Lady Pleads For Emergency Medical Service Support

It may be yours, it may be mine; or it could be your mother, father, husband, wife, brother, sister, son daughter, teenager or an infant. Whose life hangs in the balance, and their chance for surviving some tragic accident, depends greatly on a small and struggling group of volunteers. They are trying to cover Cross Plains and most of the outlying rural areas. These areas include Cottonwood, Burkett, Pioneer, Rowden, Cross Cut and other communities in this section. This is a statewide problem in rural areas, and Callahan County has made a contribution of \$5,000 to get the project started. But the actual heartbeat of this operation, is at present under the most capable but very busy hands of its coordinator, Shirley Emmons, and the equally capable co-ordinator, Billie Norton.

The Emergency Medical Service, which could be called the "core" or heart of this community, first began operation sometime in March 1978. It had the absolute minimum of trained personnel, Jim Greener, former Cross Plains Chief of Police, drove, Peggy Hilburn, L.V.N., and Richard Emmons, made up the entire dedicated and capable staff of attendants. Mr. Greener was injured in an accident himself, as I understand, and has not been able to

return to his duties. The group wishes him well. The ambulance is a contribution from the Higginbotham Funeral Home. It has had some years of service, but without it, I'm afraid there would be a noticeable lack of emergency medical service by this group or any group in another of the isolated areas of Texas.

It seems rather ironic that Shirley Emmons moved to Cross Plains when she did, and realizing the great need of some emergency medical aid, proceeded to try in some way to help provide that aid. Partially due to personal reasons, it became almost a desperation move, not only to help her own family, but the entire community. Maybe several of us have some rather selfish sounding reasons for wanting to see this project grow. Hopefully, we can increase the growing speed of this life giving organism.

I moved back to Texas in July of 1978, and almost immediately, I began to hear rumors of the new volunteer ambulance service which was struggling to make itself known to the whole community. I listened very closely, every time I heard the group mentioned. Yes, part of it was for the same so-called "selfish" reason that had made Shirley perk up. At any time I could use the services of some fast working and intelligent

people with more than the average amount of technical knowledge. Also I happen to be an R.N. who detested the fact that I was forced to go on permanent disability almost three years ago. Maybe I could be of some help to this group, after all, being idle and allowing your years of experience to go to waste is the worst part about "forced retirement". I have gotten to know the Cottonwood area in a small way, and realize that there are many older people in this particular rural section, just as well as there must be in most of the surrounding neighborhoods. This tiny group of volunteers has been serving actively, capably and willingly, far beyond the call of duty; and at the same time earnestly training to improve their skills to help prolong our lives, if and when we need their help.

To me this is a dream come true. I grew up a rural community, just 40 miles from Austin. Almost any serious accident or illness meant another fatality during those years, because by the time you drove over a dirt road into Austin, your patient would have expired. During my five years of training to become an R.N., I tried to enlist the service of every intern and prospective nurse, to move to Texas after graduation and help me set up a series of clinics all over this

beautiful state. Uncle Sam happened to have first priority, but after a stint in the Army, I went back to my old dream. At this time I had a pharmacist husband who also shared that dream, but it all died until this long awaited year. Attending the monthly meeting of the Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service on November 20, 1978, I was almost stunned to realize that within this group lies the answer to that long awaited dream. To the over-worked group, I'm sure it felt like more of the same old nightmare. It was obviously a very dedicated group, and their cause was one of the greatest, but so were the problems which they were all trying to find some solutions, that would not cost a fortune, but help in some way in their life saving project. Besides needing financial help toward purchase of essential equipment, there is an enormous need for more men and women to become involved. There was a grand total of eight ladies and two brave men present at this month's meeting at the City Hall. Actually only six of the women present have been pouring their hearts, souls and finances into this dream since last March, along with the two gentlemen present.

Even though there is a statewide need, there are no state funds available for the move-

ment, only encouragement in knowing that you are a part of a service badly needed. There are many stories of good done by such groups. One comes from the second issue of the newly formed "Emergency Messenger," the state health department reports a life saving situation in the Hudson Bend area of Travis County. That area has a group of "semi-trained" laymen known as the First Responders. One of these gentlemen works as a volunteer fireman and had been trained in E.C.A. This gentleman, Jim Farmer, happened to be working beside another mechanic, Michael Potersnak, when Jim noticed that Michael seemed short of breath and decided to check his blood pressure with a sphygmomanometer and stethoscope which he carried in his truck. Because of the abnormally low pressure and other symptoms, Jim called another worker who had also had a course in E.M.T., and between Jim and Bruce Ford, they confirmed their suspicions and rushed Michael to the nearest hospital. Later Michael gave credit and thanks to his alert co-workers for getting him to an emergency care unit only moments before he had a near fatal heart attack. I would like to do a follow-up article on some of the Bruce Fords and Jim Farm-

ers in and around Cross Plains, but feel that the spotlight should be on the heart of this organization, the real crew of the Emergency Medical Service and their problems.

