Workers have reported that many re-calls to persons still have to be made, and several businesses have pledged contributions but must await payment from home offices.

THE SIMPLICITY OF THE GOSPEL

Jesus was just as simple in his teaching as he was in his living. He was a Master in the art of illustration. He simplified all of his teaching by parables. He started with things that men knew something about to teach them things they knew nothing about. His diversity of parables was determined by the diversity of human minds. His teaching was adapted to all classes of people.

That the gospel of Christ is simple is apparent by the fact that it is God's power to save everyone that will believe it, Rom. 1:16. Jesus told the apostles to preach it to every creature. Jesus was the author of it, and he knew that everyone could get the meaning of it — the learned and the unlearned. However, the unlearned seems, have always been more receptive to the simple gospel. "For ye see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called." 1 Cor. 1:26.

I suppose that the three thousand converted on the day of Pentecost were just average people, and they learned enough about the gospel in one sermon to obey it intelligently, Acts 2:22-41. It did not take Philip long to teach the gospel to the Eunuch, so he could obey it, Acts 8:26-39. All of this goes to show that the gospel is simple.

The doctrines and commandments (traditions) of men have done much to obscure the light of God's truth. Think of the traditions of the Jews in light of the Old Testament laws of God. And today some of the things men differ about the most, religiously, are some of the simplest things in the Bible. The doctrine of baptism as taught in the Bible is a simple thing, and no one would have ever thought of calling anything but immersion (a burial in water, Rom. 6:3-4; Col. 2:12) baptism if men had not, in 1311 began to sprinkle a little water on people and call it valid baptism. And no one would have ever thought of baptism for any other purpose than: for the remission of sins, Acts 2:38; to be saved, Mk. 16:16; 1 Pet. 3:21; or to get into Christ, Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27; where salvation is, 2 Tim. 2:10; had it not been for the fact that men in the late 15th or early 16th century had not swung from one extreme, salvation by baptism alone, to another extreme, salvation by faith alone. When people begin to try to harmonize the "doctrines of men" with the word of God it IS confusing. But if we would only take the Bible and leave off the doctrines of men how very simple it would be. And this is our plea.
