





Winter ushers in flu season

Winter isn t the only thing that's on its way Flu season is just around the corner too. But with the right preparation, you can stay warm and healthy.

Every year, generally between December and April, millions of Americans get the influenza virus, better" known as the flu. Typical symptoms include fever, chills, headaches, a sore throat and muscle aches. Although most people are ill for only a few days, some can be more seriously affected and may need to be hospitalized.

But the flu may be preventable. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), getting the flu vaccine reduces your risk of getting the virus. Getting vaccinated is encouraged for all ages, and highly recommended for those in high-risk groups.

High risk groups include: persons 65 or older residents of fa

The CDC also recommends the vaccine for anyone who lives with people in a high risk group, health care workers, personnel of nursing homes or chronic care facilities, persons who provide important community services and people working in schools or colleges in order to prevent outbreaks.

Getting the vaccine at the right time may make the difference between staying healthy this winter and spending a few days sick in bed.

They recommend that you get the shot between September and mid-November," says Sallie Connell, RNC, Immunization Coordinator for Outreach Health Services, one of the immunization providers contracted by the Texas Department of Health.

Considering that the effects of the vaccine may last up to one year, people nine years and older need only one shot each flu season, and children under nine may need a second shot after one month, Connell said.

Getting the vaccine gives the opportunity, especially for children and teens, to get up to date on all of their immunizations, which can be given at the same time as the flu vaccine.

There are a variety of reasons why people don't get vaccinated. but one of the most common is the fear of risks involved.

According to the CDC, as with any medicine, there are small risks that serious problems could occur after taking the vaccine. However, "the risks from the vaccine are much smaller than the risks from the disease if people stop using the vaccine."

Additionally the CDC reports that almost all people who get influenza vaccine have no serious health problems from it.

In response to a common misconception that getting the vaccine can actually give you the flu, the CDC reports that "the viruses in the vaccine are killed, so

cannot get influenza from the vaccine."

The CDC also recommends what's known as a split-virus vaccine for children under 13 to reduce the chance of side effects. This method may also be used by adults.

"Ask questions and talk to your doctor or nurse about your concerns," she said.

Make a point of telling your doctor or nurse if you: have a serious allergy to eggs. ever had a serious allergic reaction or other problem related to the flu vaccine, or if you now have a moderate or severe illness, she explained.

Taking the right steps at the right time is the key to avoiding the flu this season.

Stenholm grills EPA Administrator about air quality control

Citing his continued concerns that the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) new air quality standards would be disastrous for rural America. Congressman Charlie Stenholm used a House Agriculture Committee hearing to grill EPA Administrator Carol Browner about the impact these regulations would have on U.S. agriculture.

"Agriculture, the oil and gas industry, and small businesses are all deeply concerned that these regulations will deliver another blow to rural America," Stenholm told Browner during the hearing. "And like the folks who live in my district, I have a complete lack of confidence in the scientific basis for this decision and in your assurances that agriculture will not bear an unreasonable burden if these regulations are implemented."

The Clean Air Act directs EPA to set national standards for certain air pollutants to protect public health and the environment, along with the requirement to review these standards every five years to determine whether new scientific research mandates further revision. The EPA has added new standards for particulate matter (PM) than 2.5 micrometers in diameter, and controversy has arisen over the necessity for and the potential costs of these new standards.

"All of us want clean air and strong protections in place to safeguard human health and the environment, but I do not believe we should take a regulatory step of this magnitude without more scientific support," cautioned Stenholm. "West-Texastractor-seat-commonsense would dictate that we get the data first and then review the problem before deciding how to solve it."

Stenholm went on to take issue with Browner's July 22, 1997 testimony before the Senate Agriculture Committee, during which she stated that the concerns of the agriculture community were based on a lack of dialogue, along with misinformation.

"Despite your assurances that agriculture is not being targeted by these regulations and won't be adversely affected by them, what will happen when industries such as utilities, fuel, transportation, chemical and others pass their costs on to agricultural producers," asked Stenholm. "Commodity prices are tied to world markets, and farmers and ranchers can not pass these increased costs on to consumers."

AUSTIN - Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer last week ordered an estimated \$610 million in 1998 liability insurance rate cuts - with almost half going to individual drivers - to assure that tort reform directly saves money for consumers and

Bomer announced his decision at a Houston news conference with

As a result of the order, benchmark rates for private passenger automobile bodily injury liability insurance will be 9.2 percent lower in 1999 than they would be without tort reform.

"This rate reduction due to tort reform will put more than a quarter of a billion dollars in the hands of Texas motorists," Bomer said,

Rates for businesses' general liability insurance will be 14 percent below what they otherwise would be, for a projected savings of \$143.9 million.

"The rate cuts I am announcing today guarantee that the money from fewer lawsuits and more reasonable settlements go where the Legislature and Gov. Bush intended: to the insurance policyholders of Texas." Bomer

This order was Bomer's third in response to legislation that

through the year 2000 to reflect the anticipated savings from tort reform bills passed in 1995.

