## Icy Road Conditions Cause Several Accidents

The icy weather that started about 8:00 Thursday night turned Callahan County roads into ribbons of ice by Friday morning. As of 2:30 Friday afternoon Callahan County dispatch had sent emergency personnel to thirteen vehicle wrecks. The calls started at 7:00 a.m. Friday morning.

Traffic down the hill west of Baird on I-20 was at a snails pace most of the morning. A truck trailer was overturned in the median at the 308 mile marker at the East edge of Baird.

A driver for Albertson's escaped serious injury about 1:00 p.m. when his truck skidded out of control at the 316 mile marker, leaving the tractor in the creek and

his jack knifed trailer hanging over the bridge guardrail in the inside lane of east bound traffic. Texas Department of Transportation was called to the scene to assist with traffic control detouring motorists into the outside lane for about two and a half hours. Joseph Lamontagne was treated at the scene by Baird Rescue Personnel and stated his trailer was not loaded.

Highway 36 was completely blocked one and a half miles east of the 283 intersection for about 45 minutes Friday afternoon when vehicles could not get enough traction to pull a hill.

There were no serious injuries from the accidents.

one team, the other team must play with four (4) players also and this will constitute a "game". If at any time one of the teams drops down to one player, it is an automatic forfeit. The team with a full compliment of players may continue to play with four (4) players to the opposing teams 2-3 players.

12.) Out of bounds--three foot clearance for all throw-ins.

13.) One and one starts on the 7th team foul. The tenth team foul is an automatic two shots.

14.) Each coach will supply a time-keeper or scorekeeper for their game.

15.) Coaches, please complete and turn in to an officer of BYB your line-up as well as your time keeper or scorekeeper before the previous game is over to save time and get your game started on time.

16.) If two technical fouls are called on a coach, he must leave the gym and his or her coaching position in the league will be reviewed.

17.) Technical fouls: One free throw and the ball out of bounds.

Any player of the offended team may shoot the free throws.

18.) Technical fouls do not count as team fouls.

19.) Ten (10) minute grace period before forfeit of game. We

cannot hold your game because there are games after you.

20.) All call by the officials are final!!!

21.) REMEMBER, the purpose of this league is to teach the children the sport of basketball and Good Sportsmanship.

22.) Tournament bracket will be based on the following:

a.) overall record

b.) head to head competition

c.) average number of players scoring per game (highest percentage based on number of players present)

d.) average points allowed per game (lowest average)

e.) coin flip

23.) Overtime games:

a.) jump ball to start all overtime quarters

b.) one (1) three minute quarter with one time out per team.

c.) second overtime, if necessary, is SUDDEN VICTORY. First to score wins the game. one time out per team

24.) Any unsportsmanlike conduct from spectators will not be tolerated. One warning will be issued.

Non-compliance will be subject to ejection. A referee or director may enforce this.

25.) Any complaints regarding officiating, rules or organization should be in writing and delivered to a director.

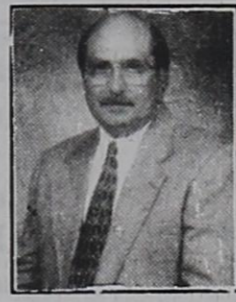

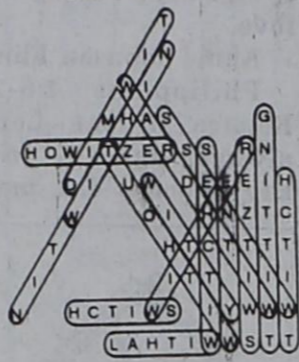

AUSTIN — Doubling the state sales tax to replace the \$9 billion Texas generates in local school property taxes is not an option, Gov. George Bush said last week.

That unsavory idea was one of three studied by a special committee whose job it was to study ways to reduce the tax burden on property owners. Committee members were designees of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, state Comptroller John Sharp and House Speaker Pete Laney and members of Bush's budget staff.

Besides raising the sales tax from 6.25 percent — possibly expanding it to cover goods and services presently exempted — the other two ideas considered by the panel were:

- A 1 percent tax on gross receipts, levied on revenue generated in-state by businesses; and
- A 2.5 percent value-added tax, applied to the value at each step as a product advances from raw material to finished product.

The committee's draft report said, "None of the alternatives presented by the staff work group are without warts of one kind or another."

Bullock, who has been hospitalized with pneumonia, said each of the three property tax-relief alternatives would hit a large section of the Texas economy, and that it would be a tough fight for Bush to win approval of any such major tax change.

Bush has ruled nothing out at this point. "Obviously, we need to look

at a combination. I've got an idea where I'm headed on it," Bush told the *Austin American-Statesman*.

### Moses Defends TAAS

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses rebutted a formal complaint lodged by the Texas NAACP last fall that a disproportionate number of black students who failed the state's high school graduation test were denied diplomas.

Texas NAACP President Gary Bledsoe said the "unconstitutional" nature and application of the TAAS test "violates the civil rights of many Texans as a result of their race, ethnicity, wealth and national origin," *The Dallas Morning News* reported.

Dr. Moses commented two days after the U.S. Department of Education confirmed that it was investigating the test because of the complaint. "The figures show...that a vast majority of our high school seniors, including our minority students, are able to pass the exit-level test before their senior year is complete," Moses said.

