

## Mrs. D. C. Lee Is Buried Here Sunday Afternoon

Funeral service was held at 2 p.m. Sunday at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel here for Mrs. D. C. (Vivian J.) Lee, long-time Cross Plains school teacher.

Mrs. Lee, 75, was found dead at her home Friday afternoon by a friend. She had been in declining health for some time, but was still active in civic affairs at the time of her death.

Officiating the final rites was the Rev. Norman Dow, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Cisco and interim pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Cross Plains. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Born Oct. 5, 1903, in Proctor, she was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David S. Jennings. She married D. C. (Dave) Lee Feb. 11, 1939, in Coleman. He died in 1976. A resident of Cross Plains for 40 years, she taught in the local school system for 33 years, 1928-33 and 1943-71. She spent 45 years in the classroom beginning in 1923 at Gorman, and also taught at Junction, Aransas Pass, Sterling City, Howard Payne College, Ector County and Pioneer. She took her bachelor of arts degree from Howard Payne and her masters degree from the University of Texas. She earned her teaching certificate in 1927.

Mrs. Lee was considered an outstanding scholar. She had a major in history but during her long career also taught several other subjects in the local schools. She was in charge of the Cross Plains High School Library for many years.

Mrs. Lee, who often is praised by former students, was also active in the Presbyterian Church, teaching Sunday School and participating in the Ladies Bible Study meetings. She had recently worked with the Cross Plains Library Committee. An avid reader, knowledgeable in many subjects, she had authored many poems.

A former teacher associated with her said, "Mrs. Lee loved her family, friends and students and was loved and appreciated by them. Her teaching and influence for good will live on for years to come in Cross Plains and in other communities where her former pupils now reside."

## Early 'Dillo Touchdowns Doom Bisons To Defeat

Visiting San Saba scored 15 points in first two minutes and fifty seconds and coasted to a 25-14 win over the Cross Plains Buffaloes in a District 10-A football game.

The early scores were too much for the Bisons to overcome in absorbing their second consecutive conference loss in as many outings, and dropping the season mark to 2-3.

Buffaloes won the statistical battle, claiming twice as many first downs, 20 to 10, and outgaining the Armadillos 230 yards (138 rushing) to 185 (118 rushing). Turnovers proved to be the deciding factor. Cross Plains gave up the pigskin six times, twice as many as San Saba.

San Saba recovered a Cross Plains fumble on the opening kickoff on the Herd's 15. With less than a minute gone Dillo Richard Mims scooted 10 yards for the tally. Troy Hibler kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

Buffaloes were stymied on offense, and Moses Cisneros broke through, blocking an attempted Bisons punt, carrying it across from about 20 yards out. Mims then cracked over the left side for a two-point conversion and a 15-0 lead with 9:10 left in first quarter.

A long pass and run let up a 30-yard field goal by Hibler with 41 seconds left in the first stanza for an 18-0 score.

With backs to a strong north wind, Buffs threatened in the second quarter after Bison Allen Phillips intercepted a Dillo pass, returning it about 35 yards to the San Saba 22. The drive bogged down at about the six.

Next play, however, Mims was trapped in the San Saba end zone for a safety with five minutes left in the first half.

Phillips grabbed off another Dillo pass at the San Saba 23. Buff Randy Dillard rambled 18 yards to the five, and Fullback Glynn Nickerson got the touchdown with 3:05 showing. A two-point conversion failed.

The visitors mounted just one other serious threat, that paid off when Cisneros covered about 30 yards in two carries for the tally. Hibler's kick ran the score to 25-8.

Cross Plains retaliated in the final canto on a march. Phillips made a pair of pass catches to the San Saba 15. Robby Bailey got 9, and Ed Burkett recovered a fumble. Nickerson got the final yard after a flag against the Dillos with two minutes left. A pass failed on the two-point try.

Bisons will travel to De Leon Friday for a 10-A contest with defending champion Bearcats at 7:30 p.m.

De Leon is highly regarded, among the best Class A team in the state, with quick, fast and experienced personnel. They display outstanding running and passing attacks.

Ronald Sanders is field general capable of running and passing. Top ball carriers possibly are David Walker and Joey Wilcoxson, 195 pounder. Chuck Bush is a talented receiver. Line is anchored by Lloyd Eisenrich at center and Tim Hare at guard. Several Buffs are hurt. Among those doubtful for Friday are Darryl Robinson, Darron Koenig, Eddie Jackson and Randy Dillard.