When added to the estimated \$435.5 million in 1996 cuts and the projected \$441.2 million in reductions Bomer ordered for 1997, the action brings the total insurance impact of tort reform to \$1.5 billion.

'Tort reform really is about small business and about consumers, and today Texans will learn that as a result of the tort reform that we put in place, consumers, small business owners, doctors, people who have been exposed to liability will receive \$1.5 billion in savings," Bush said.

Jerry Johns, of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service discounted tort reform as the sole cause of the rate reductions.

"Insurance rates are decreasing in many states that have not enacted tort reform legislation," Johns said. "The bodily injury rate in most states is decreasing and Texas is one of those states."

Early Voting Under Way

Early voting for the Nov. 4 constitutional amendment election started as early as Oct. 18 in some Texas counties and will run through

Secretary of State Tony Garza has launched a multimedia effort urging Texans to vote. Words of encouragement from the state's chief elections officer are being spread through newspaper editorials, radio spots and billboards in highly traveled areas.

Texans who have access to the Internet will be able to track election returns for the 14 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot. Returns will be posted and updated every 15 minutes on the secretary of state's web site at http://www.sos.state.tx.us/.

Ken Waldrep, whose neck snapped in a game against the University of Alabama, was not a school employee and therefore not eligible to collect benefits, state district court jurors ruled.

Bush Appoints Justice

Gov. Bush named Dallas appeals court judge Deborah G. Hankinson to fill the seat held by Texas Supreme Court Justice John Cornyn, who stepped down to run for the GOP nomination for Texas attorney general.

Hankinson, a 44-year-old Republican, was appointed by Bush two years ago to the Dallas-based 5th District Court of Appeals.

While a partner in the Thompson & Knight law firm, Hankinson represented Dallas-area school districts, arguing that aspects of the state's school finance law were unconstitutional. In January 1995, the Texas Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of the law

Guaranteed Under the First Amendment:

1. Freedom to have voluntary prayer anywhere, anytime on campus as long as you are not disruptive to the class.

2. Freedom to bring the Bible to class.

3. Freedom to wear Christian T-shirts, symbols, and buttons at school.

4. Freedom to hand out Gospel tracts.

5. Freedom to present school projects from a Christian perspective.

6. Freedom to study and practice the Christmas and Easter holidays on campus.

7. Freedom to be a living witness for God.

There have been a number of decisions from the Federal Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court of the US concerning the rights of students and teachers such as;

A. The Equal Access Act, Garnett V. Renton School district 403, 987F 2D 641 (9th Circuit, 1990-Students can organize for prayer and clubs).

B. Westside Community Schools B. Mergeus 496 U.S. 226 (1993) the United States Supreme Court upheld the Equal For Improving America Access Act.

C. Tinker V. Des Moines Independent School District, 393 U.S. 503, 506 (1969). Specifically, the Court has held that "students (nor) teachers shed their constitutional rights of the First Amendment when they enter the schoolhouse gate."

There are other court decisions that give other freedoms to students and teachers such as Widmar

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
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
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WHO SHOULD OWN YOUR **BUSINESS REAL ESTATE?** If your business is incorporated, it is often a good

idea to personally own the real estate used by your corporation.

If appreciated real estate is sold by a corporation, the gain will be subject to double taxation if the corporation distributes the money to you. However, if you own the real estate personally, there is no double taxation. Though the double taxation generally does not apply to Scorporations, there can be tax problems when an S corporation sells its operating business and its real estate.

The general advice is for you to own the property and lease it to the corporation. Because of the depreciation, you may well generate a tax loss on your personal tax return.

You might consider having another family member own the real estate; then the property will not be a part of your estate. That could save estate taxes.

There are advantages to personal ownership of the real estate not related to taxes. As the value of the property increases, you may be able to generate cash by refinancing (in all states except Texas). Also, if the corporation does not own the real estate, you can readily sell the business and keep the property.

Property now held by your corporation can be transferred to you via a sale. You could then lease it back to the corporation.

The advantages of personal ownership of business real estate are significant. In reviewing the benefits in your particular situation, you must give due consideration to the passive loss rules and other complexities of the tax laws. 

I have been asked by several members of our community why I am against the Baird School Issue.

I would like to share my views with the voter's, so they may better understand how this could affect the financial stability of our dis-

There is a 98% chance of our district losing two of our ten taxpayers in the next five years. The total amount these two companies pay into our local revenue is approximately \$30,000 a year. When we have a penny increase in our tax rate, it brings in around \$6500 a year. If we lose the revenue from two companies alone, we will need a \$.0461 increase, just to offset the loss of income.

I have talked to the TEA in Austin concerning the Tier II funding for the next fifteen to twenty years. The school administration has said, "The state will not change the Tier II funding, because they do not want

to go back to court." What the administration did not say is that if the state has a budget short fall, Tier II funding would be reduced by that amount. Also, the \$15,000 dollar homestead exemption is only guaranteed through 1999. As it stands, if we lose our Tier II funding our tax rate would be \$1.42 per \$100 dollar value. Then you add the revenue lost from two of our top ten taxpayers, and our tax rate would be \$1.4661 per \$100 dollar value. Our Tax rate now is \$1.06. We have not even considered the unfunded mandates sent down from Austin. We will have unfunded teacher pay raises for the next five years, if they average \$100,000 like this past year, we will need to have a \$.154 tax increase per year, just to cover the mandates.

