### FERGUSON'S COUNSEL INTRODUCE EVIDENCE

THREE WITNESSES PUT ON STAND BY DEFENSE IN IMPEACHMENT TRIAL.

### PROponents FINISH CASE

"We Want Other Witnesses, but Most of Those We Want Are Out of State, Atty. for House Says."

Austin.—The defense began the introduction of evidence Thursday in the trial of Gov. James E. Ferguson before the senate upon articles of impeachment returned by the house. W. A. Hanger, chief counsel for the governor, called to the stand Frank H. Hargon, cashier in the secretary of state's department; Henry S. Fox, Jr., president of the National Exchange bank of Houston, who has previously testified, and J. H. Davis, Jr., assistant private secretary of the governor, who has not been called to the stand before.

M. M. Crane introduced additional evidence for the proponents, most of it being of a documentary character, and to close up odds and ends of the testimony which had not been linked up or developed.

The defense testimony dealt almost entirely with the personal and official accounts of the governor at the Temple State bank and with the secretary of state's account there.

W. D. Hornaday of the San Antonio Express was called to the stand by the proponents and testified that his report of the governor's speech before the house last March, during the pendency of the investigation resolution, was true and correct, and that the governor then stated that he did not owe the Temple state bank anything.

Mr. Crane said he had no other witnesses to call. "We want other witnesses," he added, "but most of those we want need to be temporarily out of the state."

### ADMIT FERGUSON'S TESTIMONY.

President Pro Tem, Dean of Senate Court of Impeachment, So Rules.

Austin.—Proponents of the impeachment articles against Gov. Jas. E. Ferguson gained a point that members of the house board of managers and their attorneys regard as very important, when President Pro Tem Dean of the senate overruled the objection of the governor's attorneys and sustained the contention of proponent attorneys that Governor Ferguson's testimony be offered from the house record and read as evidence to the senate sitting as a court to try the governor upon the impeachment articles presented by the house.

This ruling of President Dean was made following an argument which lasted practically the entire day between opposing counsel as to the admissibility of the evidence.

No appeal was taken from President Dean's decision that the evidence is admissible. It is believed by some that the ruling, in its final analysis, may mean that Governor Ferguson will decide to take the witness stand in person, if that was not already his intention.

### Officers Inspect Army Camp Sites.

Dallas.—A permanent army post and training camp for which the government desires 250,000 acres of land will be located within 50 miles of Dallas if a suitable site can be found. An army locating board arrived here from San Antonio, and after a conference with Major Lawther and officials of the chamber of commerce, the officers left Dallas to inspect five possible sites. It is believed that the camp will be located in east Texas. If a suitable tract is found. It is the intention of the government to construct a war camp similar to that in which the British government is training its men for service. No less than 30,000 men will be trained at a time, and at this camp they will be expected to prepare themselves for immediate service in France.

### Road Bond Election Ordered.

Starston.—An election has been ordered to be held Oct. 13 in road district No. 1, Ward county, comprising the three precincts traversed by the Texarkana-Paso highway, for the purpose of voting upon a road bond issue in the sum of \$40,000.

### Road Bonds Voted.

The flies are worse the last few days than any time before during the year. The town has not been kept as clean as it should have been, else these flies would not be so common. The out-houses of the town should be kept clean as possible and lime should be used copiously, and fly poison, too.

The country has not gone to the remission bowwows as yet. After going through the biggest drouth since '86, or partly through, we are now expecting as much out of crops as we have received in several years, barring the last two. Fifteen dollars an acre out of cotton is not bad, and what peanuts promise in yield and price is encouraging. The price should be close to \$1.50. Some farmers are claiming 30 bushels.

We regret to see any man, married or single, leave his folks to go to war, and yet they must go. We are firmly convinced that this is our most just war, and that Germany must be conquered. We believe that most of our boys go willingly. We confidently expect nine-tenths of them or more to return home unscathed and all the better for the experience. In after years the veterans of this war will be the choice of the country in every endeavor.

