\$2,500 Gift Allows Library Committee To Buy Building

Purchase of the Barr Building on Main Street by the Cross Plains Public Library was announced this week by a library spokesman.

Making the purchase possible at this time was largely due to the sizeable donation of \$2,500 by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gibson of Sipe Springs and Fort Worth. Mr. Gibson, a Pioneer native and product of the Pioneer School which was consolidated with Cross Plains, stated that he believes strongly in this community. Encouraged by Mrs. Gibson, he demonstrated it.

Other contributions were \$700 from Mr. and Mrs. Raymond DeBusk; Mrs. E. L. Garrett, \$25; Mrs. Joe Ingram, \$10.

The school tax office will continue to be housed for the present in half the building.

Clean-up and renovation of the other half occupied by Handley Business Service will begin when the transaction is completed. The library will eventually cover the front part of the double office building as growth and need dictates.

In the weeks following the spaghetti supper, Oct. 6, the library committee will canvass businesses and residents whom they believe to be interested in the community having library service.

Residents are urged to be as generous with their donations as non-residents have been. The building must be paid off and funds set aside for renovation and operation, a library committee spokesman explained.

The library will begin operation with gift books and the 300

volumes which will be available from the Abilene Public Library on a rotation basis. Watch the paper for a book donation drive.

The Barr Building the past 50 years has housed many different businesses such as men's clothing, second hand wares, beauty

and barber shop, and a grocery.

Hugh and Patricia Barr, who heired the property from their grandmother, Mrs. S. C. Barr, sold the building to Damon Jones this summer.

Herd Thunders Past 'Cats 52-0; Opens 10-A Play

Cross Plains Buffaloes ended non-conference play last Saturday by posting its most impressive win in many seasons, blanking the Rising Star Wildcats 52-0.

Buffaloes scored early and shocked a large crowd of Rising Star homecomers with 37 first half points. Bisons played alertly, turning Wildcat mistakes, some forced by Buffaloes, into points on the scoreboard.

Seemingly early Bison pressure disoriented the hosts and the Cats never recovered.

The game set two new records for the series of 46 games between the two schools. The 52 points were the most ever scored by one team and most aggregate points. The new standard replaced the 46 points tallied by the Herd in 1955, and the aggregate of 50 points last year when the Wildcats beat the Buffs 43-7.

The triumph raised the Buffalo record to 2-1 in non-conference action.

Athletic Director Chuck Eoff stated that he and assistant Coach Paul Rivard were "extremely pleased" with the efforts of the Bisons.

Cross Plains intercepted five passes and recovered two fumbles, keeping the Wildcats offense in check. Bisons gave up the ball once on a fumble.

Cross Plains lost little time in getting on the scoreboard. With only two minutes gone in the game, Halfback Randy Dillard skirted right end from 10 yards out for the first touchdown. It was set up by a fine Buffalo punt which was killed by a Cross Plains player at the Rising Star five. Buffalo Billy Davis covered a Cat fumble to set the stage for the tally. Dillard's placement kick was not successful.

Another fumble recovery set the second Buffalo score in motion at about the Cross Plains 30. A few plays later Wingback

Michael Clark ran about 40 yards for the touchdown. An attempted two-point conversion pass failed, leaving the Bisons ahead 12-0 with 5:40 left in the first half.

Fullback Eddie Jackson counted the next two Bison six pointers. He stepped over the goal line after a 55-yard run with

61 Volunteers Will Canvass Area Seeking \$4,000 Budget

Sixty-one volunteer workers will cover the Cross Plains area Friday in search of \$4,000 for the Cross Plains Area United Fund.

Mrs. Raymond DeBusk and Mrs. Frank Ferrell are co-ordinators of the house-to-house canvass scheduled to begin Friday morning shortly after 9 a.m. The co-chairpersons released a list of 61 volunteer workers last week which will do the personal contacting in the drive. "We again have had extremely fine cooperation from those contacted to work," Mrs. DeBusk and Mrs. Ferrell stated.

Dale Bishop, UF president,

stated that the budget was increased by \$700 this year, to \$4,000, and extra effort is going to be required to reach the new higher goal. "Workers will have to work harder and donors will have to donate a little more each to have a successful drive," he stated. It is hoped that the majority of the budgeted \$4,000 can be raised on Friday.

The drive will be kicked off with a gathering of the volunteer workers at Odom's Restaurant at 9 a.m. Friday. Workers will be given last-minute instructions and materials. The Rev. Bill Reed, local Methodist minister, has been asked to begin the

drive with a prayer at the Friday morning gathering.

