



Barlow and Summers, Federal Peach Experts, In The County

For the next 10 days or 2 weeks H. S. Barlow and John L. Summers of the Federal and State Depart ment of Agriculture, Divisions of Plant Pathology and Entymology, will visit the peach farms of Cal lahan in a drive to eradicate phon ey and mosaic diseases. These eases are rapidly spread through out orchards by insects and soon destroy the orchard. These men will visit each farm and advise with the grower such trees that shculd be immediately taken up and destroyed. This measure is finan ced by the Federal and State Dep artment of Agriculture in order to safeguard peach interests of the

The great peach growing indust ry of Georgia has lost about 17 per cent of the best acreage due to these diseases but during the past 4 year the loss has been cut to slightly les than 2 per cent through the cooper-ation with the Federal and State Department Agriculture.




