Forgery Expert Caught In The Act

PLAYING A HUNCH, OFFICER NABS HOT CHECK SCRIBE HERE

Paul Speck, about 45, is in a Benjamin jail facing trial on forgery charges as a result of a "perfect hunch" followed by a Cross Plains peace officer—Deputy Sheriff W. A. Peterson.

Speck entered Bond Brothers store here Thursday night of last week, bought several dollars worth of merchandise and attempted to make payment by check. When told the check was not acceptable he went to Higdon's store where he again made several purchases, and tendered the check in payment. Again refused, he was about to leave the store when Peterson entered.

Didn't Look Right
Already knowing of the stranger's attempt to cash the check at Bond Brothers, the officer stopped him and asked to examine the instrument.

"The thing just didn't look right to me; it was drawn on a Knox City bank, however, a draft of a DeLeon bank was used. The check was payable to Paul Speck and was to be charged against the account of E. P. Speck", Peterson said.

Check Was For \$85
The following day the prisoner was carried to Baird and placed in jail where he remained until Knox county officers came to carry him to Benjamin to face forgery charges in district court there.

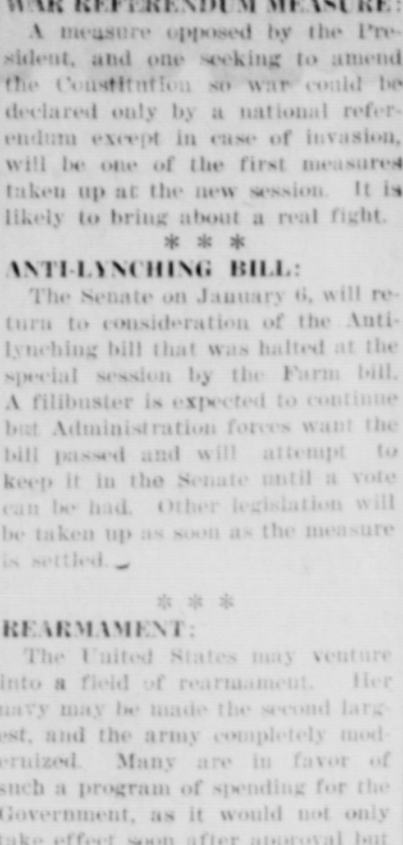
