Thin Peaches and Plums Now
About 1 to 5 per cent of the actual buds on the trees usually turn out to be peaches. This year there has been a higher set of fruit buds to the end that there are in many cases too many fruits on the trees. Now is the time to thin. The fruit should be spaced four to six inches apart on the twigs and branches. Thinning can be done by taking a piece of spray hose or yard hose twelve to eighteen inches in length and fastening it onto a wooden handle so that the branches may be hit a light blow with the hose. 
