



ALLIED LINE IN FRANCE AND FLANDERS HOLDS

GERMANS HAVE NOWHERE BEEN LATEST THRUSTS.

Teutons Were Unable to Hold It. Repulsed at Other Points.

London.-The entire allied line France and Flanders still stands firm-Nowhere have the Germans been Hard fighting has been in progress on the Ypres sector around Voorme e had been recaptured by the Britsh, but the Germans had obtained another foothold in Locre.

Voormezelee was taken by the Germans Saturday, but the British in a night attack won it back and since have held it, inflicting heavy casualties on the Germans in renewed efforts to take the place.

The Germans have tried at several points along the front held by the French to pierce the line, but everywhere have been repulsed, notably in the St. Mihiel and Luneville sectors. where recently American troops were stationed. Whether the Americans again came in contact with the ene ny was not vouchsafed by the French official communication.

Aside from these attacks and a few unimportant operations between the British and Germans, artillery duels have predominated. The big guns of the French and the Germans have been carrying out mighty reciprocal bombardments north of the Avre river and in the region between Lassigny and Noyon.

Reports are to the effect that in lermany there is much perturbation over the inability of the Teutons to pierce the allies' lines and nervousness and depression over the losses the Germans have suffered

Passenger Ship Turns Over at Pier. An Atlantic Pert.—The American ine steamship St. Paul, a famous passenger liner, overturned and sank at her pier here while being warped into a pier preparatory to loading for a trip to Europe. Three men prebably lost their lives in the accident. The St. Paul was not under steam at the time, but was being brought by tugs from a dry dock, ired men-a majority of them em ployes of the dry dock-who had been sent with the vessel to complete their work while she was be ing loaded. The steamer now is lying on her port side with about ten feet of her hull amidships above water and is completely submerged both fore and aft.

Holland Vields to Two Hun Demands London.-Holland has yielded to Germany's demands concerning transport and the supply of sand and gravel, although it is understood that the amount of sand and gravel will be limited instead of unlimited, according to a dispatch from The

Proposes German Boycott After War. Washington.-International boycett of Germany after the war unless the German Reichstag or people by referendum accept definite principles of international law is proposed in a senate resolution sponsored by Senator Owen of Oklahoma.

Board Declines to Fix Cotton Price. Washington.-The War industries poard has informed the National council of American Cotton manufacturers that it would not fix a price on raw cotton, as it was not necessary to the Government's operations in respect to the cotton goods being purchased for the army and navy. Fear has been that the price of the raw material would be related to the finished product when the government became a purchaser, as appears to have been the case with linters in the manufacture of powder.

Great French Liner Launched. Paris.-The largest freighter in the French mercantile marine service has been launched in Dunkirk and now is safe in a French port remote from the fighting zone. It is 450 feet long and is of 19,000 tons displacement. The Germans, aware of the location of the shipyard, tried in every way to interfere with the work and destroy the yard and ships. The manstry of marine considers it a great feat to build and launch a great ship

within seven miles of the actual fight-

ing zone.

Champ Clark Declines Senatorship. Washington-Speaker Champ Wark has declined Governor Gardner's proffer of the Missouri senatorship to fill the vacancy caused by Senator Stone's death. Mr. Clark's announcement came after two days of consultation with political and personal friends. Mrs. Clark and Mrs. James W.
