Wise is known to have disliked very much the large score run up against his boys last year by the thundering herd, and vengefully admits that he may spring a surprise that will rock the conference.

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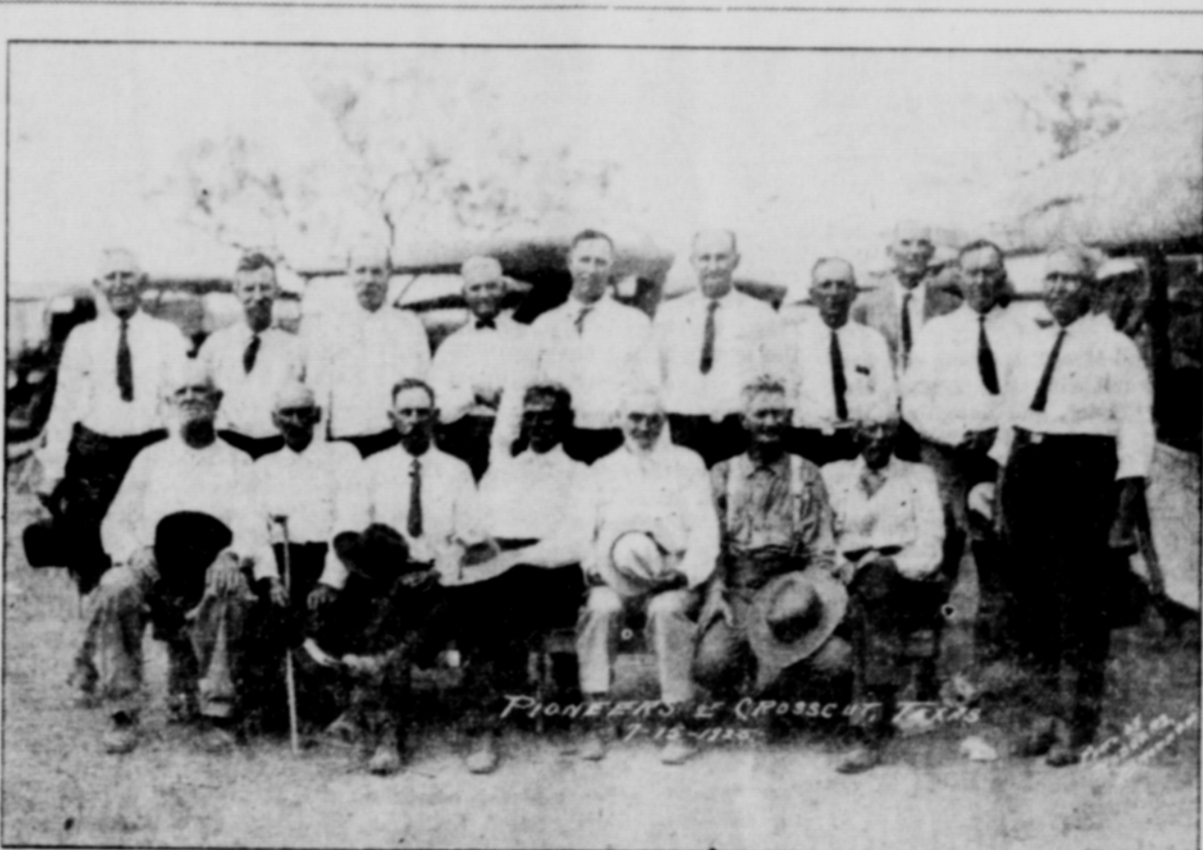
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Old Timers Down the Cross Cut Way

WASHINGTON NEWS

Washington, October 28.—Cain invented murder... was branded with God's curse and driven from the face of the earth—a fugitive criminal.

In our day comes murderer Vittorio Mussolini, proud son of an arch murderer—and beautiful American woman vie with high officialdom in feting and coddling this "hero" who, in his own words, "enjoyed as a beautiful sport" his dropping of bombs on defenseless and unoffending Abyssinians.

With the coming of Congress it is my ambitious determination to bring to you through this column many interesting side-lights on the session, about the White House, and the ins and outs of official Washington.

The President, in his radio address calling a special session of Congress for November 15, hurried several controversial and highly explosive issues back into the political hopper.

A hard fight is expected to develop in the House against the maximum hours and minimum wage bill which has already passed the Senate.

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

As this column is written, the Legislature has only three more days of actual work. I don't know whether they will have passed any substantial tax bill for the people's program. At this time the outlook is very doubtful.

The record shows that after some of the Senators had told through the newspapers about what they would do if I submitted appropriations to them, they suddenly decided that I had done so and accordingly considered economy wide open to them.

With only eight days left to work, the House of Representatives passed a resolution asking me to submit appropriations for economy: "BUT" even the author of the resolution said on the floor that he would not submit "put the monkey" on the Governor's back.

There has been so much talk about how much money the so-called "economists" could save by abolishing the liquor board that I want the people to have the facts.
