SPAG To Discuss Possibility Of Maintaining Bi-Lingual Program

The South Plains Association of Governments will hold their regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors at the Emergency Center at Lubbock City Hall on Tuesday, August 8, at 9:30 a.m.

The board will meet to review and comment on the following projects and programs with regard to existing regional plans and duplication of current agency services.

GA 72-45 Texas Highway Department --- Environmental statement for Spur 232 from U.S. Highway 62 (19th Street) north to FM 2255 (4th Street) in the city of Lubbock.

Llano Estacado Farmworkers of Tejas, Inc.-Economic upgrading and migrant program. The proposed project is directed toward migrant and seasonal farmworkers and includes maintaining outreach offices and bi-lingual staff in Brownfield, Crosbyton, Muleshoe and Tahoka for program planning and economic development projects; a bi-lingual child development center for pre-school age children of farmworker's families to be continued in Tahoka; bi-lingual citizenship education classes during evening hours; supervision of a VISTA component. The request is for \$200,000 for one year's operation.

Llano Estacado Farmworkers of Tejas, Inc.-to establish a prevention, counseling and recovery program for alcoholics in families of migrant and seasonal farmworkers. The project will attempt to serve farmworker's families in 12 counties from outreach service centers in Hereford, Littlefield, Plainview, and Slaton. The estimated cost of the project is \$80,420.

Dan Gryder Enterprises, Inc.-application to HUD-FHA for a subdivision feasibility comment on "Hornes Mesa" development of 18 acres.

Texas Highway Department-Construction and draft environmental statement for Interstate 27 in Hale and Swisher counties.

Plainview Police Department-Application to Texas Criminal Justice Council for education incentives. The project, if funded, will encourage Plainview policemen to enroll in directly related law enforcement courses at an accredited college by providing additional salary increments. The estimated cost of the project would be \$800,000 for the first year.

Chairman of the board, E.W. Locker, presided at the meeting. Present were Mrs. Lois Witherspoon, Lewis Embry, A.J. Lenderson, Mrs. J.G. Arn, Grundy Lewis, and A.R. McGuire. Absent Jimmy Wedel and Marvin Drake.

Only routine business was transacted according to the board secretary.

Hale County-Application to establish a Probation Department. The project, if funded, would establish an Adult and Juvenile Probation service to the Hale County Criminal Court. This project would improve the capabilities of the adult and juvenile probation offices by providing specialized services to persons from arrest through sentencing. The estimated cost of the total project is \$79,393 with the first year's cost being \$39,695.

The board will also select a date for a Pre-Application Conference with representatives of the Governor's office. To be eligible for Texas Planning Assistance Grant, a pre-application conference must be held before adoption.

Feagley Travels With A&M Biological Group

Sam Feagley went with a biological group from Texas A&M University on a trip July 7 through July 19 that took them from Galveston south almost to Vera Cruz, Mexico. They traveled on the ship "R.V. Aluminos" and were on the water for 13 days.

Feagley worked for Dr. Bob Presley, chemical oceanographer for Texas A&M. The assigned job was to take cores or samples from the ocean floor. A 300 pound core or pipe, lined with plastic, was lowered to within 100 meters of the ocean floor then dropped onto the floor to collect samples from the ocean floor. The core samples were later taken to the lab where the water was squeezed from them and then analyzed to determine the amounts of chloride, silicon, phosphate, sulfate, calcium, potassium, sodium and magnesium. Additional core samples were frozen to be thawed and analyzed later.

A biological group working under the direction of

Dr. Pequinot took samples of organisms at various levels for making a chart of organisms at various levels in the Gulf of Mexico. Samples were collected in three types of nets, dredging, which collected samples from along the ocean floor; mid-water trawl, collected specimens from various levels; and plankton net, collected samples from the surface of the ocean. Planktons are the small organisms (plant or animal) found in the ocean.

The deeper the water, from which specimens were taken, the more colorful were the specimens, reported Feagley. For example, shrimp from the lower depths were a deeper rose or pink color.

An underwater camera in a sealed box with lights was also lowered and used by the crew to take pictures of the ocean floor.

Feagley, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C.J. Feagley, is a Muleshoe High School graduate and attends Texas A&M University.

Virgie Obenhaus, seven miles south and three miles west of Muleshoe reported only .3 of an inch Friday.

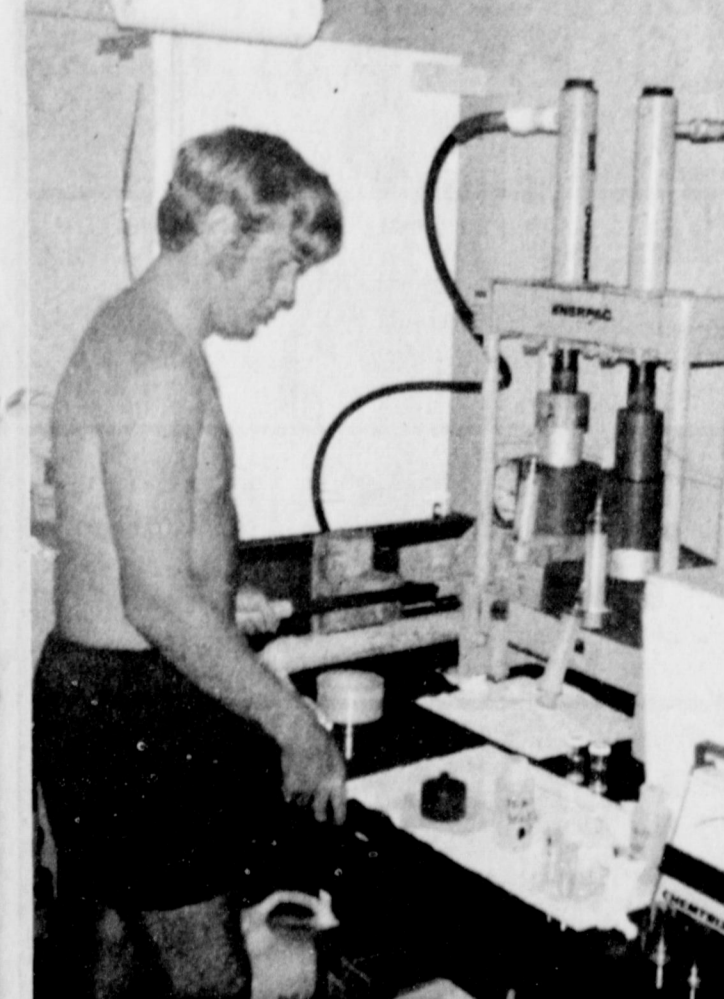
Northwest of town, Harold Mardis reported .7 of an inch and he lives 10 miles northwest of Muleshoe.
