George M. Hopkins, Jr., cowboy and longtime resident of Callahan County and Baird, Texas, died at 2:20 p.m., Thursday, February 1, 1996 at his home.

Services were at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, February 3, 1996 at First Baptist Church with Tom Merriman officiating, assisted by Brother Jack Willoughby. Burial was at Belle Plaine Cemetery, directed by Parker Funeral Home.

George was born July 7, 1943, in Muskogeen Oklahoma, to George Monroe Hopkins, Sr. and Hazel Windham Hopkins. He attended schools at Baird and Cross Plains. He was inducted into the U.S. Navy on July 6, 1961 and received an honorable discharge on April 3, 1964. He married Elaine Bailey Bell on April 1, 1983, in Baird, Texas. Prior to that he was married to Elaine Snyder, on July 7, 1964, mother of Kelly and Toni. he married Barbara Bruce, mother of James, on January 11, 1969.

From early on, George was an entrepreneur of many things. He enjoyed his cowboy heritage by raising cattle, breaking horses, and team roping. He made his mark in life with the use of his welder. he spent the last five years of his life building stock trailers. It was always known that if it could be made with metal, George could do it.

The partnership is part of a national program that includes more than 20 corporations and 40 universities.


"What this is all about is an effort to make certain we are thinking seriously about how well we are serving the people we serve," said UT President Robert Berdahl.

In May, UT will send 135 administrators and faculty members to a four-day conference at Ford headquarters in Dearborn, Mich.

Austin police have begun enforcing a city ordinance passed Jan. 4 banning camping on sidewalks, city rights of way, parks and other public spaces. The penalty is a Class C misdemeanor carrying a maximum fine of \$500. It costs \$70 a day to jail violators.

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses rebutted a formal complaint lodged by the Texas NAACP last fall that a disproportionate number of black students who failed the state's high school graduation test were denied diplomas. Texas NAACP President Gary

Bledsoe said the "unconstitutional" nature and application of the TAAS test "violates the civil rights of many Texans as a result of their face, ethnicity, wealth and national origin," The Dallas Morning News reported.


Dr. Moses commented two days after the U.S. Department of Education confirmed that it was investigating the test because of the complaint. "The figures show ... that a vast majority of our high school seniors, including our minority students, are able to pass the exit-level test before their senior year is complete," Moses said.

Figures from the 1995 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test showed 9.6 percent of African-American seniors and 9.1 percent of Hispanic seniors failed the exam, while white students failed at the rate of 1.4 percent.

Bledsoe said many minority students who failed the test "are not exposed to all the material covered by the exam nor are they provided access to the necessary preparatory courses to prepare them to take the exam.

As babies, we start out with 20 pri-• mary (or baby) teeth. By the time we are adults, we shed these baby teeth • and end up with a total of 32 teeth. • Where do the extra 12 come from? • These are our 12 permanent molar teeth. • They develop behind the baby molars in three stages (of 4 each) during our youth.

The third set of molars are called · wisdom teeth. They make their appearance between the age of 17 and 21. The one who invented this label equated "wisdom" (perhaps rashly) with physi-· cal maturity. Wisdom teeth often cause trouble.

The jaws may be so small that one of all of these wisdom teeth remain completely embedded in the jawbone. In other instances, only a portion of the crown may erupt and a flap of gum tissue may overlap much of the wisdom tooth enamel.