It would seem that almost every source of fund raising has been attempted. Even though the county did give \$5,000 to begin with, and numerous other donations have been made, each attendant has paid for their own training in C.P.R. This was a cash outlay of \$25 per student, but out of this group came 19 licensed instructors. The above cost did not cover transportation to Cisco nor pay for the 40 hours they spent in learning this life-saving technique. The above training took place between May and June of this year. In September the group started driving to Brownwood two nights each week, and by December 7 they will have completed 148 hours of study in E.M.T. Eighty of those hours have been spent in classwork, the remainder at work in the hospital; again the cost out of each volunteer's pocket, will be \$62.25 plus transportation and time. Through their combined efforts, we should all feel a lot safer.

Some of the business people have made cash donations, among these are such people as Pat McNeel, Eddie Petty, Dillard Texaco, Johnson Dry Goods, the Paint & Palette Club (with a special thanks to Bob Pearson), and the Beta Sigma Phi which also gave generously. The group would like to thank the Senior Class for allowing them to have a booth at the Halloween Carnival. Their candies and bake sale would not have been possible without the Seniors' cooperation and neither would there have been a place for the drawing of the ticket that won the TV set which Mrs. Ophelia Merrill of Rt. 1, Rising Star was the proud recipient. If I have missed anyone's donation, a large plaque is to be placed at the City Hall in the near future, which hopefully will be filled with donations from this entire community.

One of the problems facing the service at present is rather urgent. Mr. H. Ambulance desperately needs a home where he won't collect ice and snow. There is a building site available, according to W. G. McCoy, who can be reached at 725-6658. The only thing missing is material and builders. If there has been an overlooked building available, would someone also call Mr. McCoy and make him an offer, because we need to move hurriedly on this effort.

Supplies are noticeably extinct when the ambulance is called upon to make an emergency run. Even the best of medical help can do nothing, unless they have an ongoing list of necessary supplies. Scoop stretchers, which are almost essential, cost \$163.25; but without one, it is impossible to move certain types of injuries without the possibility of bringing on sudden death. There are a lot of football injuries as well as normal automobile accidents, where moving the patient has to be extremely cautious. An ordinary Trauma Kit sells for almost \$500, but it carries the life preserving equipment, which every ambulance has to have. Even such items as O2 masks and nasal canulas for the use of oxygen, are just not available in various sizes. These only come in disposable lots since they can not be sterilized and used a second time, so there has to be a way of replacing these articles. Should an expectant mother need the ambulance service right now, she had better hope and pray that both she and her baby can get to the hospital before the "Big Event" happens, because there is no equipment for a safe delivery on board right now. The supply list seems endless, and even a roll delivery on board right now. The supplies just seem endless, and even a roll of bandage costs a small fortune, but picture an ambulance which does not even have splints for your children's broken legs or arms. Thus far you have a well trained and dedicated group of attendants and a shell of an ambulance. Let's try to help them to help us.

There is one other glaring necessity. Three members cover each 12 hour shift for 7 days at a time. That means that from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., that those people can not leave their telephones to go to church, to the market and not even outside their door. It was voted unanimously at this past meeting to try and arrange for six badly needed "Beepers." The cost to set these in operation so that a member can call in as soon as her or his Beeper is activated, is \$1,000. This vote was made on faith alone, so it behooves each and every one of us to see that this is made possible. In case you do not know how to reach the ambulance service, a call to 725-6666 will reach three well qualified attendants, almost immediately. Should you be at or near the scene of the emergency, it would be well to offer your assistance after they arrive, as quite often there will be women attendant, and some patients are difficult to handle. Be sure and wait for instructions before attempting to move any injured person who might have a neck, head or back injury. This kind of situation requires the utmost care, and again, a life is in jeopardy here. I mentioned the 24-hour shift that is covered when the 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. shift takes time off to relax, another shift begins and they are on call from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m.

Churches, businesses, clubs and individuals are urged to give as generously as possible—your time, your prayers and any other way in which you feel led to contribute to this life saving project. So come on Callahan County, let's show the Texas Department of Health and ourselves, just how much we care about Texas and the welfare of all of its citizens. It's our lives that are at stake here, so let's give ourselves the very best chance of survival through this most dedicated and well trained and ever growing staff of people.