Workers are asking that donors have gifts ready when contacted, to avoid having to revisit to insure each resident who wishes to have a part in the annual charitable drive.

Increases in the budget were reported by United Fund Secretary Mrs. Hadden (Gretna) Payne as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center to \$1,300, up \$500; local and transient relief to \$600, up \$100, and unallocated funds (for emergency use) to \$400, up \$100. All other charities or programs will receive the same amount as last year, as shown in the two-column box adjacent to this story.

Jack W. Tunnell, United Fund Treasurer, stated that no portion of the local donations goes to defray administration costs. Local donations are sent directly to the charitable agency or used only for stated purpose locally, is explained. Only cost of the local drive is for forms and necessary supplies. "All work is volunteer," Tunnell stated.

New Crop Peanuts Start Activity At Local Plants

Cross Plains and Pioneer peanut drying plants have begun activity to handle the new crop which has already begun to trickle into the two processors.

Pioneer Farmers Co-Op got its first 1978 crop nuts, runner type, on September 16. They were from Jones County, and loads from the same area were received Monday and Tuesday morning. No local peanuts had been processed. Grades on the early crops were reported running in the mid to high 60's.

Glen Winfrey at Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company here said first load of peanuts at his plant came in last Saturday,

from Cottonwood and Cisco. They were dryland Spanish type and were grading 63 to 67.

One observer said that he expected immediate area peanuts to begin moving to market by the week end, and another estimated it would be 10 days to two weeks before the harvest gets into full swing.

A consensus indicated that if weather conditions remain favorable, a little above average peanut crop is expected. Some observers have indicated that bumper peanut crops is in the offing for this area.

Yields were not available on the first crops, as most were only test plots.

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BUILDING AND HOUSING CODE

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE REPAIR, DEMOLITION AND REMOVAL OF DANGEROUS BUILDINGS FOR THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS.

ARTICLE I — SEVERABILITY.
WHEREAS, to protect the life, health, and general welfare of citizens of this City, all dangerous buildings should be repaired, demolished or removed; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS:

ARTICLE II — DANGEROUS BUILDINGS

SECTION 1: DANGEROUS BUILDINGS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, maintain, or permit to stand upon any premises within the City any dangerous buildings, and all such dangerous buildings are hereby declared to be unlawful, and are hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

SECTION 2: DEFINITION OF TERMS.

A Dangerous Building, for the purpose of this Article, a "dangerous building" is defined as a building which possesses one (1) or more of the following qualities:

- 1) Any building with roof, ceiling, floor, awning, seal, or foundation, or any combination thereof which is rotted or decayed and falling apart; with windows out, uninhabitable, untenable, and/or unsightly.
- 2) Any building in danger of falling and injuring any person, persons, or other property which might be on and about said premises.
- 3) Any building which is a fire menace by virtue of containing in or near said building an accumulation of trash, rubbish, and/or debris; or which, by virtue of abandonment or neglect, or which contains an accumulation of combustible material which may take fire either by accident or on purpose.
- 4) Any building which is in the condition or conditions described in 1), 2), and 3) above, and which is damp or in an unsanitary condition and is likely to create disease and sickness; or which is likely to provide breeding places and habitat for snakes, rats, mice, and other vermin which are detrimental to the public health.

b. Building. For the purpose of this Article, the terms "building," shall mean any structure of any kind or character, or any part thereof, which has been erected upon any land within the City limits of the City of Cross Plains, Texas, irrespective of the material from which such structure has been built.

SECTION 3: INSPECTION.
An inspection shall be made of every building located within the City which is suspected of being in violation of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby authorized to conduct inspections of all such buildings suspected of being in violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: NOTIFICATION OF VIOLATION. Whenever a violation of this Ordinance has been discovered and reported, the owner of the premises involved and the occupant, if any, shall be given a written notification of the nature of the violation and the date on which a reinspection shall be made to determine if the violation has been eliminated. No reinspection shall be made until the person responsible for the violation under the provisions of this Ordinance has been given a reasonable time to eliminate the condition constituting the violation.

SECTION 5: DEMOLITION.

a. Authority. Whenever a dangerous building has been found to exist, and whenever the owner or occupant thereof has failed to correct the conditions which make such building a dangerous building within the meaning of this Ordinance, and when reinspection of such premises reveals that the building still constitutes an immediate danger to the public — a notice of intent to order the demolition of the building shall be served on the owner by cer-

tified mail, to such owner's post office address as shown on the City tax rolls; or, if such address is unknown and cannot be ascertained by the exercise of reasonable diligence, such notice shall be served by publication for not less than two (2) times in an official newspaper; and, in the event that the violation is not eliminated within 60-90 days from the date of said notice the City may demolish and remove said building, or cause the same to be done, and charge the expense incurred in doing such work or having same done, to the owner of said land; and, if such work is done at the expense of the City, then said expense may be assessed to the lot, tract, or parcel of land or to the premises upon which the expense was incurred.