The best young men of the country are leaving and are soon to leave for training preparatory to going to a foreign country to wage war. For those who are thus serving their country in her need, a good example for their emulation can be found in the life of Daniel while in captivity, which was covered in the Sunday School lesson two weeks ago. He and his companions refused to eat of the King's diet and drink his strong drinks, although punished severely for refusing to do so. They adhered strictly to the simple diet taught them in the Holy Land, and their comeliness and physical beauty and intellectual astuteness were easily noted by all. The lesson is the good resulting from a simple and temperate life, and of adhering to one's convictions, even in a foreign land.

## DALLAS COUNTY VOTES DR?

Large Rural Vote Overcomes Sma. Anti Lead in the City.

Dallas.—In the local option election Monday Dallas county declared for prohibition by a majority of 1,831, with only three small county precincts, which are expected to increase the pro lead to possibly 2,900. A total vote, except the three precincts, was 10,381 for prohibition and 8,497 against.

The county precincts gave prohibition a majority, outside the city, of 2,871. The city vote was a majority for the anti.

Of 56 county precincts 53 gave the prohibition, for a total of 2,871. The vote carried 12.

The vote cast was recorded in Dallas county and being close to 20,000, the strength of the county.

Cotton Conference in Dallas Sept. 19

Austin.—As a preliminary to the conference called for Sept. 21 at Dallas to discuss the cotton situation, committees from the state department of agriculture, the state warehouse and marketing department, the Farmers' Union and the Retail Merchants' association, will meet in Dallas Sept. 20. J. W. Neill, director of farmers' institutes, has issued a call to the field forces to meet at Dallas Sept. 19 and 20 for the purpose of discussing plans for farmers' institute work.

Many at Work on Aviation Camps.

Fort Worth.—Men employed on construction at the aviation camp at Hicks station, 10 miles from the city use the railway in going to their work or returning to the city. About 750 carpenters and probably twice as many more laborers and teamsters are employed at the camp alone. The men work 10 hours a day and receive pay for 11 hours. Laborers get \$2.75 a day and carpenters 67 1/2c an hour, or \$7.30 a day, with overtime. One camp is being built at Hicks and another at Everman, 12 miles south of the city. In a short time construction work will begin on the third camp, which probably will be located at Scottsdale, 20 miles southwest of the city.

Fight Begun on Pink Bollworm.

Austin.—Prompt and drastic steps are to be taken to exterminate the pink bollworm, which has appeared near Hearne, in Robertson county. Immediately after receipt of a telegram from C. L. Marlatt, chairman of the federal board of horticulture at Washington, urging co-operation of the state forces with federal representatives in the destruction of cotton in the infected fields, E. T. Scholl, chief entomologist of the Texas department of agriculture, issued orders for the concentration of state forces at Hearne.

Must Refund \$64,000 Unused Licenses

Dallas.—It is announced at the city hall that the city will be required to refund the sum of approximately \$19,444.07 for unused liquor licenses. The yearly income from saloon and wholesale liquor house licenses is \$39,562.50, according to the monthly reports of the city tax assessor. State and county licenses, which will be refunded, will total more than \$64,000.

Fireman Killed in Katy Wreck.

Hughes Springs.—A Katy fast freight was wrecked at Newline, about 20 miles east of this place. The engine turned over, killing Fireman A. J. Ballard instantly and seriously scalding Engineer Bob Coffee, both of Greenville.

10,000,000 Feet Gas Well at Corsicana

Corsicana.—A gas well that is said to be flowing 10,000,000 feet of gas daily has been brought in in the Corsicana-Powell oil field at Powell. Its flowing can be heard for a long distance and great numbers of people went out from Corsicana to see the well. Powell is ten miles east of Corsicana on the Cotton Belt railroad. The well is owned by the Deep Sand Oil and Gas company of Corsicana. It has caused considerable excitement and other developments will follow.

