A statement especially prepared by the Mayor for publication appears hereunder:

"I call the attention of city tax payers to a resolution which was duly adopted at regular meeting of the City Council on February 2, 1937, and urgently ask that you show a better spirit of co-operation with the Council, and personal consideration of a matter that also is of vital interest to all citizens, by more promptly paying your city Mart, Texas, occupants of the car taxes, thereby avoiding additional same, and enable a proper mainlive.
