PIONEER

WASHINGTON NEWS
FROM CONGRESSMAN CLYDE L. GARRETT

OBJECTIVES OF THE NEW SESSION:
The President states his objectives for the new session. A wage and hour bill; authorization for government reorganization; crop control legislation; relief funds; curtailment of expenditures in a way that necessary government functions will not be endangered; national income must be raised to produce larger tax revenues and changes in present taxes without causing losses.

ECONOMICS:
The President is determined to cut government expenses at this time. He has recommended several curtailments to Congress among which are: Curtailment of several general public works programs such as river and harbor improvements and buildings because they do not provide as much employment as other types of work. Reclamation projects are to be stopped until those now under construction are nearly completed. Public building should be continued only on a small basis so that capital investment will be returned by savings in annual operating costs. Reduction of highway construction grants. Some of the Expenditures will remain the same and a few will be boosted but in general, the program is economy.

MONOPOLY:
The important point in the coming year in Congress seems to be monopolies. Some control to curb monopolies will be sought and enforced. The anti-trust laws are not much help in controlling business plays a large part in the reasons for revising these laws, as the government does nearly all of its purchasing on the basis of bids where competition is important. The government has always disapproved of identical bidding and will try to stop such action. Just in what ways monopolies will be curbed is as yet hard to say.

NEW JUDICIAL BILL:
Referred to a Senate Judiciary subcommittee, is a bill creating a dozen new Federal judgeships. These judgeships would be in the following States: Georgia, California, Kansas, Texas, Ohio, Louisiana, Michigan, Washington, and the District of Columbia.

POTATO SURPLUS BOUGHT FOR RELIEF USE:
Nearly 3 million bushels of the had been purchased for relief use by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation. Purchases of Irish potatoes were 4.2 per cent of the total shipments since June 17. Purchases from the 1937 crop started June 17. The ESCC had bought, through December 31, a total of 2,697,200 bushels of white (Irish) potatoes and 326,000 bushels of sweet potatoes.

ICE CROP ILLUSTRATED BULLETIN:
National Ice is a crop that farmers may harvest over a large part of the northern half of the United States. Lakes, streams, and natural and artificial ponds are the principal "fields" of supply, but where water is limited "canal" ice may be produced in galvanized iron containers, a few of them turning out a large number of blocks during the winter. Farmers' Bulletin 1078, Harvesting and Storing of Ice on the Farm, has just been reprinted by the Bureau. It is well illustrated, gives all necessary instructions on methods and detailed plans of storage houses, and shows how to provide for insulation and drainage. SPREAD IN BREAD PRICES:
The spread between the retail price of white bread and typical bread ingredients costs reached a 7-year high at the end of 1937. Not since December, 1930, has the baker's and retailers' margin been as large as it was in November and December, 1937. The average retail price of a pound loaf of bread for the country in December was 87 cents and the average cost of ingredients in a typical pound loaf was 2.6. This left an average gross margin of 6.1 cents for bakers and retailers.

SOCIAL SECURITY:
Nation-wide operation of the Social Security Act has been achieved in 1937 for the first time. It is no longer necessary to discuss the Act in terms of its promises; Today the Social Security Board is able to report on Nation-wide achievements in public assistance local funds.

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

BY JAMES V. ALLED Governor of Texas

Washington—Mrs. Alled and I are in Washington at the invitation of Vice President and Mrs. Garner to attend their annual dinner honoring the President and Mrs. Roosevelt. We found all of them in splendid health and the best of spirits. All the Texas Congressional delegation are quite busy especially Senator Caudill and Senator Sheppard in their fight against the Anti-Lynch Bill and for the Farm Bill. While here we are trying to look after several pending matters in which the State is interested.

Before leaving Austin the past week, I requested the Attorney General to file suit to cancel one of the Land Commissioner's famous of the Gulf Coast lands. The requested cancellation was based on two grounds, first, because the small cash consideration with no drilling obligation was so unaccountable as to be a violation of the law; second, because of legal fraud and, second, because the parties receiving the lease had not complied with the law requiring them to drill off wells where production has been secured within one thousand feet of State lands.

The Attorney General promptly advised me that he would file the suit on the grounds set out in my letter thereby confirming my contention that these leases ought to be cancelled. I then officially requested him to file suit to cancel eight other leases, but he has been quoted as saying that he would not study the facts in each case and that he would probably file only one suit as a test case. Of course, if he waits on a case to go through all the courts, then the State's right in the other tracts cannot be protected. They will be proved either dry or productive before the one suit can be disposed of. Also, in the meantime, these leases can be sold to others who can claim to be innocent purchasers.

The Attorney General is also quoted as saying that there is a good deal of politics involved in my requesting him to sue to cancel these leases. He ought to be the last person on earth to talk about Attorney General politics. If he is for political purposes then he should not file the suits. He either approves or disapproves of the manner in which the Land Commissioner has leased our public lands. He certainly should have an opinion that it is either legal or illegal, one of the other.

If he thinks it is legal and approves of what has been done, then he should say so and refuse to file the suits. If he thinks it is illegal then he should file suit and go after it as hard as he runs for office. But he can't win a lawsuit by starting in with the statement that politics dictated his course of action. What would you think if you filed a lawsuit and he started out by telling the court that he questioned your motives and doubted whether you were right but filed the case because he had to.

That's not even the way he presented Mary Dugan over the radio when he played in the Little Theatre at Dallas. He went after her hammer and tongs, and if he will only go after this bunch half as hard, he can win more for the state than he will get in ten Green suits.

The fact remains that lands belonging to the school children have been frittered away. They can be gotten back. I've done my part and the Attorney General is the only one who can get those national rights back. It's up to him.

(Continued from page 1) erday morning we were inspired with the possibilities for Cross Plains in the coming years.

From a sandy wilderness has arisen one of the finest little towns in this section of Texas and unless we miss our guess we are on the eve of a greater and brighter day than Cross Plains has ever known heretofore. Just what some morning soon your ham and eggs and will cost six bits and coffee dime a cup. Things are about to hit the upside and our guess is that oil will again be the contributing factor to the grand revival.

Q. Where did Santa Anna assemble his troops for his advance on San Antonio preceding the battle of the Alamo and what force did he concentrate there?

A. At Saltillo, Coahuila, from which place he started for San Antonio with 4,000 men.

Q. What was the Texas' retail business before the depression and how has it reacted?

A. Texas retail trade reached its maximum in 1929 at \$2,043,020,000. This fell to \$965,561,000 in 1933 and sprang back to \$1,288,000,000 in 1935, a gain of 33 per cent over 1933. The highest percentage increases were: automobiles, 58 per cent; lumber, building, hardware, 56; wearing apparel, 47; furniture household appliances, radios, 39; food stores 34.

Q. Who was William Motley?

A. A physician, born in Virginia, in 1812, educated in medicine at Transylvania University, Ky., came to Texas in 1835, youngest member of convention that framed Texas Declaration of Independence, aide-camp to Secretary of War Thomas A. Rusk, one of the nine Texans killed at Battle of San Jacinto, and was buried there.

Q. What was the customary rate or freight charges in the days of wagon transportation and how does it compare with present rates in Texas?

A. The wagon rate usually was one dollar per hundred pounds per hundred miles, or about twenty times the present cost on average length hauls.

Q. What renewed Spain's interest in Texas after the gold excitement of the early part of the sixteenth century?

A. Spain made little or no effort to settle territory claimed by right of discovery until after Fort St. Louis was built in 1682, but in that year began building forts and making plans to drive LaSalle out of the country and dispute any French claims.