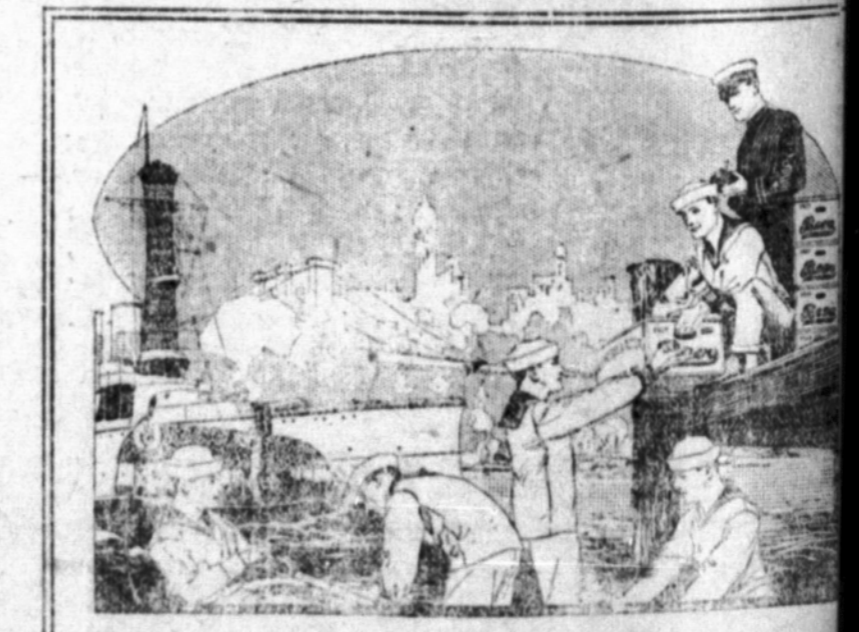

**DALLAS COUNTY VOTES DR?**

Large Rural Vote Overcomes Small Anti Lead in the City.

Dallas.—In the local option election Monday Dallas county declared for prohibition by a majority of 1,181, with only three small counties missing, which are expected to increase the pro lead to possibly 4,000. A total vote, except the three precincts, was 10,381 for prohibition and 4,977 against.

The county precincts gave prohibition a majority, outside the city, of 2,871. The city vote was a majority for the anti.

Of 56 county precincts the prohibition, for a majority, was the vote. Of the 3,000, 1,500 were carried 13.

The vote cast was recorded in Dallas county being close to 20,000. The strength of the prohibitionists will have to be tested in the latest. The county is required to issue orders within 30 days.

Final orders will be issued within 30 days of the vote.

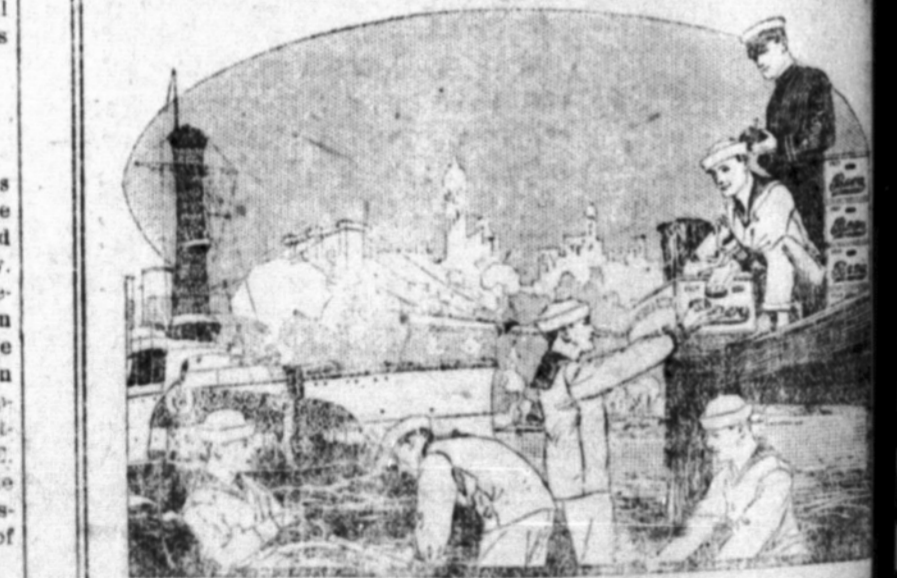

## A Car Saved is A Car Made



American railroads must carry a double burden of service during the war. Their efficiency is essential in developing national military effectiveness. They also must "do their bit" by helping to maintain "Business as Usual".

More than 100,000 cars will be required for government purposes during the next three months. Transportation facilities will be taxed to capacity by commercial requirements during this period. Government business must have preference however, and effective conservation of equipment is therefore imperative. Additional facilities and equipment can not be had now. Carriers and shippers alike have been wasteful in the use of cars. It is the patriotic duty of both to economize. Wherever possible, light loading of cars, delays in loading or unloading, and kindred practices must be avoided as in violation of national welfare.

