### Report Available Showing Why South Is F.D.R.'s Problem

The editor of this paper has received copies of the recent report of the National Emergency Council, which tells why the South has become what President Roosevelt calls "the nation's number one economic problem." Copies will be available as long as they last to any one who desires them, at the office of this publication or at the office of the Farm Security Administration.

The report shows that the South's chief problem is caused by one-crop farming, and by southern farmers producing only one-fifth of the things that they eat and wear. In this connection, J. S. McKnight, county supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, invites attention to the fact that FSA is promoting a program under which farmers financed by FSA work out a diversified plan that gives every member of the family work every day in the year. FSA also requires that each family which it finances grows first of all food for the family and feed for the livestock.

Under the usual program, the supervisor said, a cotton farmer of the year, and the Farm Security Administration asserts that this is the chief reason that the average income of the southern tenant is only \$73 per person, for a whole year's work. The richest state in the South ranks lower in per capita income than the poorest state in other regions, according to the N.E.C. report, which shows how the one-crop system has affected all classes, not farmers alone.
