OIL DEVELOPMENT

The oil situation in the Gray country about fifteen miles southwest of Cross Plains is active and interesting. The Mitchell well is about five feet in the sand at 2,465 feet, and making 150 barrels daily. The well will not be drilled any deeper at present, but they will test the sand in their No. 2. The Empire Co. have moved a rig on the Isaac Neff farm just south of and in close proximity to Mitchell No. 1. A test is to be made on the W. T. Burns place one mile north of Burkett. A rig is being built on the J. P. Helm farm two miles or more east of Burkett. On the Herman Thete farm the Sun company have made a location 550 feet southeast from the Mitchell well. Mitchells have ordered rigs for Nos. 2 and 3.

No new contracts around Cross Plains made or to be made that we

know of. The pool in the Liberty country, which recently had a contract signed and all but ready for operation, has by mutual consent been abandoned; that is, those in the pool have agreed not to hold for contract any longer, it is stated. A goodly sized tract of land having been leased recently north of and near town, all hopes for a contract in that direction have been given up, for the time being at least. On account of litigation, nothing soon can be expected from the contract east of town.

Hauling of material for the rig on the Odom land has been interrupted with on account of the rains. However, the contractors seem to be putting forth their best efforts to put down a well. A contract on the Brown lands near Nimrod twelve miles northeast of town is attracting a good deal of attention. Rumor has it that a well soon is to be started near and southeast of Atwell, but we are unable to verify this report.

CALLAHAN COUNTY WAR-SAVING CAMPAIGN

This is a "loyalty test" and every slacker will be reported to the Government. Callahan County has been doing her part in all War-drives, and in this campaign the people will hold her record up and do her BEST in subscribing funds for supporting the "Boys Over There".

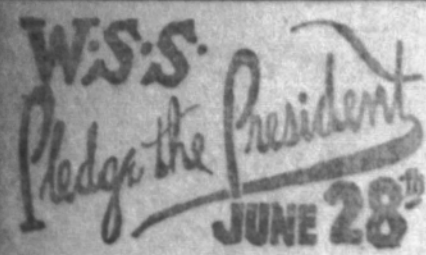

On that day citizens through the Nation are asked to pledge themselves to the President to buy the very large amount of War Savings Stamps possible. Everybody will be expected to do his best. The Nation is going to do its utmost in the matter of financing the War. We are going to have to do without money we figure we need for other purposes and lend to the Government. Let's all do our part. It will mean sacrifice to most of us—we all need all the money we can get hold of.

War Savings Stamps will be accepted on subscription or other accounts.

Rains are getting so frequent that not to get rain is more noteworthy than to get it.

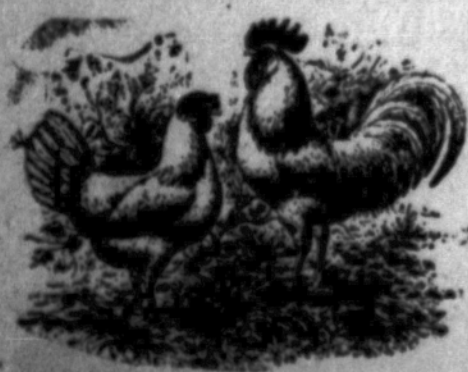

Austin, Texas, June 7.—Attorney General Looney is today advising County Tax Collectors and others that in order to be on the safe side, all women voters should be registered, including those in cities of 10,000 population and over and those residing outside of such cities. The Attorney General does not record legal opinion holding that under the Texas decisions the registration of women outside of cities was not required under the new woman suffrage act as certain provisions are void. However, he says some lawyers have disagreed and a shadow of a doubt may be said to exist.
