PROPOSED TEST OF ELLENBERGER LIME

After getting underway Tuesday afternoon and drilling 25 feet to a total depth of 125 feet, the rotary test on miles Northeast of town, was shut down yesterday morning due to boiler trouble.

Both boilers developed large leaks and were unable to furnish sufficient steam with which to drill. It was expected at noon Thursday, however, that the leaks would be welded and operations re-

umed by late Friday. To assure sufficient water for the test a well is being dug by hand offsetting the one drilled by a spudder. It is believed by the contractors that the hand dug well will supply ample water for the proposed 4,000 feet of drilling.

Interest in the test, which is about 600 feet Southwest of the old Vestal well which caused wild excitement in the early twenties,