Maximum Loading of Katy cars moved under load in 1916 would have saved 43,000 cars. Such a saving would provide enough cars to transport approximately 50,000,000 bushels of wheat. With full co-operation of shippers and consignees in the effort the management is making to conserve equipment the supply of cars on the M. K. & T. Lines for the use of commercial shippers can be increased 30%.

Railroads are peculiarly dependent upon public co-operation. Without public understanding of their problems and popular support of their proper purposes they cannot successfully perform their functions.

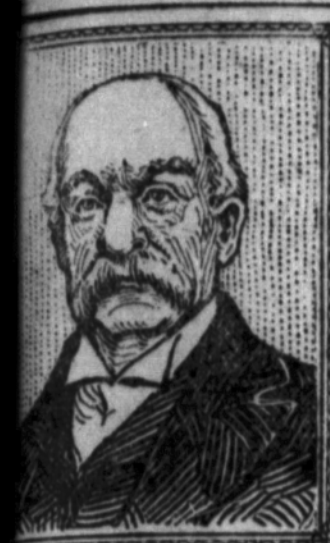

FERGUSON'S COUNSEL INTRODUCE EVIDENCE

THREE WITNESSES PUT ON STAND BY DEFENSE IN IMPEACHMENT TRIAL.

PROPOSERS FINISH CASE

"We Want Other Witnesses, but Most of Those We Want Are Out of State, Atty. for House Says.

Austin.—The defense began the introduction of evidence Thursday in the trial of Gov. James E. Ferguson before the senate upon articles of impeachment returned by the house. W. A. Hanger, chief counsel for the governor, called to the stand Frank H. Hargon, cashier in the secretary of state's department; Henry S. Fox, Jr., president of the National Exchange bank of Houston, who has previously testified, and J. H. Davis, Jr., assistant private secretary of the governor, who has not been called to the stand before.

M. M. Crane introduced additional evidence for the proponents, most of it being of a documentary character, and to close up odds and ends of the testimony which had not been linked up or developed.

The defense testimony dealt almost entirely with the personal and official accounts of the governor at the Temple State bank and with the secretary of state's account there.

W. D. Hornaday of the San Antonio Express was called to the stand by the proponents and testified that his report of the governor's speech before the house last March, during the pendency of the investigation resolution, was true and correct, and that the governor then stated that he did not owe the Temple state bank anything.

Mr. Crane said he had no other witnesses to call. "We want other witnesses," he added, "but most of those we want seem to be temporarily out of the state."

ADMIT FERGUSON'S TESTIMONY.

President Pro Tem, Dean of Senate Court of Impeachment, So Rules.

Austin.—Proponents of the impeachment articles against Gov. J. E. Ferguson gained a point that members of the house board of managers and their attorneys regard as very important, when President Pro Tem Dean of the Senate overruled the objection of the governor's attorneys and sustained the contention of proponent attorneys that Governor Ferguson's testimony be offered from the house record and read as evidence to the senate sitting as a court to try the governor upon the impeachment articles presented by the house.

This ruling of President Dean was made following an argument which lasted practically the entire day before the senate. The governor's attorneys and the proponent attorneys contended that the governor's testimony be read as evidence to the senate sitting as a court to try the governor upon the impeachment articles presented by the house.

It is believed by some that the ruling, in its final analysis, may mean that Governor Ferguson will decide to take the witness stand in person, if that was not already his intention.

Officers Inspect Army Camp Sites.

Dallas.—A permanent army post and training camp, for which the government desires 250,000 acres of land, will be located within 50 miles of Dallas if a suitable site can be found. An army locating board arrived here from San Antonio, and after a conference with Mayor Lawler and officials of the chamber of commerce, the officers left Dallas to inspect five possible sites. It is believed that the camp will be located in east Texas, if a suitable tract is found. It is the intention of the government to construct a war camp similar to that in which the British government is training its men for service. No less than 30,000 men will be trained at a time, and at this camp they will be expected to prepare themselves for immediate service in France.

Road Bond Election Ordered.

Barstow.—An election has been ordered to be held Oct. 13 in road district No. 1, Ward county, comprising the three precincts traversed by the Texarkana-El Paso highway, for the purpose of voting upon a road bond issue in the sum of \$60,000.

