SCHOOL TERM ENDS NEXT WEEK

File \$86,000 Project For Highway

WILL ALSO ASK FOR ROAD FROM HERE TO STATE HIGHWAY 191

The state highway department as sponsor has submitted a WPA application for a state recovery work relief project on highway 36, Abilene to Cross Plains, Division Engineer S. J. Treadaway announces.

The application asks WPA approval for grading, building of structures and rock base on 13.3 miles of the highway from its intersection with highway 1, east of the Abilene municipal airport. Estimated cost of the project is \$86,000.

The project would provide a minimum of one year's work for 120 men and likewise require considerable expenditures for materials. According to the application submitted by Treadaway, 7.3 miles of the project lies in Taylor county, the remaining six miles in Callahan county.

That sector in Taylor county has been partially completed and will require little additional work, Treadaway said. None of that in Callahan county has been touched, only the right-of-way having been purchased.

A \$25,000 bond issue voted last summer provided funds for the right-of-way from the Taylor county line to Cross Plains.

Application for the project has been sent to the Lubbock WPA office. From there it will go to San Antonio, thence to Washington. Treadaway expects final approval of the project within 30 to 60 days.

The highway department, as sponsor, will bear 42 per cent of the total cost, the WPA to pay the balance.

Only Taylor county WPA workers will be used on the project. Treadaway said. County Judge Lee R. York pointed out that the project would greatly reduce the county's relief burden.

Treadaway also hopes to get a similar project on highway 36 from Cross Plains to highway 191, Baird to Coleman.

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MILLION DOLLAR RAIN COVERS THIS SECTION THURSDAY MORNING

VOTE ON \$15,000 HOSPITAL BOND IS SET FOR JUNE 7TH

Callahan county voters will go to the polls June seventh to decide whether or not they desire to issue \$15,000 in bonds for the construction of a county hospital. The election was called at a meeting of the Commissioners Court last week after the presentation of a petition bearing more than 300 names.

The proposed hospital would cost, equipped, between \$20,000 and \$25,000. The county would bear \$15,000 the WPA to supplement and the city of Baird to provide cost of equipment.

Baird acted several weeks ago on the petition. Then the voters in an April municipal election balloted by a large majority to increase the water rate 15 cents above the present minimum of \$1.50, providing over a period of years sufficient funds to take care of the city's part.

The hospital would be built at Baird, probably adjacent to the courthouse in order that a central heating unit could be utilized in both buildings.

The hospital would serve both commercial and charity patients, the Review is told. Commissioners estimate that approximately \$200 monthly is being paid by the county for hospitalization.

WASHINGTON NEWS



FROM CONGRESSMAN CLYDE L. GARRETT

RECOVERY: It is estimated that real recovery will be felt in the United States when the national income reaches between ninety and one hundred billion dollars. This will mean all those unemployed at present will have jobs. The President has offered Congress a full recovery program which is outlined as follows: Some increased spending to add to the total of dollars that the unemployed and the Country's farmers have to spend, and in this way bolster production; Induce railroads and business men and prospective home builders to borrow money and invest in new plant and equipment, inventories, or in homes. A study of private price controls in industry in order to effect changes in the country's anti-trust laws.

MILITARY BILLS: A bill appropriating 227 millions for civil functions of the War Department was passed by the Senate and sent to conference. The military functions bill of the War Department is also being worked on by the conferees. An outlay of 480 millions for the coming fiscal year is called for in the Senate bill with 448 millions appropriated by the House.

IN AN ADDRESS: Before the Chamber in Washington, D.C., WILLIAMS said, a Houston, Texas, Cotton man said, "Make it possible for our millions of producers of food fiber and raw materials to enlarge the markets for their products and they will immediately buy more automobiles, more radios, more electric refrigerators and the many other things which the American people want. If we are to judge the future by the past, the pro-

duction of increased imports would be used to buy more of our goods. There is one serious flaw in the picture of the substantial recovery in our foreign trade since 1932. While our total exports have doubled, our agricultural exports have increased only 20%. In 1932, foreigners spent in this country one billion seven hundred dollars more for American goods than they spent in 1932, but agriculture only gets one out of every twelve dollars of this new business. In 1929 agriculture got one out of every three dollars of our export business. The explanation must largely lie in our treatment of the agricultural problem. Government price-pegging loans and Government-subsidized curtailment of production have over a period of years priced our farm products out of the world market, building up the production of competitive countries who have eagerly seized what we have deliberately surrendered. In our own interest we must make available to other nations our great surpluses of food and fiber and raw materials at competitive world prices and on terms will make other things than gold valid for payment. We already have their gold.

