

HEALTH NOTES

Inasmuch as the incident of whooping cough in Texas is expected to show an increase during the coming months, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, released a statement today urging that strenuous efforts be made to control the spread of this debilitating childhood disease. There were 1273 cases reported during the first five weeks of this year.

"Whooping cough can only be contracted by direct exposure to the disease, and isolation of cases must be universally practiced if the incidence is to be controlled," Dr. Cox stated.

"The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking," Dr. Cox said. "The discharges from the nose and throat are dangerous to susceptible persons; the need for early recognition and careful isolation of whooping cough is obvious. Your family physician should be called at the first sign."

"The first symptom of this disease is usually a dry cough, which persists day and night and

tends to become increasingly severe. The disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the paroxysm of cough. Dr. Cox stressed the fact that children who have whooping cough should not attend school or come in contact with other children until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease.

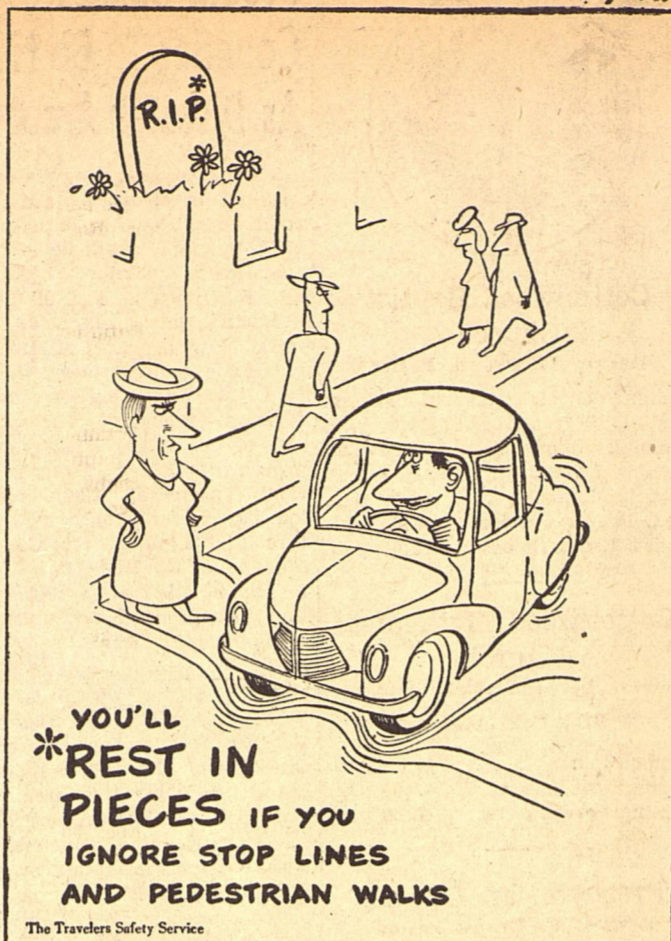
"Prevention and control of whooping cough, especially among infants and small children, may be accomplished through use of approved vaccine and convalescent serum," Dr. Cox asserted, "and it is important that such measures be taken to protect them. Neglecting to do so, and allowing the young child to suffer an attack of this disease, may seriously impair his future health."

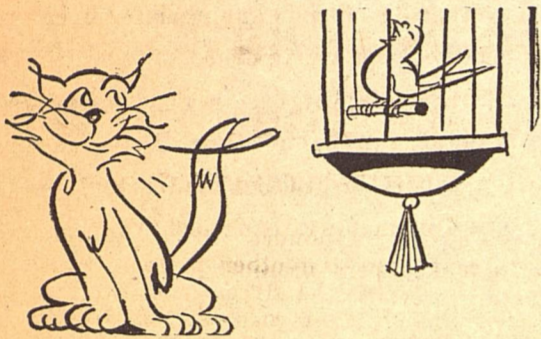
S. J. SMITH IMPROVING

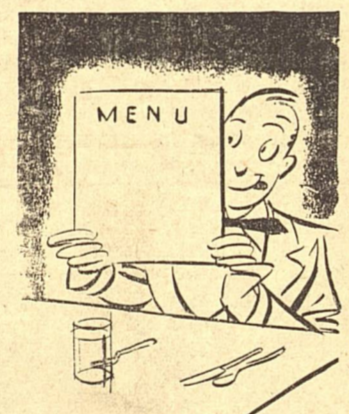
An American Legion Post was organized here Monday night and it will be known as Tommie Aiken Post in memory of a buddy who paid the supreme sacrifice.

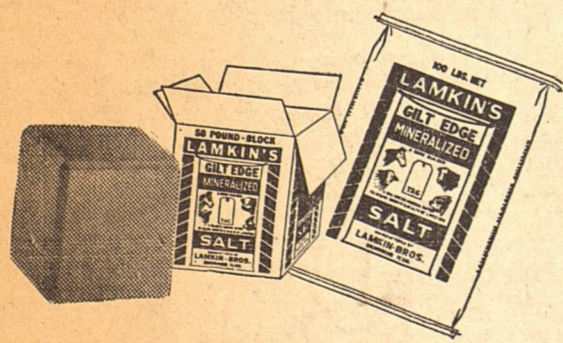

Veterans ? Box

Q—I am taking a correspondence course under the GI Bill, which I hope to finish soon. Would I be permitted to sign up for an advanced phase of the same course, also under the GI Bill, even though the 1951 cut-off date has passed?

