

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

3. THE PLAN FOR MAN'S REDEMPTION WAS IMPER-FECT. The word of God is able to save our souls and to give us an eternal inheritance. Jas. 1:21; Acts 20:32. The law of Christ is indeed "the perfect law of liberty" Jas. 1:25. If man is lost it will be in spite of a plan perfectly adapted to his needs by God.

4. THE WAY WAS TOO NARROW. Even though our Lord taught that "narrow is the way that leadeth unto life" Mt. 7:14, He also tenderly invites all men to come unto Him, Mt. 11:28. In Mk. 16:15-16 hear Jesus say, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." "He" in v. 16 suggests any one, or every one. In fact the last paragraph in the Bible we read, "whosoever will, let him come." So when men are lost in that final judgment scene it will not be due to a way that was too narrow to accomodate ALL WHO WOULD surrender to Jesus!