Road Bonds Voted.

## DALLAS COUNTY VOTES DRY

Large Rural Vote Overcomes Small Anti Lead in the City.

Dallas.—In the local option election Monday Dallas county declared for prohibition by a majority of 3,841 with only three small county bases missing, which are expected to increase the pro lead to possibly 4,000. A total vote, except the three precincts, was 10,381 for prohibition and 6,487 against.

The county precincts gave prohibition a majority, outside the city, of 2,871. The city vote was a majority for the anti.

Of 16 county bases, 5 were for prohibition, for a total of 1,000. The vote, of the 5 cities, was 1,000 pro, carried 13.

The vote cast was 10,381 for prohibition, and 6,487 against. The vote being close to 20,000, the strength of the county vote was 10,000. Officials figure that the county will have to vote 10,000 for prohibition to carry the county.

Final arrangements for a boxes for the county will be made within 30 days.

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## Cotton Conference in Dallas Sept. 19

As a preliminary to the conference called for Sept. 21 at Dallas to discuss the cotton situation, committees from the state department of agriculture, the state warehouse and marketing department, the Farmers' Union and the Retail Merchants' association will meet in Dallas Sept. 20. J. W. Neill, director of farmers' institutes, has issued a call to the field forces to meet at Dallas Sept. 19 and 20 for the purpose of discussing plans for farmers' institute work.

## Many at Work on Aviation Camps.

Port Worth.—Men employed on construction at the aviation camp at Hicks station, 10 miles from the city use the railway in going to their work or returning to the city. About 750 carpenters and probably twice as many more laborers and teamsters are employed at the camp alone. The men work 10 hours a day and receive pay for 11 hours. Laborers get \$2.75 a day and carpenters 67¢ an hour, or \$7.40 a day, with overtime. One camp is being built at Hicks and another at Everman, 12 miles south of the city. In a short time construction work will begin on the third camp, which probably will be located at Scottsdale, 20 miles southwest of the city.

## Fight Begun on Pink Bollworm.

Austin.—Prompt and drastic steps are to be taken to exterminate the pink bollworm, which has appeared near Hearne, in Robertson county. Immediately after receipt of a telegram from C. L. Marlatt, chairman of the federal board of horticulture at Washington, urging co-operation of the state forces with federal representatives in the destruction of cotton in the infected fields, E. E. Scholl, chief entomologist of the Texas department of agriculture, issued orders for the concentration of state forces at Hearne.

## Must Refund \$64,000 Unused Licenses

Dallas.—It is announced at the city hall that the city will be required to refund the sum of approximately \$19,444.07 for unused liquor licenses. The yearly income from saloon and wholesale liquor house licenses is \$39,562.50, according to the monthly reports of the city tax assessor. State and county licenses, which will be refunded, will total more than \$64,000.

## Fireman Killed in Katy Wreck.

Hughes Springs.—A Katy fast freight was wrecked at Newline, about 20 miles east of this place. The engine turned over, killing Fireman A. J. Ballard instantly and seriously wounding Engineer Bob Coffey, both of Greenville.

## 10,000,000-Foot Gas Well at Corsicana

Corsicana.—A gas well that is said to be flowing 10,000,000 feet of gas daily has been brought in to the Corsicana field of field at Powell. Its roaring can be heard for a long distance and great numbers of people went out from Corsicana to see the well. Powell is ten miles east of Corsicana on the Cotton Belt railroad. The well is owned by the Deep Sand Oil and Gas company of Corsicana. It has caused considerable excitement and other developments will follow.

