MAYOR TO CALL MASS MEETING

City Mourns Death Of Civic Leader

Jesse McAdams Dies Suddenly Of Heart Attack Saturday At Noon; Funeral Here Monday Afternoon

Jesse McAdams, 58, prominent Cross Plains business man and civic leader who died suddenly in his Rising Star office of heart attack at noon Saturday, was laid to final slumber in the local cemetery Monday afternoon. Services were conducted from the Presbyterian church, of which he was a member, with Rev. R. B. Twitty, of Lyons, Kansas, friend of the McAdams family for more than 25 years officiating; he was assisted by Rev. S. P. Collins, pastor.

HEART ATTACK FATAL

Mr. McAdams left here Saturday morning for Brownwood to visit in the home of a sister-in-law who had died the day before. Returning, he stopped in Rising Star and had just finished his business for the day and was about to leave, when stricken. He slumped into a chair and gasped several times. A office employee summoned a physician immediately but Mr. McAdams was dead when he arrived.

City Shocked

News of the tragic occurrence cast a pall of gloom over this entire community, which knew Mr. McAdams as one of its most active and aggressive citizens. He had been agent for the Texas Company at Rising Star and Cross Plains for nine years. He was superintendent of the Presbyterian Sunday school, president of the Citizens State Bank, president of the Cross-Plains chamber of commerce, head of McAdams Motors, Inc., a director of the West Texas chamber of commerce, vice-president of highway 30 association, and active in every forward movement since moving here in 1929.

Friends crowded the Presbyterian church far beyond capacity and scores stood outside at the funeral service Monday afternoon. The Rev. Mr. Twitty who "had known Mr. McAdams 25 years and in every experience of life" took for his text: "A prince and a great man has fallen."

At the cemetery the local Masonic order, of which Mr. McAdams was a member conducted its ritualistic interment service.

A Civic Leader

During his residence here Mr. McAdams was identified with virtually every forward movement. Friends and associates came to look upon him as a leader and wise counselor. It was through his untiring efforts that a Chamber of Commerce was recently organized in Cross Plains. He was an advocate of good roads and led many delegations to Austin to submit projects for the benefit of this section. All Cross Plains business houses closed during the funeral and interment services in tribute to the memory of his eventful and useful life.

Man Who Beat Governor's Brother Here In Interest Of Attorney General Race

A West Texas jurist who has never tasted defeat, who defeated James V. Allred's brother for the district judgeship which he now holds, spent Friday night in Cross Plains contacting voters in the interest of his campaign for the Attorney Generalship of Texas. The man is Lewis M. Goodrich, of Shamrock, Texas.

At present Goodrich is judge of the thirty-first judicial district, serving his third term. He defeated Raymond Allred, brother of the Governor, for the office. Never in his long political career has the Shamrock man tasted defeat.

Having made public announcement of his intention to seek the Attorney General's office more than a year ago, Mr. Goodrich has already visited more than half of the Texas counties contacting voters.

He declined to make any statement as to whom he expected to be opposed by in the race, however, press dispatches indicate that Walter Woodall, present Lieutenant Governor, and Bob Calvert, Speaker of the House of Representatives, will both be in the race.

CITIZENS AND CITY DADS WILL DISCUSS MUNICIPAL FINANCE

Mayor S. P. Collins told the Review yesterday that he would call a mass meeting of citizens within the very near future to discuss matters of "supreme importance" to the local water and sewer systems.

Members of the city council in session Tuesday night voted unanimously to remit all interest and penalties on delinquent taxes up to and including January 31, 1938.

It was explained that the action is being taken to encourage in every possible way the clearing up of many past due obligations.

Despite the city's recent victory in the courts invalidating more than \$100,000 of municipal bonds issued against the properties of the city of Cross Plains, it was pointed out by members of the council that the municipal coffers are badly in need of cash. Refinancing has exhausted all available funds and revenues are not sufficient to fully complete the program.

