The letters, multigraphed, bear names of Xylander Carson, Dallas, and Oscar L. Guy, Dallas, listed as "co-trustees." The letters are accompanied by printed matter saying the committee is awaiting a decision of Texas Supreme Court on a mandamus seeking to compel issuance of a state charter to the union. The letters promise that an illustrated magazine of 250,000 to 300,000 circulation, is going to be published, concurrent with a statewide radio campaign in carrying on the \$30 pension fight.

The difference arose early this month as a result of the pressure at the city gate, and the number of heat units per cubic foot that the fuel contained.

Representatives of the Holden & Tyler firm met with the council in a special session Wednesday night and differences were aired. Eventually each side granted concessions and an agreement was

Rumors had been abroad the past several days that Holden & Tyler would discontinue serving the city on December 20, unless last month's bill which' was in dispute, was settled in full. Steps were being taken by the council, however, to prevent a discontinuance of service regardless of the outcome, the Reviw was told.