A—Yes. But you must submit your application to VA for the advanced course before you complete your present course.

Q—I am a former truck driver, and I lost a leg in the Korean fighting. When I apply for disability compensation, will my payments be higher than they'd be if I'd been an office worker, for example, who could go back to his job even though he had a leg missing?

A—No. Generally, disabilities are rated on the basis of average impairment of earning capacity resulting from such injuries in individual occupations into consideration.

Q—I am a paralyzed veteran, entitled to \$120 a month pension because I need the constant aid and attendance of another person, in order to get about. Must that other person be a nurse, or could it be someone in my own family?

A—That person need not be a nurse. It may be any person, including a member of your own family.

Drouth Causes 89 Counties To Be Listed As Disaster Areas

The prolonged dry weather has resulted in the designation of 89 counties in Texas as disaster areas. No estimate is available of the actual losses sustained by farmers and ranchmen as a result of these production losses, but L. J. Cappleman, State Director, of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas said that the situation faced by farmers throughout the State is one of the most serious since the drouth of 1934-35. Drouth conditions reported by Cappleman follow closely those outlined by Pasture and Land Cover Conditions Map issued by the office of Louis P. Merrill, director, Soil Conservation Service of Texas, under date of January 15, 1952.

The map depicted conditions covering about two-thirds of the State extending from Bailey and El Paso counties on the west to Cherokee on the east and Starr on the South. Over this area, conditions are described as severe. Only in one-fifth of the counties are adequate moisture and cover conditions reported. A survey completed recently by Cappleman's staff indicates credit conditions are tight, which prompted designation of the counties as disaster areas and Farmers Home Administration has made available funds for crop production purposes.

The record breaking drouth cut crop yields drastically and because of low crop income many farmers have been unable to finance production of this year's crop. Disaster loans are available in each county designated as a disaster area. Farmers who have suffered production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, and repairs to machinery and other expenses incident to production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to family-type farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds requested to plant a crop this year. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor Clarence Symes located in the court house in Baird, Texas.

Cappleman admitted some concern about the lateness of the season and the lack of moisture and other favorable planting conditions. With the Department of Agriculture calling for full scale production in 1952, many areas of the State are going to be hard put to get acreage planted to the crops wanted in the production program. "Despite adverse growing conditions, I believe farmers will come through, he said.

Improved farming practices that are emphasized in the FHA program will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant at the time the loan application is prepared. In discussing farming practices Cappleman emphasized that a program of diversification is the safest course for farmers to follow. Case files in FHA county offices disclose that farmers who have carried out a balanced farming program with livestock do not need emergency aid this year even though they did sustain losses because of drouth conditions last year.

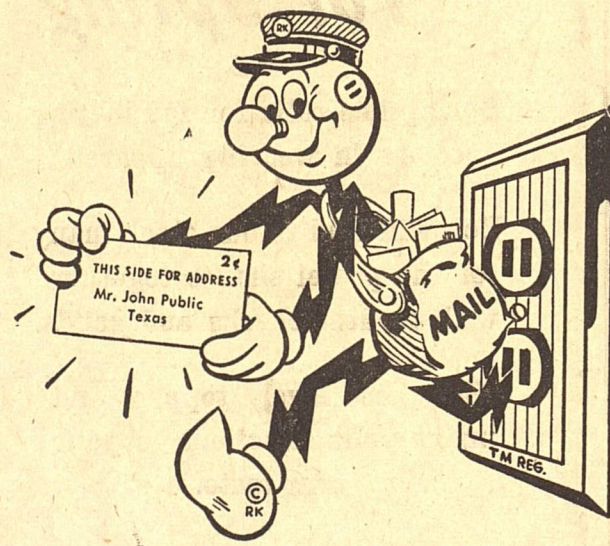

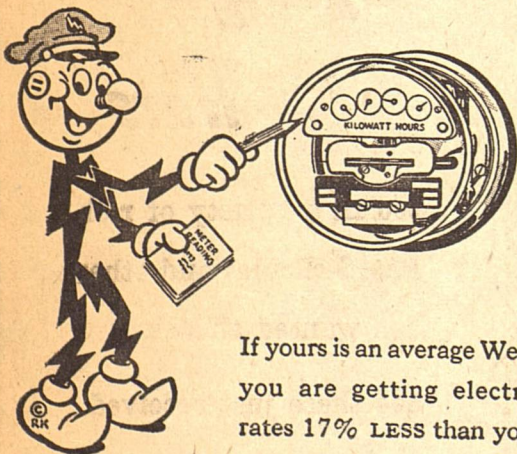

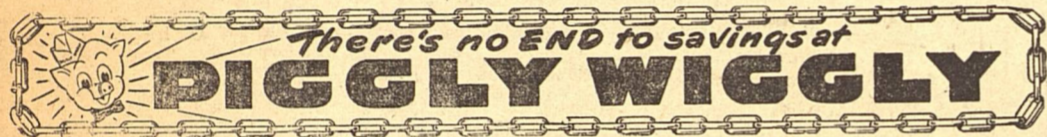