Figures from the 1995 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test showed 9.6 percent of African-American seniors and 9.1 percent of Hispanic seniors failed the exam, while white students failed at the rate of 1.4 percent.

Bledsoe said many minority students who failed the test "are not exposed to all the material covered by the exam nor are they provided access to the necessary preparatory courses to prepare them to take the exam."

### Navy to Stay in Corpus Christi

Lawmakers on Capitol Hill hailed the announcement last week that the Navy will retain its Naval Air Training Command and pilot training at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station instead of moving the missions to Florida.

Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, said, "This is a great victory for the city of Corpus Christi."

"Not only did the Dallas Cowboys win the Super Bowl, but Corpus Christi won the Super Bowl," said U.S. Rep. Solomon Ortiz, D-

Corpus Christi.

The Navy had been contemplating stripping Corpus Christi of its primary and maritime pilot training, moving the complement of 700 personnel and 128 planes to Pensacola, Fla. The Navy also considered moving the 106-person Naval Air Training Command from Texas to Florida.

Ortiz said the Navy's decision reflects the fact that South Texas has much more uncluttered air space than Pensacola, and provides more flying days because of better visibility.

### UT-Ford Partnership

The University of Texas and Ford Motor Corp. announced a partnership to increase the quality of the university's management and services, and to produce more graduates who are ready for corporate roles.

The partnership is part of a national program that includes more than 20 corporations and 40 universities.

"What this is all about is an effort to make certain we are thinking seriously about how well we are serving the people we serve," said UT President Robert Berdahl.

In May, UT will send 135 administrators and faculty members to a four-day conference at Ford headquarters in Dearborn, Mich.

Under the partnership, students will be able to apply for internships at Ford plants in Texas and Mexico.

### Other Capital Highlights

■ Austin police have begun enforcing a city ordinance passed Jan. 4 banning camping on sidewalks, city rights of way, parks and other public spaces. The penalty is a Class C misdemeanor carrying a maximum fine of \$500. It costs \$70 a day to jail violators.

■ A memorial service for Barbara Jordan was held Jan. 28 at the University of Texas. More than 1,500 people flocked to the Frank Erwin Center to pay final respects to the former congresswoman, state legislator, UT faculty member and champion of open government and constitutional rights. Jordan died of pneumonia on Jan. 17.

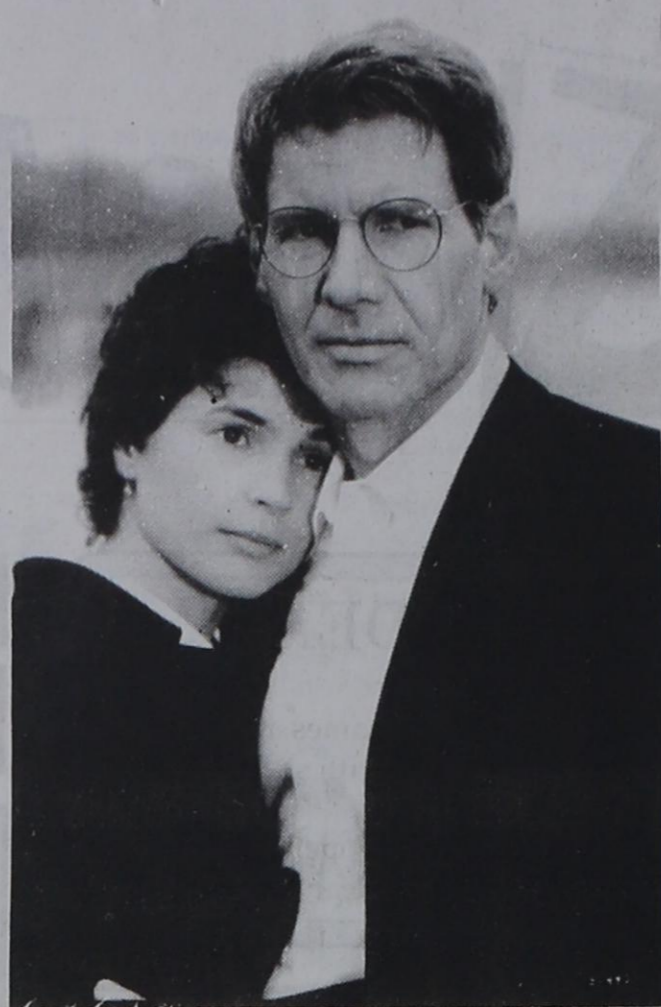

The current production is a Sydney Pollack film presented by Paramount Pictures. It is rated PG.

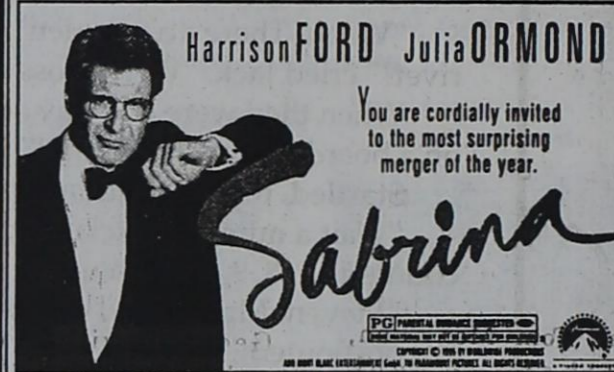
