





- 3. The mad craze for pleasure. Sports becoming every year more exciting, more brutal, more immoral.
- 4. The building of greater armaments when the real enemy was within — the decay of individual responsibility.
- 5. The decay of religion: faith fading into mere form, losing touch with life, and losing power to guide the

The oft-heard warning that 'history repeats itself' has an omnibus meaning in the light of the above."

It seems obvious to me that we can see these same basic things developing in our great America. But we are prone to ask: What can I, just one person, do to help change this trend? The answer is: Live a righteous life (righteousness according to God's word, not according to man's standards), and encourage your family and friends to do the same.

Last Saturday was opening day of the 1978-79 waterfowl hunting season. Teal season began then and the nine-day season will run through Sunday. Sept. 24.

The popular teal season was designed primarily to take advantage of the early migration of blue-winged teal through the state, although significant numbers of greenwings also are harvested each season, according to C. D. Stutzenbaker, water fowl project leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife De partment.

The teal season is statewide. and the daily limit of four and possesion limit of eight can include any teal species.

Stutzenbaker said that although some teal are havested by dove hunters and causal hunters who "jump shoot" the birds from ponds and lakes, most of the harvest is by seriious waterfowlers who specifically go after teal with decoys and blinds. "Teal are highly gregarious birds, and they can usually provide some good shooting action if you go after them that way," Stutzenbaker, said.




