W.P. Brightwell Heads Citizens Bank

JOHN BARR PLACED ON DIRECTORATE OF LOCAL INSTITUTION

W. P. Brightwell, Cross Plains ranchman, was named president of the Citizens State Bank Saturday afternoon, following the annual meeting of stockholders. He succeeds the late Jesse McAdams. John A. Barr, local financier, was made vice-president of the institution.

Six old directors: Brightwell, B. W. Webb, J. A. Newton, S. D. DeBusk, F. V. Tunnell and Edwin Baum, were re-elected by stockholders. Mr. Barr the seventh member, fills a vacancy created by the death of Jesse McAdams last month. The directors re-elected all officers of the bank. They are: F. V. Tunnell, cashier; Edwin Baum and Miss Loreta Vestal, assistant cashiers.

Stockholders in the annual meeting voiced a vote of approval upon the progressive policy of the bank. The continuance of devoting earnings to those purposes intended for permanency and greater solvency was unanimously endorsed.

Semi-annual statement of the bank shows it's condition to be in better shape than ever before in history, say those familiar with the situation. The statement which appears on another page of today's Review lists deposits at \$102,245.32, of which \$25,000, is state funds.

All deposits in the bank are guaranteed by the federal deposit insurance corporation up to \$5,000.

Hollingshead To Run
Olaf Hollingshead will again be a candidate for the office of tax assessor and collector, he said in an official announcement this week. Elected in 1936, Hollingshead is completing his first term.

Mr. Hollingshead, who is 26 years of age, is one of Callahan county's better known young men. He has resided in this county practically all of his life. After graduating from high school he attended Texas University three years, majoring in business administration.

34 Births And 11 Deaths Recorded Here During 1937

Nearly three times as many babies were born in the Cross Plains precinct during 1937 as compared with 1936; whereas deaths during '37 exceeded by five those of the previous year, according to Justice of the Peace Drew L. Hill, recorder of vital statistics.

During 1937, 34 births and 11 deaths were recorded during 1936.

Justice Hill reminds that parents who fail to record the birth of a child within 90 days are subject to fine. Physicians are also required to file death certificates for all fatalities.

CROSS CUT GIRLS; LOCAL AND BURKETT BOYS ARE FAVORED

With 27 teams entered, Cross Plains high school's annual invitation basketball tournament which got underway in the local gymnasium Thursday afternoon at four o'clock to provide the fastest cage entertainment seen in this section this season. Finals in both boys and girls divisions will begin Saturday night at 7:30.

Finals will begin Saturday night at seven thirty with the girls division being played off first. Boys finals are scheduled at eight thirty.

Handsome trophies have been secured to award members of the championship teams in both division, and members of the all tournament teams in both divisions. These awards will be made by Superintendent L. C. Norman at the close of the final Saturday night.

Admission charges will be made for each session; a session to include a complete afternoon or night of play. Seats will be charged 15 cents and students 10. Proceeds will be used to defray expenses of the tournament.

Although comparative scores are not available to completely dope the strength of all teams entered, Cross Plains and Burkett boys appear top heavy favorites in their division, while Cross Cut girls are virtually assured of a berth in the feminine finals.

DEEP OIL PICTURE BRIGHT AT FLORES WELL BEGINS FLOW

With the recently completed Flores well at Belle Plaine producing 50 barrels daily from the Elenberger lime, the Phillips Petroleum Company's test on the Cozart tract Northwest of Scranton nearing that horizon, and J. V. Howell's well about to spud on a block of acreage just North of Cross Plains, this area is expected to see a concentrated quest for deep oil within the next few months, believe local operators.

The Scranton deep test drilled through a nice showing of gas and oil in the Caddo lime—3,250 feet—last week and is heading for the Elenberger which is expected to be found about 3,800 feet. The Caddo lime showing is the third indication of oil passed up on the hole in order to attain the deeper strata. Two other showings were encountered below 2,000 feet.

J. V. Howell has contracted to spud a 4,000 foot test, just North of Cross Plains before January first. The test will be located somewhere in the vicinity of the old Vestal well which flooded the countryside with crude in the early twenties, and then quickly went to the bad. About 4,000 acres have been blocked for the well. Rotary equipment will be shipped in within the next 10 days and rigging up started.

Ordovician production for Callahan county was definitely established recently with the completion of the Flores well which is producing 50 barrels from 4,323 feet to 4,333 feet. The crude tests 40 gravitally and is accompanied by 120,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with pressure of 800 pounds. The test was drilled by the Woodley Petroleum Company.

BIRTHDAY BALLS IN COUNTY RAISE FUND FOR WAR ON 'POLIO'

Members of the executive committee for President Roosevelt's birthday ball in Callahan county report rapid progress being made by various community chairmen. Reports indicate diversified types of entertainment will be utilized to raise funds for the annual festivity, proceeds from which are used in a nationwide fight on infantile paralysis.

Amateur programs, basketball games, forty two and bridge tournaments, spelling bees and other phases of entertainment are scheduled for the night of January 29.

Funds from Callahan county will be concentrated by the newly created National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which was established at President Roosevelt's request and under his sanction last September to perpetuate the fight against this dreaded disease in every hamlet in America where there is need for the presentation of such efforts.

1937 saw this dreaded disease strike eight persons in Callahan county, with the result of three deaths. Physicians regard this as an alarming increase over previous years. Very little is as yet known about the malady which strikes the strong and the weak alike, children and adults, without regard to station in life and without warning.
