## Demos Carry County As GOP Grabs Top Offices

Cross Plains and Callahan County voters bucked the slight state trend and voted for Democratic candidates in the General Election Tuesday of last week.

Voter turnout in the city and county was considered good. In Cross Plains 532 votes were cast, according to Mrs. W. F. (Katy) Kilgore, election judge, and in Callahan 2,805 ballots were counted.

Top vote getter in the Cross Plains voting box was E. F. (Franzel) Odom, unopposed Democrat nominee for Commissioner of Precinct 4, with 433 votes. He was asking a second four-year term. Mack Kniffen of

Clyde, also unopposed Democrat candidate asking the post of Callahan County Judge, was the top vote getter in the county with 2,269 ballots.

Republican Bill Clements was elected Governor over John Hill by about 18,437 votes, and incumbent Republican Senator John Tower nipped Demo nominee Bob Krueger by about 14,902 across the state. Re-counts of votes in some places have begun this week in both races.

In a write-in bid for post of County Treasurer Glenda Ivy, unsuccessful Democratic candidate, got 318 votes to 1,982 for Democratic nominee Dora Hounshell.

Cross Plains favored Krueger over Tower 309 to 204 for U. S. Senator and county vote was 1,504 to 1,212, respectively.

For State Representative, 17th District, Demo Charles Stenholm, who won, easily led GOP hopeful Bill Fisher here 387 to 124 and 2,021 to 733 across the county.

Hill bested Clements in the city 280 to 237 and in Callahan 1,476 to 1,288.

Only other seriously contested race was for Attorney General. Mark White beat Jim Baker for that place and here was favored 322 to 179 and in Callahan 1,642 to 1,046.

The Tax Relief Amendment passed easily. In Cross Plains the vote was 407 for and 48 against, and in the county 2,268 to 231.

Proposed amendments 2, 3, 5 and 6 lost in Cross Plains, while in Callahan only 2 and 3 were narrowly defeated.

## Ben Atwood, 75, Buried Here Sunday Afternoon

Cross Plains and area citizens paid final respects to Ben Russell Atwood, 75-year-old lifetime local resident, Sunday afternoon.

The retired prominent farmer-stockman died at 2:12 p.m. Saturday at an Abilene hospital after becoming ill at his home two miles east of town late Friday night. He suffered a fatal heart seizure.

Funeral service was held at 2 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains.

Officiating the final rites was the Rev. Knox Waggoner, pastor of the Cottonwood Baptist Church, and he was assisted by the Rev. Toby Irwin, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery with Masonic rites. Arrangements were handled by Higginbotham Funeral Home of this city.

Born Feb. 18, 1903, in Cross Plains, he had made his home in Cross Plains all his life. He was a retired farmer. He served on the Cross Plains School Board 15 years, and was president of that organization several years. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge No. 267 in Cross Plains. ## Local Lady's Pen Revives Olden True Love Story

This story and circumstances transpired before I was born. However, Miss Marie Bryson told me some of the story before her death. Ever since I was a teenager I have known most of the story, and that "double tombstone" intrigued me, and back then, I wondered if I would experience such love for someone, and be for me.

These two unusual graves are located in the Pioneer, Texas, cemetery (five miles east of Cross Plains), in the center of the west side, under a beautiful sprawling Liveoak tree. The tombstone was in good condition until the ice storm of 1970 when a large limb broke off the tree, fell across the stone and broke off one portion. That portion is lying carefully between the two graves.

As the story goes, R. A. Davis, 23, and Miss Mary Allen, nearly 18, were engaged to be married on Christmas Day, 1900. Friends had persuaded them to wait until the next Sunday, which was probably New Year's Day.

On that Christmas Day, they

were celebrating with firecrackers, one of which went off in his

**Prussic Acid Poisoning Danger To Livestock**

Frost will be hitting Callahan County before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages, points out Greg Gerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with offices in courthouse at Baird.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt, emphasizes Gerngross. Livestock should not be allowed

access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, Gerngross outlines these steps:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.
2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.
3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.
4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.
5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to preventing prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed.

**Need Proof To Get Duplicate SS Card**

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to change or correct information on his/her social security record must submit evidence of identity and evidence substantiating the change before the new card can be issued. For example, a woman who is changing her surname because of marriage should submit any evidence such as a marriage license or driver's license which shows both the previous and new names. A social security number will not be reissued if the evidence requirements are not met.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. If the card was lost, it was only necessary that the individual complete an application for a duplicate card. Under recent changes, anyone who wishes to get a duplicate social security card must complete an application form and present evidence of his/her identity. In addition, the application must be checked against the records at social security headquarters before a new card will be issued. Since it takes three to four weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted (if the individual is unable to provide his/her number) the Social Security Office encourages anyone who has lost his/her social security card or has changed her name to apply for a duplicate card as soon as possible.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a Social Security Number," lists the new kinds of evidence that can be used to establish a person's identity. Copies can be obtained at the Abilene social security office located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is (915) 698-1360.

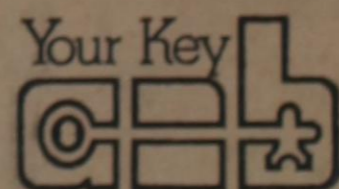

hand and burned him very badly. The same day, the girl he loved so dearly was preparing supper in her kitchen. A large kerosene lamp exploded and set her clothing afire. She ran outside and around her house. Her neighbors, the W. Brysons, saw her, ran over, and put out the fire. However, she was so badly burned, she died the next day.

Her lover was so heart-broken, he had no desire to live. His hand was so badly injured, blood-poisoning set in, and he died of pneumonia a little more than a month after her death.

His last request was that he be buried beside his loved one.

On the north side of this double tombstone is inscribed: Mary E., daughter of D. and D. Allen, born Feb. 16, 1883, died Dec. 26, 1900. "Our darling has gone before to greet us on the Golden Shore."

On the south side is inscribed: "R. A., son of W. T. and M. V. Davis, born Nov. 23, 1877, died Jan. 31, 1901. "Weep not, Papa and Mama for me. I have gone with whom I love."