There has been a lot said about the rural water line helping our district financially. In reality, the taxes these new home's will pay, will not cover the expenditures required to educate their children. The fact is that it will

I do not believe in \$1500 dollar toilets, \$250 dollar shower heads, and many of the other costs figures in our bond proposal. I realize that the prices are padded to ensure for cost overruns. But the administration and board have said they would not put the excess money back on the loan. If the elementary cost \$1,000,000 dollars to build, then the board and the administration could spend the other \$500,000 dollars anywhere they want to. If the bond should pass, I think that any excess money should be applied to the loan, rather than spent on extras, that were not approved by the voters.

has said, that the air conditioning in the elementary would cost \$30,000 to \$40,000 dollars to repair. Actually, only two rooms are having air conditioning problems. I have checked on brand new central and heat units, and the cost was around \$700 dollars per unit. For \$1400 dollars, we could have the air conditioners working in the rooms for a lot less than we have been told.

The administration

I don't believe that there is anyone in our district who believe we need a new elementary, and some other improvements to our school. But, we need to have some forethought, as to the financial stability of our district for the years to come. Our school has the highest TAAS scores in the county but our tax rate is the lowest. This tells me, that it isn't a building teaching our children, but the men and women that have dedicated their lives to giving our quality educa-

Rising Star has built a new elementary, without a bond, and paid cash. Gorman has just built a new junior high and paid cash as well, without a bond election. They have built their facilities for less than we are going to pay in interest on our bond. Our interest is going to be well over \$1,000,000 for the life of the bond.

I think we need to make some long range plans to build the facilities we need. I believe, if we follow the coarse the school administration and the board has chosen, our district could very well be bankrupt in the next

five to eight years. We as a district have a very important decision to make on November 8. We can jeopardize the financial stability of our district by passing the bond. Or, we can go back to the drawing board and make a sensible plan to make the improvements needed, and not break the backs of the taxpayers.

Sibley to lead governor's illegal gambling task force

State Sen. David Sibley will lead a task force formed by Gov. George W. Bush to crack down on illegal gambling and casino-type slot machines in Texas, the governor announced Thursday, Sept.

"Casino-style machines have silently crept across Texas into truck stops, shopping malls and convenience stores like an infestation of roaches," Sibley said. "These devices are slot machines, without question, and this type of gambling is illegal in Texas."

The Governor's Task Force on Illegal Gambling will study the extent of illegal gambling in Texas, analyzecurrentgambling laws and recommend how they can be more strictly enforced, and clarify and strengthen the state's position against casino gambling. Members of the 12-person task force have not yet been announced, but will include state lawmakers, prosecutors, law enforcement officials, representatives of state agencies that enforce gambling laws and members of the public.

What would it take to change someone's poor self-image? From loser to winner? >From worthless nobody to valuable somebody? It's hard to say. USA Today carried a brief note on Sept. 25, 1997, about a marvelous rescue of a child. A homeless man in New York City saved the life of a two-year-old boy whose house was on fire. The man talked Sonya Lopez into throwing her son down to him when the mother and her child were trapped in their burning house. He caught the 27-pound boy and them helped Sonya get out. The baby was uninjured, and his mother was treated for smoke inhalation and released. They are fine.

The hero that day was 45-year-old John Byrnes. He has been homeless for two years. He is an alcoholic. In his own words, he is a 'drunken bum.' Maybe Mr. Byrnes needs to look at himself through the eyes of Sonya Lopez. Do you think he's just a drunken bum to her? Not on your life. He's a certified hero. He saved her son's life – and hers. Yet this is the best he could say for himself afterward: "Drunk as I am, I knew what to do right then and there."

People do heroic things because they are created in the image and likeness of God. Like a coin whose image has been defaced, any one of us may mar the likeness to God in his or her character. Alcoholism or a dozen other things that quickly come to mind can convince us how unworthy we are. We hear others attach labels to us. Worse still, we accept those labels — stupid, drunken bum, cheat, liar, con. My theory is that the day he saved the lives of a baby and his mother should have changed John Byrnes' self-image. But how long has he been told he is worthless? How many times has he been called a bum because he is homeless and dirty? And what has his alcoholism cost him in terms of the view he has of himself?

Perhaps the only way to reverse (or avoid) a terrible self-image is to have people who really care about you to remind constantly of your worth in their eyes. Parents, hear this about your children. Mates, hear it about your spouses. Hear it about anyone whose welfare and happiness you value. God's strategy across the centuries has been to remind you of your worth in his eyes. If you missed it in his words, he said it one last time in giving his Son for you. No matter the label someone has stuck on you, heaven says you're worth dying for.
