County Basketball Tourney Is Saturday

IS FIRST STEP IN OFFICIAL PLAY OF TITULAR SCHEDULE

Cross Plains will be host Saturday to the annual Callahan County basketball tournament, in which eight boys and five girls teams are entered. Play will begin early Saturday morning and continue until that night.

Cottonwood high school boys, defending champion in that division, will not compete. Cross Plains boys are favored to romp off with the laurels monopolized by Cottonwood the past several years. Denton girls, defending champion in the feminine division, will be present and strive to repeat.

Don Wilkins, of Blake, will officiate for all games of the tournament, schedule for which has been arranged by Coach Bill Wright, of Putnam.

The county tournament is the first elimination in official play of the basketball schedule. Girls basketball does not go beyond the county meet, however, winning boys teams in county meets clash in district tournaments. Winners of the district events meet in a regional tournament. A new award will be offered in the boys division of the tournament this year by Cross Plains, as host for the event. The former award in boys division is now a permanent possession of Cottonwood by virtue of their having won it three consecutive times.

1,575 People Pay Poll Tax In This County; Time Past

The deadline for poll tax payments was January 31. The figure is 1,900 less than was paid last year, however, the fact that this is an off year, politically speaking, is credited with the lack of interest.

POINTS OUT THAT PENALTIES AWAIT LAGGARD CITIZENS

City tax payers are warned this week by Mayor S. P. Collins against assuming an indifferent attitude toward city taxes, and urged to be more cooperative. The mayor calls attention to a recent resolution of the city council assessing penalties for delayed payments.

A statement especially prepared by the Mayor for publication appears hereunder:

"I call the attention of city tax payers to a resolution which was duly adopted at regular meeting of the City Council on February 2, 1937, and urgently ask that you show a better spirit of co-operation with the Council, and personal consideration of a matter that also is of vital interest to all citizens, by more promptly paying your city taxes, thereby avoiding additional penalties and costs in collection of same, and enable a proper maintenance of the city in which you live. The resolution provides as follows:

"It is ordered that a penalty of 6 per cent be attached to and collected on all city taxes that are delinquent and unpaid on and after February 15, 1937. And especially shall this penalty apply to, and in no manner be voided, or any part thereof be cancelled or remitted on 1936 taxes, nor for any following year thereafter until the receipt issue of City of Cross Plains Refunding Bonds, together with all interest are paid in full. It being a fact and understood that the assessments are made and the total tax rate and levy for the said years are pledged for the prompt payment of the said refunding bonds and interest thereon. And it is further ordered and made a part of this resolution that other portions of the city tax list remaining delinquent and unpaid on and after the above date of February 15, 1937, be prepared and placed in the hands of the attorney for collection as the law provides."

from the bank and bought a supply of barley at 35 cents a bushel and corn for 40 cents and fed out this bunch of hogs along with four shoats that I bought for \$26. One hog that I bought for \$10, after keeping for two weeks, I sold for \$22. After two months I sold the four shoats for \$60, the sow for \$26, and in December I sold the eight pigs for \$50. Through the summer therefore, I cleared \$88 the only cost being a little labor which I couldn't have sold for anything at that time. Therefore, I started two years ago, borrowed \$60 and sold out for \$158. That was enough to start me into Texas A&M I believe that other 4-H club boys can do as well or better than I did with my hog project and I believe that the farmers at Cottonwood could well afford to think more seriously of hog production. Your friend very truly, Durward Varner."

The county agent has been very proud of Durward ever since his acquaintance in the fall of 1933 and has had many enjoyable hours in his company, especially while enroute to the Short Courses held annually at A&M College. Boys like Durward are bound to go places

and it is the belief of the county agent that the 4-H Club work has helped Durward to make up his mind to attend college.