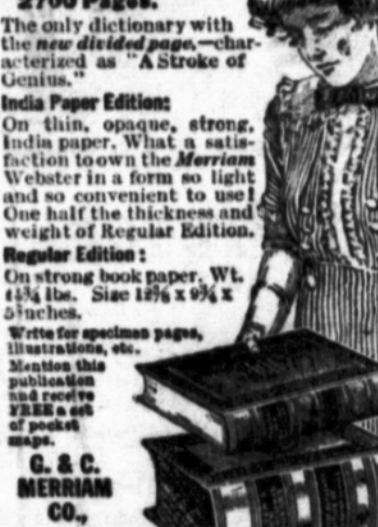

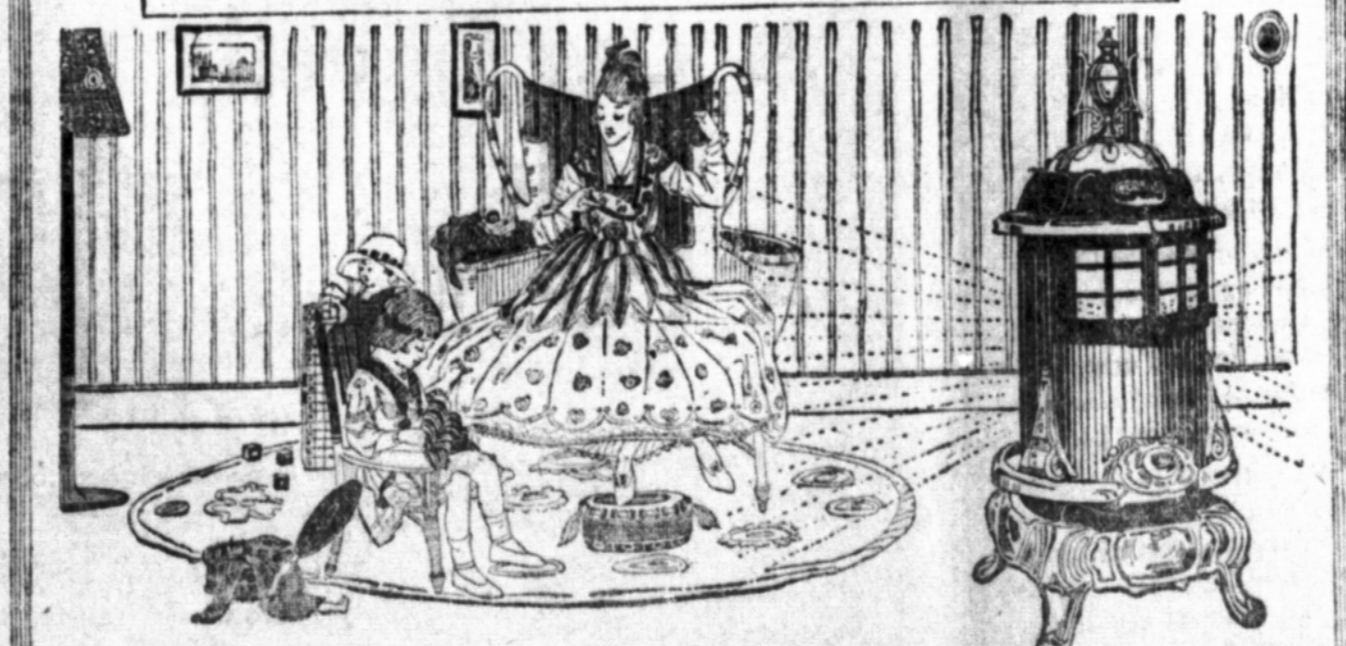

A Car Saved is A Car Made



American railroads must carry a double burden of service during the war. Their efficiency is essential in developing national military effectiveness. They also must "do their bit" by helping to maintain "Business as Usual".

More than 100,000 cars will be required for government purposes during the next three months. Transportation facilities will be taxed to capacity by commercial requirements during this period. Government business must have preference however, and effective conservation of equipment is therefore imperative. Additional facilities and equipment can not be had now. We must do the best we can with what we have.

Carriers and shippers alike have been wasteful in the use of cars. It is the patriotic duty of both to economize. Whenever possible, light loading of cars, delays in loading or unloading, and kindred practices must be avoided as in violation of national welfare.

Maximum Loading of Katy cars moved under load in 1916 would have saved 43,000 cars. Such a saving would provide enough cars to transport approximately 50,000,000 bushels of wheat. With full co-operation of shippers and consignees in the effort the management is making to conserve equipment the supply of cars on the M. K. & T. Lines for the use of commercial shippers can be increased 30%.

Railroads are peculiarly dependent upon public co-operation. Without public understanding of their problems and popular support of their proper purposes they cannot successfully perform their functions.

The management of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway particularly needs the earnest and patriotic support of shippers in its efforts to effect practical conservation of equipment. The degree of success which will attend conservation efforts depends largely upon M. K. & T. patrons.
