valuable mining developments had been made.

It is probable that some of the applicants who were following the public announcement of the attorney general will test their rights in the court.

BULLER IS DEPOSED.

Relieved of Command of the British First Army Corps.

The Speech He Made at a Luncheon Given in London "when he was made a Knight of the Garter" has caused his Sudden Disgrace.

London, Oct. 23.—Sir Rodham Buller has been relieved of the command of the First army corps in consequence of the speech he made on Oct. 19, after the luncheon given in his honor by the King's Royal Rifle, dealing with his famous dispatch to General White at Ladysmith. He has been placed on half pay, and General French has been appointed to succeed him.

In the official announcement of the circumstances that the command-in-chief, after full consideration of all the circumstances and the explanations furnished, recommended that General Buller be relieved, which has been done.

The appointment of General French to succeed Buller "when he was made a Knight of the Garter" has caused a sensation. It is understood that the government endeavored to induce Buller to resign, but he refused to do so, and he has been placed on half pay.

The morning papers all express sympathy for the unfortunate end of a brilliant career, but they are unanimous in their opinion that Buller is an undesired speech and they express the great approval of the selection of General French to succeed him.
