A stout De Leon Bearcat team whitewashed visiting Cross Plains Buffaloes 41-0 in a District 10-A football game last Friday night.

The loss dropped the Herd's league mark to 0-3 and the season record to 2-4. De Leon remained undefeated on the season having won all six outings, half of which were conference tilts.

An out-manned, crippled Buffalo squad surrendered 35 points in the first half to the Bearcats, rated first among Class A teams in the state in one poll and third in another. Athletic Director Chuck Eoff stated that De Leon was simply superior. "They are a lot stranger than I gave them credit for being," he said. He added that they are a much more physical team than expected. The athletic director said Cross Plains played very poorly in the first half, but did "a little better" in the second half.

Six Bison starters were at about half speed and two regulars did not even suit up for the contest. Bearcat Halfback Rondal Powell got the first touchdown on a 10-yard run climaxing a seven-play, 6-yard drive. He later tallied on a nine yard burst.

De Leon's Joey Wilcoxson got the second tally on a three yard run. Bearcat Rondal Sanders again kicked the extra point with

## Donnel Clark Is Honored For Long State Fair Work

Celebrating his twenty-fifth anniversary with the State Fair of Texas, Donnel C. Clark, Managing Director of the Livestock Department, was honored Thursday, Oct. 5, at a Texas Department of Agriculture pre-opening ceremony of the State Fair of Texas "Celebration Texas Style".

Highlight of the occasion was the unveiling of Clark's portrait, painted by Muriel Havran, a student of the world renowned portraitist Dmitri Vail of Dallas.

Also the establishment of an annual endowed Don Clark Scholarship for a student in the School of Agriculture at Texas Tech was announced. Established as an encouragement to 4-H & FFA youth showing at the State Fair to further their education in the livestock industry of Texas, the scholarship is a first for the State Fair of Texas.

Ray Carson of Garland, president of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, presented the check in Don Clark's name. It was made up of contributions by the state's purebred beef, dairy, poultry, horse, and swine breeders, individuals and organizations associated with livestock, Texas Agriculture and the State Fair of Texas.

Clark, a native of Cross Plains, the son of Mrs. Jeff Clark and the late Mr. Clark, began his livestock career as a member of the Cross Plains FFA under O.

B. Edmondson. He received his BS degree in Agricultural Education at Texas Tech University in June 1949.

After teaching Vocational Agriculture for 4 years in Mullin where he started helping Future Farmers interested in showing purebred livestock at the major livestock shows of the state, he found this to be his first love. This brought him to Dallas as the assistant manager of the Livestock Department of the State Fair.

Study! A privilege and Biblical advice:

"Study to shew thyself approved unto God . . ." II Tim. 2: 15b. also "—we beseech you brethren—study to be quiet." I Thes. 4: 10b-11a.

I find the following outline in the form of questions to be helpful in the study of any selection of Scripture.

1. What is there about God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit?
2. Is there any promise or warning given?
3. What sins or errors are to be avoided?
4. Is there an example to follow or a command to obey?
5. What is the main lesson of this Bible Portion?

Here is a use of this outline in the study of Eph. 5: 21-33. (Daily Bible Reading for Saturday. International Sunday-School Lessons).

1. (Answer to Question 1) God's love for the Church. He gave Himself That the Church may be a Holy Church.
2. Yes. Husband and wife shall be one flesh: Christ and the Church one Body.
3. Indirectly, the sin of improper relationship of husband and wife; also improper relationship of Christ and Church. (Due to sin).
4. Yes. Husbands love your wives even as Christ loved the Church and wives, reverence your husbands.
5. The main lesson is the love Of Christ for the Church and the love of the Church for Christ.

This is a beautiful analogy; whereby the assumption that Christians know and understand the proper relationship between husband and wife, therefore, with this reminder, we may be able to partly understand the relationship between Christ and the Church, which He says is a mystery. Ep. 5: 32.

"Our state taxes in Texas are among the lowest in the nation, and I want to keep them there. As I've said many times, I'll veto a tax increase before the ink dries on the bill."

## Vet Service Officer Notes Coming Query

Inasmuch as the Veterans Administration is updating income information and medical expenses, all Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non service pension will receive an annual income questionnaire card with their October check, which they will receive November 1st.

This does include those pensioners who have not in previous years received a card. This will include veterans over 72 years of age and children receiving pension in their own behalf. It is imperative according to Irvin G. Mobley, Callahan County Service Officer, that Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non service pension immediately contact the Social Security Administration and/or any agency from which they are receiving retirement benefits. According to the County Service Officer, it is imperative the right amounts be reported in order that the beneficiary can receive the correct amount of pension.

It is also imperative the beneficiary have with them when they bring the annual income questionnaire card to the County Service Officer, the total amount of medical expenses which have been paid during the year 1978, and which have not been reimbursed. These expenses include doctor, hospital, dental, drugs, hospitalization premiums, glasses and cost of nursing home care. Completion of the annual income questionnaire card will be mandatory by the recipients or benefits will be terminated effective January 1, 1979.