SECTION 6: FILING OF STATEMENT OF EXPENSE AND CREATION OF LIEN. The City Council shall file with the County Clerk of Callahan County a statement of expenses incurred under the preceding Section giving the amount of such expenses and the date on which said work was done or such improvement was made; and the City shall have a privileged lien on such lot, lots or other premises, or real estate upon which said building was located, in order to secure the repayment of the expenditures so made. Such said lien shall bear six per cent (6%) interest per annum from the date said statement was filed. It is further provided that suit may be filed by the City for recovery of the expenses so incurred and for the foreclosure of said lien and the statement of expenses so made, as aforesaid, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended for such work.

d. Right of Entry. The City Inspector, in the discharge of official duties and upon proper identification, shall have authority to enter any building, structure, or premises at any reasonable hour.

SECTION 7: RIGHT OF APPEAL. Any person affected by any notice of violation in connection with the enforcement of any provision of this Ordinance may request an appeal, and shall be granted a hearing before the City Council provided such person shall first file in the City Office a written request for such hearing.

ARTICLE III — PENALTY AND SEVERABILITY.

SECTION 1: PENALTY. Any person, firm, or corporation who shall own or maintain any dangerous building as that term is defined herein, and who shall after notice as provided in Article II, Sec. 2, fail to repair or eliminate the conditions which cause such building to be a dangerous building, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200), and each and every day's violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 2: SEVERABILITY.
It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases are separable, and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this Ordinance of unconstitutional or invalid phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections.

Armyworms Infest Small Grain Fields

Heavy population of armyworms are infesting many small grain fields and improved grasses in Callahan County, says Greg Gerngross, county agent.
The armyworm is primarily a foliage feeder and is about an inch long. Color varies from a light green to almost black. The front of the head is marked with an inverted "Y" with a yellowish-white line down the back from the head to tail.
After eggs are laid, it takes two to four days for them to hatch. They become full grown in two to three weeks and at which time it burrows into the soil and pupates where it remains for about 8 to 10 days and emerges as an adult. This life cycle of an armyworm is from 24 to 35 days long.
Several insecticides are recommended for control of the armyworm, Gerngross said. Producers can request a copy of insect control recommendations from the County Extension Office in Baird.

Social Security Is Good Investment

Many people do not seem to be fully aware of the extent of the protection they have under social security, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said recently.

Most everyone knows that social security includes survivor and disability protection as well. There is also Medicare health insurance, too.

The value of this protection grows as the worker's earning grow. To most workers, the value of their social security protection is probably greater than any life insurance they have. For example, benefits payable to surviving family members when a father dies can total as much as \$100.00 over the years, Hammons said.

There are many people well below retirement age getting social security checks. Of the 34 million people now on the rolls, more than 8 1/2 million are under 62. This includes disabled workers and their families, and the survivors of deceased workers.

Another important item to remember is that social security is portable; that is, the protection stays with a person when he or she changes jobs, unlike many private pension plans.

As workers plan for retirement, they should remember that social security is only intended to be a partial replacement of income. It was never intended that benefits fully replace pre-retirement income. Therefore, workers should plan to supplement their social security benefits with income from investments, savings, insurance or similar forms of income.

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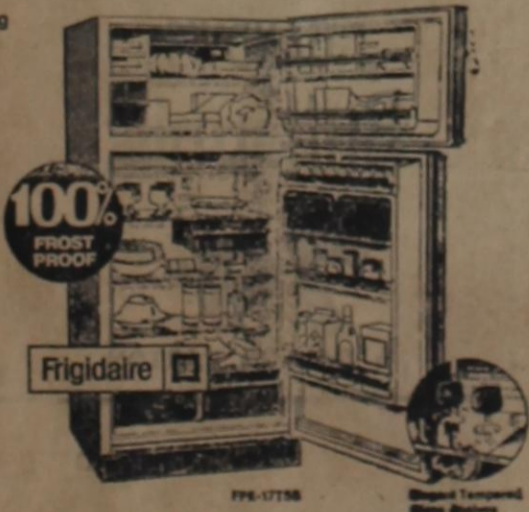