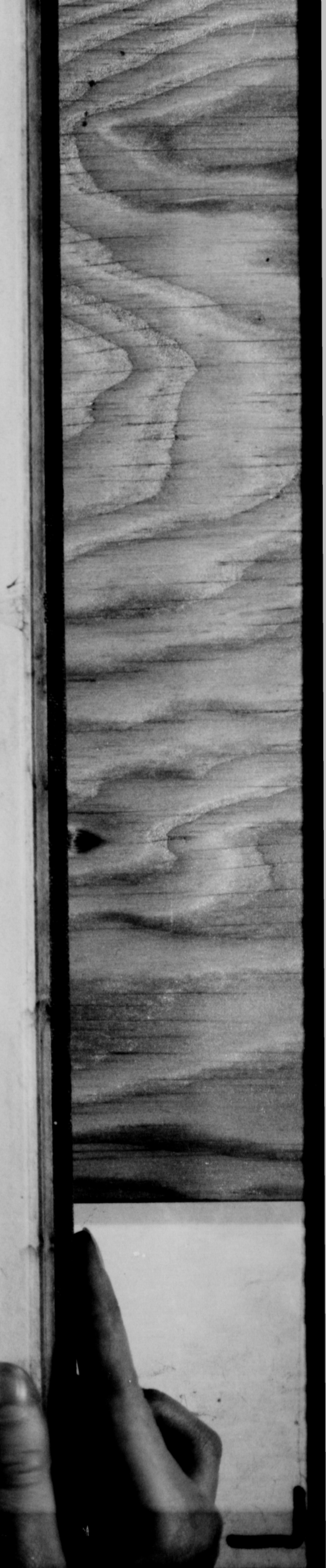

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

BY JAMES V. ALLRED Governor of Texas

AUSTIN—A few daily papers last week carried the story of an incident in Waco, which while amusing, affords considerable food for thought. The story reported the meeting of a group gathered from various points over the State to discuss the endorsement of a candidate for governor who would stand for a full pension of \$30 for every person over 65 regardless of need. Various possible candidates had representatives there trying to line up the old folks' vote.

The amusing thing is that with one exception none of the talked-of candidates have made any public statement as to whether they favor pensions for everybody or for the needy only. The meeting broke up without any candidate securing an endorsement, but with the understanding that one would be endorsed later on.

Now everybody is interested one way or the other. Whether we favor pensions for everyone, or for the needy only, we ought to know just where these candidates stand. Certainly no secret commitments or promises should be acceptable to even those who favor pensions for everybody.

We don't know yet, of course, just who will be candidates for governor. Several months are still ahead before the time expires for announcements, but the point is that none of us ought to let ourselves up to any candidate until we have some open public statements as to their views not only on this important question but on many others.

Many people, for instance, on both sides of the question would like to know the platform of each candidate on sale of liquor by the drink; on the general sales tax; on taxing oil and other natural resources; on an income tax; on a one-house legislature; on the race track gambling law; and on law enforcement.

You know of the fine work that has been done by the Public Safety Commission in driving the big time gamblers out of Texas. They have had to fold up their tents and get out of business. There is hardly a large community in Texas that has not been benefitted by being rid of the presence of these racketeers. Naturally the gamblers and racketeers are intensely interested in electing what they call a "liberal" as governor next year. They have openly admitted that they are going to put up money to try and elect somebody who will not stand for law enforcement. Let's find out what candidate they are backing before we commit ourselves.

There is another aspect of law enforcement just as important. You will remember that I said we were not going to have any "sit-down" strikes in Texas; and we haven't! At the same time I said we weren't going to have any violence on either side of the controversy; that is no interference with freedom of speech, assembly or peaceful picketing.

I happen to know that agitators who are interested in bringing about "sit-down" strikes in the future are trying to get quiet commitments from certain candidates that they will not be interfered with. I know the people of this State will not stand for this unlawful method of taking possession of property; or for violence on either side.

Let's find out about a candidate's attitude before we make up our minds to support him.

Finally, it might be a good idea to withhold judgment until we can examine the records of some of the suggested candidates; and see how those records fit in with their platform declarations, if they make any.

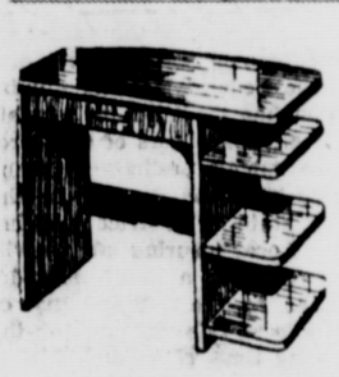