FEDERAL HOUSING: Funds amounting to approximately \$6,000,000 were made available by private lending institutions to finance the construction or purchase of 14,200 small homes under the FHA plan during April. This amount exceeded by \$12,000,000 the figures for April 1937 which set the high mark in FHA records for last year. These figures do not include modernization and repair loans nor large-scale projects.

NEW STAMP: Postmaster Farley announced that the new 1 1/2 cent Martha Washington postage stamp, which is to be placed on sale for the first time at the Washington, D.C., post-office on May 2, 1938, will be brown in color while in size it will conform to the one-cent George Washington stamp recently announced. 0.75 by 0.87 inches, arranged vertically. Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the new stamp from Washington on May 5, may send a limited number of addressed covers, not in excess of 10, to the Postmaster at Washington, D.C., with cash or postal money order remittance to cover only the cost of the stamps required by the covers. Each should have a pencil endorsement in the upper right hand corner to show the number of stamps to be affixed, which will obviate the necessity of sending a letter of instructions with the covers. To receive the affixed first-day postmark, covers must bear postage at the first-class rate.

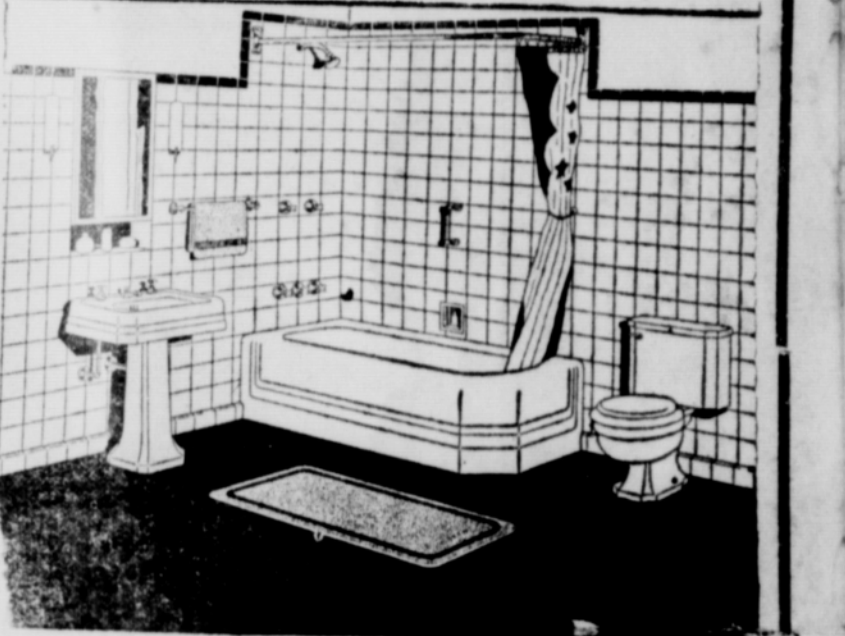

That all but 14 Texas counties are now under development for oil and gas is shown by a State map just prepared by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

As a result of the continual search for possible new oil fields in Texas 45 million acres of land, spread over 240 of the State's 254 counties, are now under lease in proven and prospective oil territory. This widespread activity of the State's oil industry has been a major factor in placing Texas to the forefront as one of the nation's bright spots on the business map.

Leasing of land, prospecting for and producing oil have collectively proven a boon to Texas farmers and landowners, for last year their combined income from lease rentals, lease bonuses and royalty payments amounted to 165 million dollars. And, it is likely that this year's payment will be even greater. On the basis of last year's total crop value, these payments to farmers and landowners of Texas constituted an extra "cash crop" which was the equivalent of 26 cents above every dollar received for crops.