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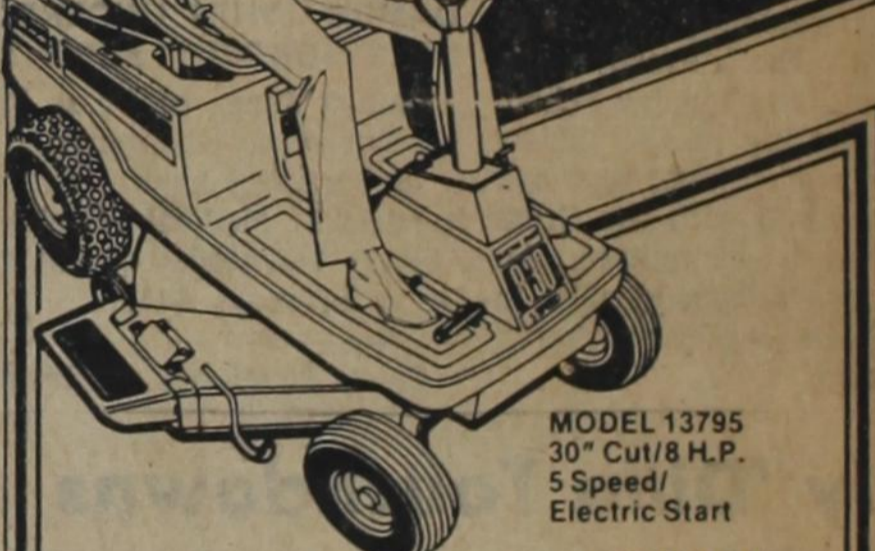

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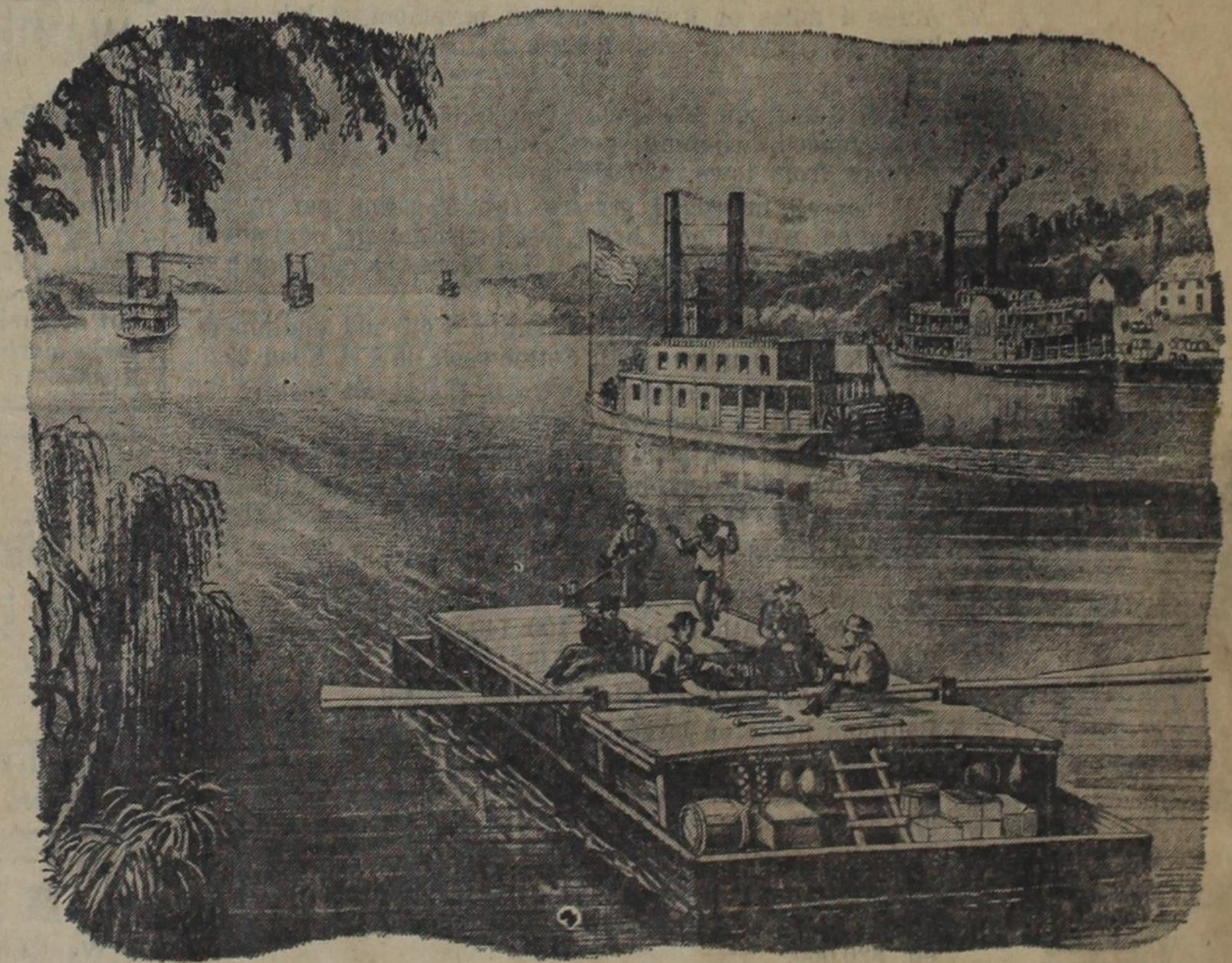
